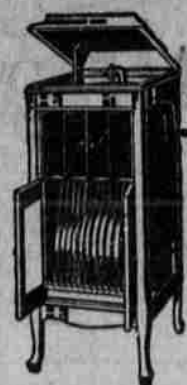

Thursday, all day, the crowds surged in and out of the Ashland Trading Company's store despite clouds and rain. In Monday's Tidings the Trading company had advertised its final sale in a double-page ad, and the crowds which responded today amply support the claim of the Tidings that it goes into nine out of every ten homes in Ashland and its trade territory. Since the war insurance plan became operative in October more than 45,000 soldiers have applied for insurance, amounting in all to nearly half a billion dollars and averaging about \$8,000 a man.

The 1917 potato crop is estimated to consist of 453,000,000 bushels, or half again as much as last year. Reports from the commission on car service indicate that more than 750,000 cars will be needed to handle it.

County Clerk Has Big Job Before Him

County Clerk Gardner's staff is busy preparing to mail out the war department questionnaires in connection with the coming second draft for military service to the 1,400 or more Jackson county young men registered for the draft. The questionnaires, which are enclosed in government franked envelopes, will not be mailed until December 15. Included with the questionnaires are return envelopes, also franked, in which the blanks are to be returned to the local board after they have been filled out.

It is the plan of the local county draft board to mail out only one-twentieth of the Jackson county questionnaires on December 15 and one-twentieth on each day thereafter until the entire 1,415 have been put in the mails. This is done so as to avoid a congestion in the postoffices and on the carrier routes, and a congestion of work in the board office in connection with the returning of the questionnaires.

Here and There

A carload of apple juice valued at \$2,500 was recently shipped to Reid, Murdock & Co., Chicago, by the Rogue River Valley Canning Company. The cannery is at present facing a shortage of cans. Five carloads on the way from the east are held up on the Great Northern because the government is moving 600 carloads of spruce east weekly to airplane factories. The cannery this season is sending eight carloads, totalling 6,000 dozen gallons, of apple juice to Bombay, India, for the Armour people. The season's business in apples and juice amounts to approximately \$41,000 thus far.
