WHAT SHOULD BE SENT TO THE BOYS IN FRANCE

To anxious mothers and loving sisters and other interested in the boys in France, the postoffice department has issued a circular that will not be especially pleasing, as it tells what is best not to send the boys. Many of the articles mentioned are just what the folks at home have been sending.

For instance, do not send candy. They can buy it cheaper and fresher there. Just send plain money, no fancy candied biscuits or cakes. These can also be purchased anywhere in France.

A shaving brush can be had over there for 23 cents and a first-class tooth brush for 28 cents. Adams' pepsin chewing gum is for sale every-

where for 4 1/2 cents and so is Spear-mint.

Baker's chocolate can be had for 76 cents a pound anywhere in France where the boys are stationed, and Menier's chocolate cakes for 13 1/2 cents. They can buy Fatimas (cigarettes) for 14 1/2 cents and Lucky Strike smokes for 9 1/2 cents. Cigarette papers are to be had for two cents.

If the boy drinks tea he can buy the best for 38 cents a pound, real Formosa. Ever-ready flashlights for 66 cents, batteries 28 cents and bulbs 14 cents. The government says so and it must be true.

The government is doing what it can to induce friends of the soldiers to just send money and not mail many articles that can be purchased cheaper on the other side.

OREGON HENS WIN IN LAYING CONTEST

Reports from the British Columbian laying contest for the month ending April 25, shows that the O. A. C. pen of Barred Rocks leads not only for the current month but also for the term to date.

Their record for the month was 132 eggs for the pen of six hens, and for the term 559. The second best pen laid 535, and the third 528, all Barred Rocks. In the light breeds class a pen of White Leghorns, entered by Horace Dryden, of Corvallis, holds seventh place with a record of 404 eggs.

smelter at Kennett, relieving the Northern California Power company of that service so it can switch more of its electric current to the Pacific Gas & Electric at Chico and Colusa to furnish power and light at the bay and down the state. The California-Oregon Power company will build a high-tension line from its southern terminus at Castella to Kennett at a cost of \$330,000 and furnish power to the Mommouth smelter and mine for a minimum of \$195,000 a year.
