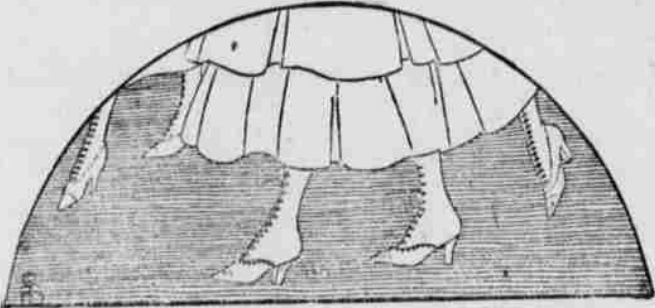

## Walter Roy Davis Dies at Camp Lewis

Word was received in Ashland last Tuesday of the death of Walter Roy Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. N. Davis of the Green Spring district, which occurred at Camp Lewis that morning. The news of his death was a fearful shock to his family, who had been apprised of his illness only two days previously, when a telegram had arrived announcing his critical condition. His wife and father left Sunday morning and were with him at the time of his death. An attack of measles followed by pneumonia was the cause of his demise.

Mr. Davis was 27 years of age, and had been a member of the 1st company of Coast Artillery located here. On the eve of this company's departure for Fort Stevens last July, he was rejected in the physical examination, but was called in the selective draft April 29, and went to Camp Lewis with the second draft contingent.

On April 17, he was united in marriage with Miss Grace Helen of Rogue River, who with his parents, brother and sisters, survive him.

Mr. Davis, Sr., returned home last evening and the body will follow later. A particularly sad circumstance in the death of this young soldier has arisen. The young wife, who went to his bedside, was so overcome with grief and shock that an illness has resulted and she is left in a hospital at American Lake, unable to return to her husband's funeral.

Up to going to press this afternoon nothing has been learned in regard to the funeral arrangements. Mr. Davis, Sr., could not get any information as to the time of shipping the

## Lightning Plays Pranks in Medford

Quite a severe electrical storm passed over the valley yesterday morning bringing with it a fine shower of rain which was of inestimable benefit to the country.

Witnesses who saw the bolt claim that it appeared like a huge ball of fire about two feet in diameter. This struck a residence occupied by a family by the name of Pickel, entering through a door and emerging from the street where it struck a post on the porch of the Williams' residence and split, one-half entering the house through a window. A young girl in the house was knocked down by the shock, after which the bolt passed out and exploded in the air about 20 feet from the house.
