SOLDIERS' LETTERS

This letter written at the near front was received on October 12, at the same time as another letter written four or five weeks later at a more accessible place...

August 16, 1918. Mrs. A. C. Spencer, Ashland, Ore.

Dear Mother:—Well, here I am, gaining experience every day. Am now temporarily assigned to the 103rd field artillery from New England, who have just assisted greatly in the last drive.

I am writing with a pencil, because my pen went dry and I have no chance to fill it yet. Of course this line of work is all new to me, having never had any of it at all, but I hope to be of some value any way.

This is quite a bunch of fellows who run thru O'Connors, O'Haras, Hogans and such Japanese names. I just about made a dicker for a Corona typewriter I have needed so many times since I came over here.

I have a dandy room in a very large house with a very old French lady. She takes great care of me and

supervises the work of caring for my room. The work is done by an orderly. Some pumpkins, eh? Well, I fight the idea all the time, and don't think it is right to waste the time of so many good soldiers making them care for the officer's equipment.

The old lady here rushed around and fixed up her writing room for me to use, and it is fine. But, gee, I am supposed to be at war and to get along without this, but she cannot understand that sort of thing for an American.

Had the best supper and filled my pen and feel like a king now. Is 9 p. m. and I have my shoes and socks off and am resting to the limit. Learned today am to be battery executive. I will be in the line, but not in it. I fight but am not in the fight, so there you are. I am to see that everything is there and works right, but about the only gunner that can get a crack at me will be an aeroplane, and believe me, I can beat them to it.

Had the best string beans for supper tonight I've ever had since I left Ashland, but the pork that we had roasted was still eating grass when I stuck my fork into it, so I did not eat it. These French always eat the meat very rare. We had a big weed salad. It was good, all right, but I never thought dog fennel and such were to be eaten. I guess it wasn't dog fennel at that, tho it looked very much like it. That was some supper—quiet, please, the major might take offense. Am to eat at another place tomorrow.

What do you know about me bossing the cleaning and oiling of scuds of harness? Well, I did that job today to the Queen's taste, tho.

Tomorrow I am going to instruct my platoon (who have been doing it for over a year), and I never saw an outfit before. But I'll teach them. Feeling dandy fine, but I do miss my letters. It's 27 days since I had any mail.

Just missed meeting Major White, ex-adjutant general of Oregon. Left a note at my last stop. He is shooting Boche now.

CONRAD P. OLSON FOR SUPREME JUDGE

Justice Conrad P. Olson, of the Supreme Court of Oregon, has announced his candidacy for election by the voters in November to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Justice Frank A. Moore.

Justice Olson was appointed by Governor Withycombe September 28th and he immediately assumed the duties of the office.

"I shall make no personal canvass for the position of Justice of the Supreme Court to be voted in the November election by writing in names," said Justice Olson today.



took this position at the hands of the Governor with the idea of performing the work that goes with the position, resigned by senatorship and am willing to leave the result to the voters of the State without a personal campaign.

"My ideals shall be to thoroly go into every case before me to the end that a square deal be given the litigants, and to expedite as much as possible the decision of cases to the end that delays may not defeat justice."

Justice Conrad P. Olson was born in Wisconsin of pioneer parents. He was educated at Stevens Wisconsin, obtaining his law degree at the latter place. Served on the Wisconsin State Civil Service Commission as examiner, and was principal of schools.

Located in Portland, Oregon, and opened up lay offices, and at the time of his appointment had a good standing before the bar. Had served in both houses of the Legislature every session beginning with 1918, taking a very active part. Was generally considered the probable president of the Senate at the coming session.

In 1917 was tendered the appointment to the Circuit Court Bench of Multnomah County but declined the same.

Has always taken a very active part in all civic and public activities and since the war started has been a four-minute man, solicitor and speaker on all the Liberty Loans and other War drives. He did not claim exemption by reason of holding a state office.

Owing to a defect in the election laws no method is provided of getting a name on the ballot when a vacancy occurs within 40 days before the election, as in this case, and so it will be necessary for the voter to write in the name of their choice in a space provided entitled, "Justice of the Supreme Court to fill vacancy caused by death of Justice Frank A. Moore. Vote for one."

It seems generally conceded that having been selected by the Governor for the position of Supreme Court Justice and being actually engaged in the work, that Justice Olson will be elected even there will be other candidates in the field.
