LIMITATIONS FOR SUGAR ARE GIVEN

To settle in the minds of all the exact regulations in regard to sugar limitations requested by the food administration for the month of August a complete summary of these which effect the household as well as the public eating houses has been given out by the local food administration as follows:

For the household.

1. No household should have on hand more than two pounds of sugar at any one time for table and cooking use, and not more than 25 pounds for canning.
2. Canning sugar must be kept separate from that purchased for household purposes so that the food administration inspectors may check up the quantity on hand, the amount of fruit put up and compare it with the original amount purchased. Any excess canning sugar left over must be returned to the grocer. It is not permitted to use this for table purposes.
3. Do all preserving without sugar whenever possible, adding it when used in the winter or at a time when sugar will be more plentiful.
4. Each person in a family is allowed two pounds of sugar per month, which means that not more than six lumps or three teaspoonsful may be used each day by any individual.

ual. This two-pound allotment includes that used for cooking.

1. All sugar bowls should be removed from the tables and individual sugar furnished each patron.
2. Not more than two half lumps or one teaspoonful of sugar should be served a customer at a meal. He may have his choice of lump or granulated sugar but not both.

The state fund this year amounts to \$376,401.42, the per capita being \$1.84 on the basis of 205,684 persons ranging in age from four to 20 years, 6286 of whom reside in Jackson county.

BLIND MAN'S SON KILLED IN ACTION

A pathetic echo of the grim struggle in the Old World was heard in the assembled meeting of the fathers of soldiers and sailors of Oregon in

Portland Monday night, says the Telegram, when they were told of the death in action of Private R. E. Smith, son of a blind pencil vendor, who is a familiar figure on Portland streets. E. C. Smith, the father has never seen the 19-year son who laid down his life when the Germans were turned at Chateau Thierry. The father has been blind for 24 years.

"I know my boy died like a hero," said the blind old man, his sightless eyes gazing steadily ahead. "He gave the most I could; I have given the most I could. It is for America."

R. E. Smith the lad who fell, enlisted a year ago in the 3d Oregon, and was assigned to guard duty on the railroad tunnels of the Siskiyou mountains. Later he was sent to Fort Mills, then to France. Previous to his enlistment he was a street car conductor in Portland.

Now when the old man stands on the corner with his handful of pencils extended, you will know the story behind the tiny gold star on the service pin on his lapel.

NEW NATIONAL GUARD COMPANY IS PLANNED

Eugene, August 7.—Many members of the four companies of the state militia of this city signed the roster of a national guard company at a meeting in the armory last night after an address by Adjutant General J. M. Williams, and prospects are bright for obtaining the minimum of 100 names.

Adjutant General Williams spoke to the men after drill, informing them as to the provisions of the law governing the national guard, pointing out the fact that men between the ages of 18 and 45 years are eligible to join and that the company may be called into the federal service at any time and may be sent anywhere to the president.

He gave it as his opinion that the regiment in Oregon, if organized, will be called into the service after it is on a war footing, his statement creating enthusiasm among the members of the local companies, many of whom are anxious to see service overseas.

This air is pressed through the meters, which registers the amount as though it was water, thus doubling the amount of water used by the consumer.

The spruce production for airplanes in the northwest reached a new high mark when 41 carloads of dressed and kiln dried spruce were shipped from Vancouver, Wash. The shipment totalled approximately 500,000 feet, sufficient for 900 ordinary airplanes.

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
