Organized Labor in America Gladdens World With Loyalty

One of the mighty and reassuring facts of the war is the attitude of organized labor. One of the heroic figures of this war is Samuel Gompers, the field marshal, architect and tactician of organized labor. He is in the thick of the conflict. He is one of the plumed knights of the assault on kaiserdom. Here is his May day message to the American people:

"Labor is in this war to win. We must win. It is giving in every rank and trade its full, whole-souled cooperation to the government. It is behind the boys in the trenches to the last man.

"In Canada conditions are ideal. Labor is doing its bit enthusiastically there as here, and it will continue to do so until the fight is won. There are no slackers in organized labor's ranks."

It is to be remembered that labor organizations have always been opposed to war. They have always opposed militarism. They have always been pacifists, because they correctly reasoned that the true state of the world is a state of perpetual peace.

But they comprehend Wilhelmstrasse. They have a clear discernment of the issues of this conflict. They know that feudalism in government means feudalism in industry, and that the kaiser's system spread over the earth as William II proposes, would rob workers of their independence, would rivet the bonds to bind workers to a deeper servitude.

Organized labor is accordingly aroused. The pacifist ideals of yesterday are submerged for the time, in order that the mighty group of organized workers may battle for the preservation of democratic ideals, democratic institutions and a free world.

Organized labor never stood so high in the public opinion of America. Many a prejudice has been swept away. Many a critic who has been wont to condemn, has changed his attitude to give open praise to the organization. He realizes now that organized labor is a great army, millions strong, alert and courageous in the thick of the fight for freedom and a world of future peace and liberty.

Organized labor could have remained pacific. It could have sulked in its tent. It could have maintained its ancient opposition to war. But it didn't. It volunteered for service. It marshaled its forces and mobilized its strength. Its powerful arm is one of the country's mightiest resources in the struggle against junkerism.—Oregon Journal.

Draft Board Not At Fault in the Matter

Sheriff Ralph G. Jennings, in an open letter, denies the published report that the local draft board was in any degree responsible for the fact that the soldiers sent to Camp Lewis this week were not provided with suitable train accommodations. Sheriff Jennings is chairman of the draft board and speaks with knowledge of all the facts in the case. His denial is official.

The fact is developed that the Southern Pacific is wholly responsible for the lack of accommodations on the train that carried the boys through this county. The soldiers were taken off the train at Grants Pass and held until train No. 15 reached that city from Ashland. It was provided with the sleepers required by war department regulations.

SURPLUS COCKERELS SHOULD BE CANNED

Corvallis, May 13—"Can surplus cockerels" will be the slogan for Oregon farmers and poultrymen during the second week of June, beginning Monday, June 3. The purpose of it is to save the big annual toll of 15 million dollars a year taken by the fertile egg.

"This is an annual loss on each farm of \$2.50," says U. L. Upson, federal and O. A. C. extension poultry specialist. "Putting it another way," he continued, "means that if only one spoiled egg is produced on each farm in the entire country, the spoiled product will fill 200,000 cars with bad eggs."

The first thing is to separate all desirable breeding males from the females. On most farms the best cockerels each year should be at least as

Canning the surplus cockerels is advocated not alone by the poultry specialists but also by the federal food administration and the college home economics specialists.
