### PERSHING SERVED SEVEN YEARS BEFORE PROMOTED

For seven years after his graduation from West Point Pershing received no promotion, says William Heytger in Boys' Life, the boys scouts' magazine, for July.

Nevertheless, with customary grit, he applied himself to master his profession. He became an authority on military tactics and was sent to West Point as an instructor. He was there when the Spanish-American war broke out, and immediately applied for a command. The war department sent him to the 10th cavalry, a colored troops, as a first lieutenant, and then his rise began. His troop went to Cuba. He led it at the battle of El Caney and came out of that engagement a captain, "for gallantry in action."


Next he went to the Philippines. General Chaffee sent him to the hills of western Mindanao, where the sultan of Bacolod ruled 100,000 Mohammedan Malays who thought it a virtue to kill a Christian. The sultan's stronghold had walls of earth and bamboo forty feet thick, and was surrounded by a moat forty feet wide. To reach that stronghold it was necessary to cut a path through dense tropical jungles. Pershing, with the same old grit, cut the path. He told the sultan that the killing of Christians had to stop. The sultan laughed. Soon there was another killing, and 48 hours later the sultan's stronghold was destroyed. Within two years Pershing had established law and order in western Mindanao, something that Spain had failed to do in 300 years of trying. It was an exploit of determination, of obstacles overcome, of never-give-up. They were the traits that had stamped him as a boy, and they won him high honors as a man. In 1906, in recognition of his ability, President Roosevelt made him a brigadier-general and jumped him over the heads of 862 men. The boy who had won his way to West Point by one point, the young man who had been given no promotion for seven years—think of that, you fellows who grumble that nobody takes notice of how hard you work—had at last come into his own.

the way to France or ready to be sent? I have found nothing to equal the spirit of patriotism that prevails here and the splendid results accomplished in this and other lines of food conservation are a credit to the state."

Mr. Warrington said the most important feat to be accomplished now on the calendar of conservation is a great food reserve with wheat as the most important item. "This does not mean that housewives are to build up a private reserve in their own cupboard," he said. "On the contrary, she is to avoid this except in her canning and preserving of all the fresh things raw on the market. But it does mean that she plan her household menus so that perishable food is consumed and all preserved foods are saved for the big national reserve."

"Don't open cans!" This should be the motto in every household of the land. Canned foods represent both labor and material that are needed in the great struggle. Tin is getting scarce and is much needed. So I would appeal to every housewife to stop and consider when she is about to open a can of asparagus, peas, etc., and plan instead to serve the fresh vegetables."

Although food is here in plenty at the present time, Mr. Warrington explained that a reserve was necessary to offset submarine depredations, poor crops, etc. The housewives' reserve should represent the results of her own labors only.

### ONE CAUSE OF HIS SUCCESS

Letter of Charles Dickens Reveals Care Which Great Writer Gave His Books and Readings.

In a recent sale of Dickens' autographs in London this letter, written while he was in the United States, appears: "I should never have made any success in life if I had been shy of taking pains, or if I had not bestowed upon the least thing I have ever undertaken, exactly the same attention and care that I have bestowed upon the greatest. Do everything at your best. It was but last year that I set to and learned every word of my Readings, and from ten years ago till last night I have never read to an audience but I have watched for an opportunity of striking out or inserting somewhere. Look at such of my manuscripts as are in the library at Gads' and think of the patient hours devoted year after year to single lines. . . . The weather is very severe here, and the work is very hard. Dolby (his manager) having been violently pitched into by the mayor of New Haven (a town at which I am to read next week) has gone off boldly this morning with defiant written instructions from me to inform the said mayor that if he fail to make out his case he (Dolby) has to return all the money taken, and to tell him that I will not set foot in his jurisdiction, whereupon the New Haven people will probably fall upon the mayor in his turn and lead him a pleasant life."

### NO LIGHTLESS NIGHTS ENFORCED IN STATE

Portland, July 8.—There will be no lightless nights in Oregon this year unless conditions change radically, according to Fuel Administrator Holmes today. Holmes' announcement follows a report that the national fuel administration plans to again enforce lightless nights in the east beginning July 10, as a means of saving coal.

The situation in Oregon is far different than that which obtains along the Atlantic seaboard and in the middle west. Holmes is calling the attention of Washington to the fact that Oregon derives the bulk of her light and power from waterpower, while the east depends on coal.

On this account he says there is no use in curtailing light consumption in Oregon, excepting possibly in towns where electricity is generated by steam. Holmes, however, will not curtail steam plant fuel supplies unless the shortage in Oregon this winter proves greater than present conditions indicate.
