TIME TRIED EVERYWHERE WORTH TESTED

Sen. McNary Will Remain at Capital

Washington, D. C., May 13—(Special)—In view of many inquiries from friends whether he would return to Oregon to engage in the final of the primary contest, Senator Chas. L. McNary issued the following statement today:

"No, I shall not go to Oregon under any circumstances as such a course would conflict with my plain duty to remain here in Washington and perform the various official obligations that arise from day to day. In returning to Oregon only one purpose could be served and that is the advancement of my candidacy for the office of United States senator which is small by comparison with the greater duty of rendering constant and uninterrupted service to the people of my state and nation in this grave hour of international conflict.

"Many measures of vital importance are before the senate and its committees and to become familiar with their import and operation requires faithful attendance upon their consideration. By remaining here in Washington I shall be in a position to force upon the attention of congress the bill I have introduced to empower the president to fix the price on the necessities of life, which legislation is necessary in my opinion to remove the possibilities of actual suffering by the American people.

"In addition thereto, I am greatly interested in passing into law at this session of congress a measure calculated to invite private capital to assist irrigation projects through the government guaranteeing the district bonds.

"Also, I have recently introduced a bill granting preferential rights to soldiers and sailors. In view of this situation, I am leaving my campaign to my friends in Oregon and those who approve of my course in congress."

STANFIELD HAS MADE WORTH-WHILE SHOWING

Portland, May 13.—Conceding that he will carry Multnomah county by a substantial plurality, the politicians are now figuring on just how large the vote of R. N. Stanfield will be over the entire state.

His nomination is practically conceded by all disinterested persons who have kept in touch with the political situation. In the first place he has remained aloof from the political intrigues, conducted his own campaign, stood strictly on his merits and made no combinations with any man or organization. He has gone out as an Oregon man, a self-made man, who has added wealth and prosperity to the state of Oregon, and all the attempts to fasten the wool profiteering business on him have failed.

He stands today the biggest man in Oregon and there is no doubt of his nomination. After that it will be up to the democratic and republican parties to say whether or not he shall be elected. It is very probable that had not West endorsed McNary, Stanfield would have had a harder fight. As it is he is the only acknowledged one hundred per cent republican on the ticket and will get the vote accordingly.

PRISONERS OF WAR IN U. S. MUST WORK

Included in war department regulations regarding the employment of prisoners of war and interned enemy aliens are the following statements:

All classes of prisoners, excepting commissioned officers and such officers as are physically fit for labor, will be required to perform work necessary for their comfort or for the upkeep of their prison barracks. Interned enemy aliens will not be held for compulsory labor except as provided in this paragraph.

Prisoners of war, excepting officers, warrant, petty, and noncommissioned officers, may be required to work for the public service—they may be authorized to work on their own account. Under exceptional circumstances when specially authorized by the secretary of war they may, upon their written request, be authorized to work for private persons or for corporations. Petty and noncommissioned officers may be authorized to work on their own account and upon their written request, may be authorized to work in the same manner as other prisoners of war, except that they will be employed in a supervisory capacity only.

An order for labor will be regarded as a military command, and prisoners failing to obey such order will be punished accordingly.

When employed on work that is necessary for their comfort or for the upkeep of the prison barracks in which they are interned, prisoners will receive no compensation. When the work is done for the government prisoners will be paid at a rate according to the work executed; when the work is for other branches of the public service or for private persons, the conditions of and the compensation for such work will be settled in agreement between representatives of said branches or persons and the adjutant general of the army.

The wages of the prisoners shall go toward improving their position, and the balance shall be paid them on their release, after deducting the cost of their maintenance.

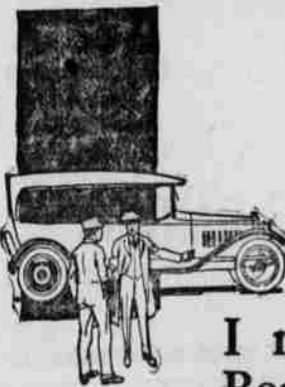

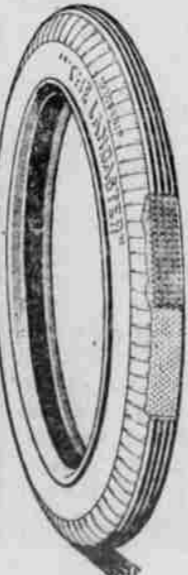
