## Oregon Woman Is Helping the Boys

Since the time of the United States entering into the world's greatest conflict, many of her loyal citizens have hit upon novel ideas for "doing their bit" in the service for their country and humanity, but to Mrs. Charles Swinden of Grants Pass perhaps belongs the honor of one of the most unique, says the Roseburg Review. Mrs. Swinden has given her only son to the service of his country in the U. S. navy. Mrs. Swinden then conceived the idea of "mothering" a number of boys in the service who had no mothers, and so up to date has "adopted," as rumor has it, six motherless boys, as her own to look after their welfare while in the service. Recently her son was passing through Grants Pass and he wired his mother to meet him at the train. At that time he introduced to her two of the boys whom he had selected. The younger of the two, with tears streaming from his eyes, threw his arms around her and sobbingly told her that she was the first and only mother he had ever known. The older lad, with less demonstration, thanked her for her motherly interest in him and assured her of his appreciation of her kindness and thoughtfulness.

It is Mrs. Swinden's purpose to interest some of her friends in helping to knit sweaters, socks, etc., and have these things in readiness, so that at any time one of "her boys" writes that he needs anything, she will have it ready to send to him at once, and thus save him the time and anxiety of waiting perhaps weeks in getting it through the regular channels. Mrs. Swinden is not a wealthy woman, being the proprietress of a small rooming house at Grants Pass, but is "doing her best" in helping these motherless boys.

This is a most commendable service and one in which many a loyal American woman patriot can heartily co-operate.

## May Increase Draft Age From 31 to 45

Increasing the draft age from 31 to 40 or 45 years is one of the "probabilities of the future," according to Provost Marshal-General Crowder in his comprehensive report to the secretary of war.

The draft of the older men should be mainly for skilled war labor, but also to distribute the burdens of the war. There are plenty of young men for the first line fighting, Crowder has shown, but he also points out there is danger of "injuring the coming generation" by taking away too many of the "aggressively patriotic young men."

Out of the 10,683,249 men between the ages of 31 and 45, Crowder estimates 3,525,472 are unmarried and that 39 per cent of the latter figure, or 1,489,388, would be accepted for service under the present regulations.

Advocating this, Crowder said: "The younger men are generally deemed to make the soundest and most pliable military material. On the other hand, the older men are more likely to yield in large numbers the occupational skill so necessary in the varied compositions of the modern army."

"Under the national selective service system, which seeks to distribute the burden equally among the willing and unwilling, it is important, if not essential, to include the older men, because the smaller proportion of them is likely to enlist."

Under the new system a card index of the abilities of every man will be compiled in Washington after the questionnaires are all returned. In this way the government will be able to put its finger on men or certain trades just when they are needed.

"The whole labor problem can thus be controlled," Crowder points out.

## Stamps Cost Only Six Cents a Day

Are you saving 6 cents a day? If not, your Uncle Sam asks you to get busy.

Six cents a day for every day in the year is the thrift stamp quota for every man, woman and child in the state, if Oregon is to raise that \$17,000,000 war savings loan asked by the United States government. This is figured out on the state's estimated population of 800,000, and the per capita quota for the year is \$21.25.

Of course there will be some spend-thrifts who will squander their 6 cents a day instead of loaning it to Uncle Sam for his war needs. There will be men who will smoke it up in extra cigars, and women who will use it for silk stockings or earrings, and boys and girls who will yield to the temptation of candy and ice cream. Then, too, there will be others in unfortunate circumstances who will not always perhaps be able to set aside the buffalo nickel and the little red penny for Uncle Sam every day. So the rest are asked to save as much more than 6 cents a day as they can, in order to make up for the slackers and the poor people.

Even the babies are not exempt, and their parents should start immediately to get them in good standing with their Uncle Sam and at the same time be piling up a snug little savings account to launch them in life when education or special training is needed later on.

When you buy a thrift stamp or a war savings certificate you are not giving the money away. You are merely loaning the money at interest on the best security in the world, to your country for its war needs. A thrift stamp costs 25 cents, and when you have saved 16 of them you can turn them in, with 12 cents in cash, and get a war savings certificate that will bear interest and be cashed in by Uncle Sam for \$5 in gold in 1923.
