DEATH RESULTED FROM APPOPLEXY

Andrew McQuilkin died Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock after an extended illness due to cerebral hemorrhage. Mr. McQuilkin was a traveling salesman with headquarters at Waterloo, Iowa, and was stricken with apoplexy several weeks ago. His wife, Mrs. Julia McQuilkin, who owns an orchard on Ashland street, was called to his bedside, and about three weeks ago she returned to her home, accompanied by her husband. The change, however, failed to be beneficial, and death finally resulted.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday afternoon from the Masonic temple, conducted by the members of the order, and interment will be made in Mountain View cemetery. Beside his wife Mr. McQuilkin is survived by a son, S. Dent McQuilkin of Billings, Mont., who will arrive here for his father's funeral.

The Social Realm

Anita Stewart in "Virtuous Wives."

In a story that ranks as the year's greatest work of fiction, and with a supporting cast possessing names that read like a benefit performance, Miss Anita Stewart returns to the ranks of screen stars at the Vining tomorrow and Thursday in "Virtuous Wives," adapted from the book of that title by Owen Johnson, as the first of her new super-productions made by her own company.

Miss Stewart plays the part of Amy Forrester, whose domestic troubles as the wife of Andrew Forrester, a social Bolshevik, have provided thousands of women with word pictures of their own personal wifely problems.

Local theatre-goers, who have read the book, or the story as it was published serially in one of the leading national magazines, will find that the film production keeps close, in the action, to the various situations in the development of the printed version.

Mrs. Hopper has the part of Irma Delabarre, a society leader, described as a "lily of beauty with pollen of deadly poison"; Conway Tearle plays opposite Miss Stewart as her husband, Andrew Forrester; William Boyd impersonates the character of Monte Bracken, a social "crocodile," and Edwin Arden is seen in the role of Maurice Delabarre, Irma's husband, who tries to apply the ideas of the last generation to the conduct and principles of modern society.

It is a super-production for married folks and those who expect to be married.

PREACHERS TO HELP

SELL VICTORY BONDS

Seventeen thousand Methodist preachers are to help sell Victory Liberty bonds.

The entire Methodist centenary campaign organization, with area offices in 20 cities, designed to put over its own centenary \$105,000,000 drive, is turned over to the government for the Victory loan.

Methodist minute men to the tune of 60,000, more than the number of original four-minute men, will speak daily for the Victory loan, while a special Liberty loan edition will be issued of Missiles, the Methodist minute men's organ.

Church services or centenary gatherings are to be open for the presentation of bond sales. No conflicting conferences are to be held by Methodists and the Methodist financial drive was postponed to the 10-day period of May 18-28.

CONTRACTS LET IN APRIL FOR HIGHWAY

County Judge Gardner, County Commissioners Owen and Owens and W. H. Gore, who was chairman of the house good roads committee in the recent legislature, arrived home Friday evening from Portland quite well pleased with their conferences with the state highway commission and government forestry and post road officials, and with the utmost confidence that government and state aid will be forthcoming for the construction of a highway between Medford and Eagle Point, and another highway from Jacksonville to the Blue Ledge mine.

According to the Medford Tribune, the visit of the Jackson county delegation omens for the speedy construction of the Pacific highway work in the county already planned and for the proposed new highways.

One of the main purposes of the visit was to take up again with the state highway commission the new highway construction work already

approved by the commission in the absence from the state of Simon Benson, the chairman of that body. With Mr. Benson present and giving his unqualified endorsement the commission reaffirmed its decision on Jackson county work.

Then the commission announced that it would let the contract for the construction of the new highway section between Central Point and the Gold Hill bridge on April 15, and that as soon as the weather permitted the work of paving the highway over the Siskiyou would be commenced. Bids for grading and paving of the highway between Ashland and the foot of the Siskiyou would soon be called for, it was also announced, and further that soon would be issued a call for proposals for grading construction of the highway between Ashland and Klamath Falls over Green Spring mountain, and that the Jenny creek section, which is the hardest part of this road, will be undertaken first and would be completed this year.

The Jackson county men then put to the state highway commission and Engineer L. I. Hewes of the forestry service, in informal conferences the two proposals for seeking state and government aid in constructing the proposed Eagle Point and the Blue Ledge roads as post roads. The proposal for the Medford to Eagle Point road was for a 16-foot highway with two feet on the outside of macadam, the county to pay 25 percent of the cost, the state 25 percent and the government 50 percent.

The Blue Ledge highway proposal of which the cost is estimated at \$54,000, provides for the sharing of the cost of construction between county, state and government on the same basis as the Eagle Point road.

While the highway commission has taken no formal action as yet on the two proposals its members informally expressed their approval, and Engineer Hewes not only regarded the proposals with favor but stated that there was no doubt of the government aid being forthcoming if the highway commission endorsed the projects.

Furthermore, a telegram was received by the commission Friday with regard to the Medford to Prospect section of the Crater Lake road, saying that the government bureau of public roads is willing to do its part if the project is designated by the state highway commission.

Mrs. C. V. Beeler left this week for Jefferson City and Portland where she will visit for a time, after which she will continue to Denver, Colo., to see her daughter, who resides there. During Mrs. Beeler's absence her daughter, Mrs. Merle Robison, and husband will occupy her house on the Boulevard.

Industrial Worker in Ashland Today

Mrs. Ben C. Ely, field worker for the Associated Industries of Oregon, arrived in Ashland today. Mrs. Ely is preaching the gospel of buying everything manufactured, made or grown in Oregon, if price and quality are equal, and is making a tour of the state to interest the formation of a Home Industry League in the various cities she visits.

In speaking of her work along the lines of the Associated Industries of Oregon Mrs. Ely says: "Thousands of dollars are being sent out of the state today to buy goods that are



far better made in Oregon. The women of Oregon do 80 per cent of the buying, and the building up of the state industrial life is very largely in their hands."

Mrs. Ely feels that the men and women of Oregon are not familiar with what is manufactured in their own state. They are quite familiar with what the large mail order houses of the east carry, but do not study to find out whether they can buy as cheaply the things manufactured in their own state.

"Oregon has such wonderful possibilities, so many natural resources not even touched," Mrs. Ely remarked further. "What we want to do is to wake up the people to the absolute necessity of building up Oregon first, and the only way that can be done is to co-operate."

Mrs. Ely hopes to meet the women of this city and go over the matter with them as to the best way to start the work here. A Home Industry League has been formed in Medford, the members of whom are desirous of co-operating in the work with Ashland.
