Gold Hill Cement For State Highway

At the meeting held in Portland Thursday of the state highway commission no bids were asked for construction of highways in Jackson county as engineers' estimates had not been completed. They will be advertised at the April meeting.

A delegation from Jackson county, consisting of E. V. Carter of Ashland, W. H. Gore of Medford and County Judge Gardner and Commissioners Owens and Owen appeared to urge the construction of the Eagle Point and Blue Ledge roads and the Green Springs mountain road. A tentative agreement was reached with Jackson county delegation to cooperate on the road from Ashland to Klamath Falls on a 50-50 basis.

Among the forest projects for highways to be built on a co-operative basis by the state and federal government, decided upon finally by the state highway commission were the following:

Medford-Klamath Falls (Anna Creek section) 3.5 miles, grading to cost \$10,000. Bids will be opened in April.

Medford-Klamath Falls (Jackson county) on the Crater Lake road, 22 miles of grading to be done from Prospect to the boundary of the national forest, where the road will connect with the road in the park to the lake. The job is estimated at \$237,000, with Jackson county to pay \$3500 and the state and forestry department \$121,250 each. This leaves 45 miles between Medford and Prospect to be improved possibly as a post road project, at least part of the way.

The commission reconsidered its action of Wednesday in rejecting bids for cement and decided to contract with the Beaver Portland Cement company of Gold Hill for 50,000 barrels. The reason for the reconsideration was that the commission discovered that this company offered to furnish cement at a much lower rate than the prevailing market rate and gave other evidence of not being a member of the cement trust.

According to the schedule of the contract, cement will be delivered at Portland for \$2.26 a barrel. The prevailing rate is \$2.59, or 33 cents more. At other points in the state the difference ranges from 18 to 71 cents per barrel.

ing between Adams and Athena the state highway commission met the royalty on patented pavements issue by stipulating with the contractor that the sum of \$10,000 would be withheld until the validity of the patent was adjudicated. In the event it should be held valid the state is to pay to the contractor the amount withheld. If valid the state is to retain the money.

In the letting of future contracts contractors will be notified that they are not to include a royalty item in making up their bid. If the validity of patents is sustained, the state will pay the royalty.

The Adams-Athena contract was awarded to the Warren Construction company, whose bid on bitulithic pavement was \$170,085.

The other two paving contracts were free from complications. The one for the section between Milton and the Washington state line was awarded to the Warren Construction company, whose bid on bitulithic was \$105,051. The competing bid was that of a Spokane firm on a non-patented mixture, \$112,244.

The contract for the two-mile section in Wasco county between The Dalles and Seufert was let to the United Contracting company for \$46,430. The type of pavement selected was a non-patented asphaltic concrete. A petition from a number of citizens of the county asked for bitulithic. The bid of the contractor on this type was \$48,498.

The state highway commission last week awarded four contracts for grading and macadamizing at an estimated cost of approximately \$250,000 and started plans to call for bids at its May meeting for 91 miles of improved highway, including 70 miles of pavement.

GEN. PERSHING COMMENDS AID RENDERED ARMY

Post Exchanges Overseas Are Taken Over by the Military Authorities

Asserting that the valuable aid rendered by the war service of the Y. M. C. A. had been a large factor in the final great accomplishments of the American army, General Pershing, in a communication to E. C. Carter, in charge of association operations with the American Expeditionary Forces, pays a splendid tribute to the work which this agency accomplished under extreme difficulties and handicaps. "The Y. M. C. A. served the army better than could have been expected," says General Pershing.

At its own request the American Y. M. C. A. has been relieved from maintaining post exchanges with the Expeditionary forces overseas, the need for such service having been relieved with the signing of the armistice. Correspondence exchanged between General Pershing and E. C. Carter, in charge of the Y. M. C. A. with the army, resulted in this decision. Carter wrote to General Pershing January 29th as follows:

Dear General Pershing: A year and a half ago you requested the Y. M. C. A. to undertake operations for post exchanges for the American Expeditionary Forces in order that "officers and enlisted men may not be taken away for that purpose from their paramount military functions of training and fighting."

As soon as hostilities ceased we raised with you the question whether time had not come for the Y. M. C. A. to be relieved of the operation of post exchanges in view of the fact that there was no longer the same pressing demand on man power of the army for training and fighting. When we first raised the question with you it did not appear to you that it was feasible in the best interests of maximum service to the army that a change be made. Now the situation is materially altered.

Recent general orders from main headquarters and requests from commanding officers have laid on the Y. M. C. A. increased responsibilities in promoting educational, athletic and entertainment activities in the American Expeditionary Force. This is placing a rapidly increasing burden upon our personnel. The army is also now preparing for the delivery of all supplies for post exchanges which heretofore have been imported, manufactured and delivered by the Y. M. C. A.

In view of the changed situation I wish to know whether you do not think it would be possible for the army at a very early date to assume full responsibility for the maintenance of post exchanges throughout the American Expeditionary Force?

Very cordially yours, (Signed) E. C. CARTER. General Pershing immediately acted upon the suggestion made by Carter and relieved the Y. M. C. A. of its task of maintaining the post exchanges. He said:

My Dear Mr. Carter: I have received your letter of January 29th asking whether, in view of present changed situation, it would be possible for the army to assume full responsibility for maintenance of post exchanges throughout American Expeditionary Force.

As you correctly state, the Y. M. C. A. undertook the management of post exchanges at my request at a time when it was of greatest importance that no available soldier should be taken away from vital military functions of training and fighting. As reasons which impelled me at that time to request you to undertake this work no longer exist, I am glad to approve your suggestion in reaching this conclusion. Consideration has been given to new burdens in connection with entertainment, athletic activities and education that you have assumed. I have accordingly given directions that army units themselves take over and operate their own post exchanges.

In making this change permit me to thank you for the very valuable services and assistance which the Y. M. C. A. has rendered to the American Expeditionary Force in handling these exchanges. Handicapped by shortage of tonnage and land transportation the Y. M. C. A. has, by extra exertion, served the army better than could have been expected, and you may be assured that its aid has been a large factor in the final great accomplishments of the American army.

Home Beautification

(By Elizabeth Homes in the Jackson County Farm Bureau News.)

Since the home is given a distinctive place in the Farm Bureau organization, we do well to stop and consider the possibilities which lie undeveloped in the home, for greater usefulness, convenience and attractiveness.

Is your home so arranged that its activities may be performed without waste of strength and time? Let us sit down and study the house in which we are living and see if it can be improved in any way. Is it convenient? Is it attractive? If so, why? Is there anything we can improve or must we submit?

If the present arrangement is not desirable, if it is not the best adaptation of space to the family's needs, then set about to correct it, if possible. And with the change, the upheaval, the weeding out, endeavor to make the home more attractive, the common-place more beautiful.

I have in mind a delightful illustration of what can be done along this line. In this instance a woman, with true feminine aptitude for the beautiful, found self-expression in planning and working, with help, of course, to make her home a truly beautiful home. She began with the inside. The old house was surprised to find itself with a bathroom, a modern kitchen, with sink and running water; also many other useful and labor saving devices. Every room was transformed to bring out its best usefulness and attractiveness.

And this was not all. The outside received its share of attention. After water power was developed, the front and side yards were plowed up, and soon in place of the weeds and fox-tail was a smooth green lawn, with flowers bordering the paths. Morning glories and nasturtiums were trained upon the front fence, shrubs were planted with the flowers along the side fences, and a rose garden on one side presented an attractive sight. The objectionable old woodshed was covered over with vines, so that it added a picturesque touch. Altogether the change was so manifest that it proved an inspiration and delight to others.

Perhaps in some cases where the water supply is limited such extensive developments would not be possible. But, no doubt in each and every home in Jackson county there is much that can be done in the way of improvement and beautification.

There are so many things in the average home which have no beauty, according to the best standards. Perhaps they are retained to fill some vacant space. It is better to have a vacant space than an ugly object. Nothing is more inartistic than a crowded room. A room with a few good things in it is far more beautiful than a room which looks crowded. Nothing should appear which has not a distinct use or a marked beauty. The impression of crowding is especially emphasized if the walls are full. So much depends on the hanging of a picture, the placing of a vase or a bit of statuary; the general adaptability of the furniture.

The Home Study Tour presents a splendid opportunity for co-operation, exchange of ideas, and dissemination, generally, of all useful house-keeping knowledge. Really seeing what others have done and are doing, suggests such possibilities right in our own home, both inside and out.

Household Accounts Aid Wiser Spending

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, March 18.—Household accounts on a family-made budget, replacing the old wife-allowance system, are first-aids in promoting the health, education, pleasures and savings of the family, explained Miss A. Grace Johnson, professor of house administration, to the college press bulletin man.

"The housewife should not be given an allowance," she asserted. "It tends either to niggardliness or wastefulness. If too small supplies will be bought on credit, and if too large it will generally be spent anyway for fear it may be reduced next month."

The whole family is to cooperate in making up the budget for family supplies. The wife is the senior partner because women buy—

48.8 per cent of all family supplies, and have a voice in buying 23 per cent more;
48 per cent drugs;
96 per cent dry goods;
87 per cent raw and market foods;
48.5 per cent hardware and house furnishings.

Knowing the entire income and the family requirements makes the wife a wiser and more careful purchaser.

Few records are kept at present and much is wasted in the buying. No one knows how and where the money was spent, tho all know that it has gone.

Not low income but misspent income is frequently the cause of low standards of living. Financial and household mismanagement is the rock on which many families are wrecked.
