THE BUSINESS WOMAN.

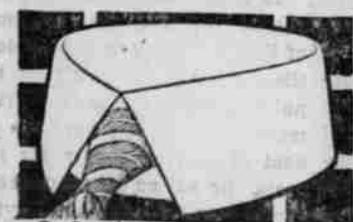

NO WHEAT DURING WAR

No wheat or wheat products of any kind will be served on Southern Pacific dining cars during the period of the war. It was announced recently by Allan Pollok, superintendent of dining cars, hotels and restaurants for the company.

This action follows the plea of the food administration for still further saving in wheat. Under Pollok's direction, the Southern Pacific chefs are attending special cooking schools to learn the utmost use that can be made of other cereals.

The Southern Pacific operates more dining cars than any other railroad in the country. The exclusion of wheat from the six million meals that are served annually is expected to effect a big saving.

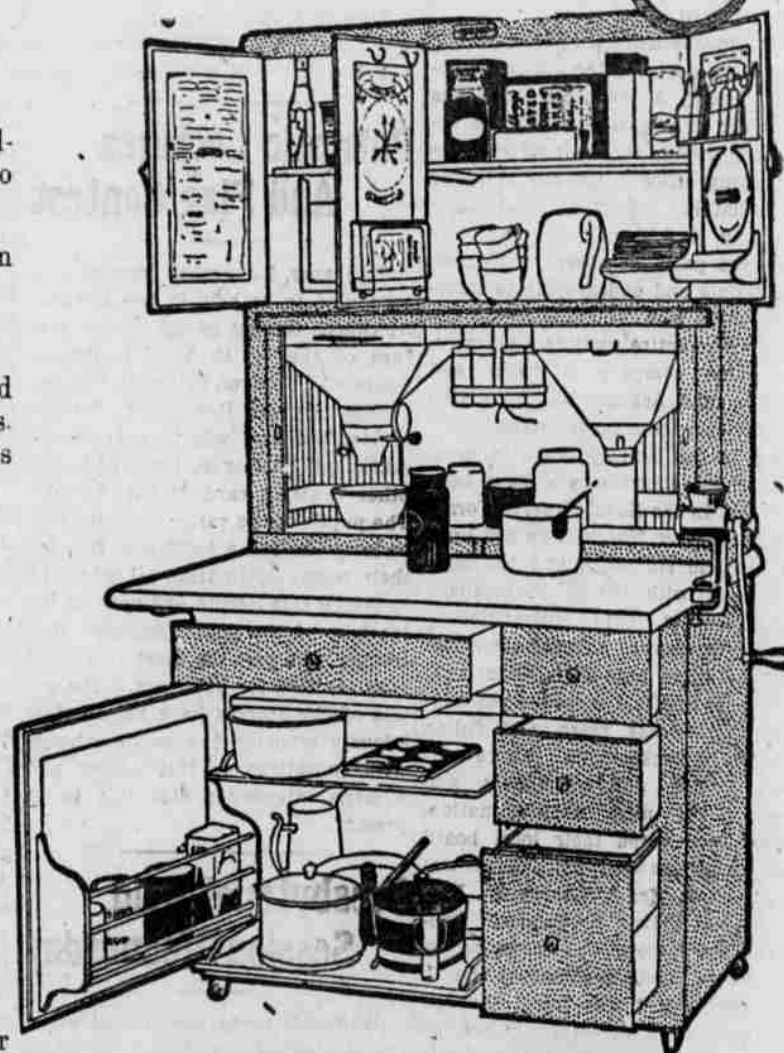

Terman, in his treatise, entitled, "The Hygiene of the Child," says that out of 20 million school children in this country, 18 million are affected by disease of the mouth and teeth which undermines their health and progress.

Decayed and neglected teeth cause indigestion and mental backwardness. Tooth-troubles may affect the heart, the eyes and ears—in fact, all our faculties are weakened by diseased teeth and a neglected mouth. "A decaying tooth, unpleasant as it may sound, is a rotting bone in your mouth," according to Arthur Brisbane, the famous editorial writer.
