Ben W. Olcott Enters Governor Campaign

I shall be a candidate for the republican nomination for governor at the primary election to be held Friday, May 17.

If I am elected governor I shall resign the office of secretary of state and thus permit the present governor to appoint my successor.

This is a time when patriotism calls for the greatest economy and efficiency in the conduct of state affairs. There is urgent need for the application of business principles to state business, from the highest office to the lowest, so those who pay the taxes may get full value for the sums they are contributing to maintain the state government.

To accomplish this will be the exemplification of practical patriotism, and will meet in state government that which is being urged so strongly upon each citizen of the nation, namely, conservation of all our resources so our full strength may be used in carrying to a successful conclusion the war in which we are now engaged. No deed should be left undone that will aid in winning the war. No sacrifice is too great for those who remain at home.

In every political campaign the cry for economy and efficiency has been raised, and I believe the mood of the citizens of this state is now such that they are going to see that waste and extravagance are eliminated. They are going to insist on business principles being applied to the public business, from the top down.

It is in this connection that I feel I can give the greatest service to the state as its chief executive. As secretary of state I have made business efficiency my first consideration and have achieved results which I gladly submit to the voters as the basis for my aspiration to serve the state in a larger field.

There is no reason why every department of the state government should not be conducted on absolutely efficient lines, and if I am elected governor I shall make it my business to inject business economy and business efficiency into the many departments and commissions which come under the direction of the chief executive. I will hold my appointees to as high a degree of efficiency in the public service as is exacted from men in the employ of the best managed private businesses. When I make an appointment that person's whole time must be devoted to the duties of his office. I shall be controlled by no one and will be guided by business principles and common sense.

The state is similar to a large business corporation. It is the people's corporation. A private corporation, unless backed by unlimited resources like the state, would not long survive if it did not have at its head a man who fully devoted his time and capabilities in applying business judgment and business economy to its affairs. Neither can the state's business run of itself and keep within the bounds of economy and on a plane of efficiency. As governor I would expect to be the business head of the great corporation of the people and would apply my energies to make a success of the business.

Because all state business flows through the office of secretary of state no office affords such intimate knowledge of state affairs as does it. This office I have held for the last seven years. The knowledge and experience thus gained will be of immense value to a chief executive. Added to this is my familiarity with state institutions and activities gained as a member of the board of control.

The people of Oregon have emphatically voiced their sentiment in favor of prohibition, and if I am elected governor I shall consider it my duty to use the power of that office to see that the laws are enforced. And if, while I am governor, the "dry" amendment to the federal constitution, providing for national prohibition, is submitted to the states for ratification, I shall give it my endorsement and urge its speedy approval by the Oregon legislature. Likewise, should the national woman's suffrage amendment pass congress, as it now appears it will, I shall give it similar endorsement.

As the proper performance of my duties as secretary of state requires my undivided personal attention, I shall spend no time campaigning over the state. The people of the state are paying me a salary to look after their business, and I cannot properly do this when away from the office.

Third War Loan to Be No Easy Pull

More severely than ever before will the people of Oregon be put to a test in supporting the next Liberty loan drive. It will be a heavy burden, amounting to between \$40,000,000 and \$50,000,000, according to whether the government determines six billion or eight billion dollars shall be raised for war purposes before July 1.

To have the nation-wide drive for the third issue of war bonds come in March, running a month, without preparation for Oregon's part in the campaign, would be unwise, so with this in view plans for organization of every community in the state, reaching down to every individual, are under consideration in a conference of representative men from each county held in Portland this week.

The state central committee, composed of one representative banker or other business man from each of the counties, will be the nerve center for campaign activities. Under each county chairman there will be a local executive board composed of a manager and four committee men for each banking town. There will also be under each local board sub-committees on publicity and speakers, captains, with town and field solicitors directed by and reporting to captains and through them up to the official source, ultimately reaching the treasury department of the United States government.

It is believed that the next Liberty loan drive will begin March 1 and 15 and continue a month. The amount of the war loan will be more than the sum of the two issues of Liberty bonds already put out, and Oregon's quota will be such that it will figure out an average of \$1,000 from 50,000 subscribers, the number of Oregon subscribers last fall, or so much less if the number of subscribers is increased. It was announced that the coming issue of war bonds will be the only one up to July 1 and that it will be necessary to go over the state with

a fine-tooth comb and to work early and late to round up every dollar.

HOME ECONOMICS VITAL WAR MEASURE

Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 30.—Willing and effective services by women trained to solve the intricate problems concerned with food and the home are counted on by Herbert Hoover, from the women trained in college home economics. In a letter just received by Dean Ava B. Milam of O. A. C. he says:

"Graduates of these departments will find themselves called to places of usefulness for surpassing in number and responsibility anything heretofore thought possible. Interests that demand the rarest talent and the highest scientific training await their attention. Thousands of young women are being trained to grapple with the problems concerned with food and the home through the excellent work done by the departments of home economics in the colleges and universities."

Because of the great and pressing need for these trained women Mr. Hoover requested Miss Milam to give wide publicity to this notice of government recognition.
