NOTICE OF SALE OF CITY OF ASHLAND REFUNDING BONDS. Recorder's Office, Ashland, Oregon, January 7, 1918.

Sealed proposals will be received by the undersigned up to 6 o'clock of the afternoon of the 22nd day of January, 1918 (and not later), and the same will be opened and considered by the common council of the City of Ashland, Oregon, on the same day and date at 8:30 in the evening of the said 22nd day of January, 1918, for the purchase of the following "City of Ashland Refunding Bonds" issued in accordance with Ordinance No. 654 enacted by the common council of the City of Ashland, Oregon, and approved by the Mayor thereof on the 4th day of January, 1918, under authority and in compliance with a charter amendment duly enacted by the electors of the said city on the 18th day of December, 1917, and proclaimed by the Mayor thereof on the 27th day of December, 1917, all in accordance with the General Laws of the State of Oregon and the charter and ordinance of the City of Ashland as in such cases made and provided, to-wit:

One hundred and thirteen bonds, numbered consecutively from 765 to 877, both inclusive, and of the denomination of \$500.00 each, dated January 1st, 1918, bearing interest at the rate not exceeding five and one-half (5 1/2%) per cent per annum, to be determined by the accepted bid of the purchaser of said bonds, interest and principal payable at the office of the Treasurer of the City of Ashland, or at the Fiscal Agency for the State of Oregon in New York City, at the option of the purchaser, the whole of said bonds aggregating the sum of \$66,500.00, which shall mature and become payable twenty (20) years from date thereof, but shall be redeemable at the option of the City of Ashland, upon the payment of the face value thereof, with accrued interest thereon at the date of payment of any semi-annual coupon-paying period at or after five years from date thereof.

U. S. Force In Field Is Large

After being at war for nine months the United States' preparations may be summarized as follows:

The army: Personnel before the war, 265,000; its strength now, 1,500,000; before 1918 ends, 2,000,000. Appropriations thus far, \$7,509,866,119; additional authorizations, \$2,000,000; estimates for next fiscal year, \$10,995,126,594.

The navy: Personnel before the war, 106,000; officers and men today, 300,000. Appropriations, \$1,500,000,000.
