REPORT OF ACTIVITIES

OF CANTEN STATION

Ashland, Ore., Dec. 10, 1918.
Mr. P. K. Hammond, Chairman of Ashland Branch of Red Cross.

Dear Sir:

I beg to hand you herewith a brief report on the activity of our Canteen Committee in the work of taking care of the many thousands of men passing thru our city during the past eleven months.

The Canteen opened for work the first of February, 1917. During this month over eight thousand men passed thru our Canteen. No effort was made to give any elaborate provisions owing to the fact that these first men were of the draft and just leaving home and were not in need of provisions, but merely a hearty welcome and a plentiful supply of post cards and stamps and a committee to look after the mailing of these cards.

We found that fully 75 per cent of the postals given out were used and ready to mail before the young men left town.

Later in May when the selected men passed thru our city we were called on for more attention and we found that light refreshments were needed. We began serving sandwiches and ice cream at cost. In order to be able financially to keep these refreshments on hand for the soldiers, we began to sell ice cream and fruit at the regular trains to civilians. In this way we have been able to give out freely to at least 30,000 soldiers and sailors free refreshments, post cards and tobacco during every month since the first of June.

We have received during that time \$100 from the Red Cross and \$490 from the Salvage depot, and \$70 miscellaneous donations. Besides this we have received donations of 10 boxes of apples from the Commercial Club, Ten boxes of apples from Civic Club besides countless other donations of help and services from these two Clubs, without which it would have been impossible for us to have continued this work.

In looking over our books we find that almost every family in our city has donated to our fund in the way of hundreds of baskets of choice fruit and flowers and dozens of glasses of jellies and jams.

Up to date the Canteen has paid out to Mason Eherman & Co. for supplies for pop corn and peanut wagon, also gum, chocolate bars and cigarettes \$596.17.

Fruit \$428.51
Post Cards \$206.50
Miscellaneous supplies \$268.68
Milk, sugar and coffee \$170.43

Total \$2553.47
We have on hand \$200.00; one gas pop-corn wagon, cost \$260.00; and \$100.00 worth of supplies and fixtures in Canteen.

Thru a regrettable oversight in the report of the Red Cross Secretary, published this past week, the name of Mrs. Lamkin, president, and Mrs. Whitney, secretary, also of Mrs. P. K. Hammond, their able assistant, were omitted in the write-up of the Salvage Association. This report as made to the Board of R. C. Directors on December 4, covered receipts only up to the first of December; and it, therefore, did not include the last remittance of \$300, received since that date, from the Salvage department, bringing the total amount turned in by them up to the handsome sum of \$750. Even this does not represent the entire amount that they have earned, for they have still a substantial sum in their own treasury. All this is exclusive of the money raised thru the sale of "Cheery Xmas" boxes under the management of Mrs. John Dill, which brought in more than \$100.

To enable patrons of the Tidings to easily comply with this ruling this office has put in a supply of the standard sizes of butter paper and will print it in lots of 100 sheets and upward and deliver it by parcels post at the following prices:
