**GAVE FINE TALK ON CENTENARY MOVEMENT**  
Dr. H. W. Lewis, one of the organizers of the 75,000 Methodist 5-minute men of America, spoke in the local Methodist church last Tuesday evening on the movement that is occupying the minds of Methodism the world over today. He gave a wonderful talk on the Centenary Movement deserving a much larger audience than turned out to hear him. While deploring the atrocities of the Germans over which the country was horror-stricken for four years, he stated that the indifference of Americans to the real needs of the world has done as much against the good of humanity, and that men with property should line themselves with God thru their gifts. Dr. Lewis is one of the best all-around authorities on the \$105,000,000 Methodist Centenary Movement in this section of the country.

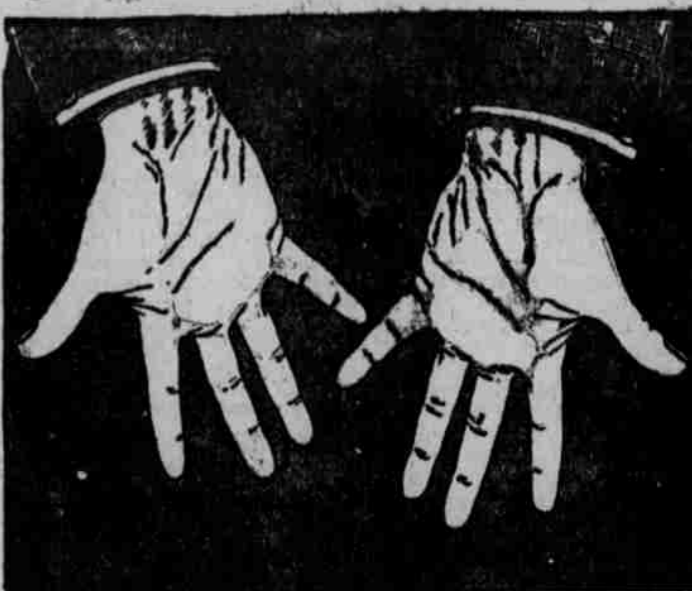

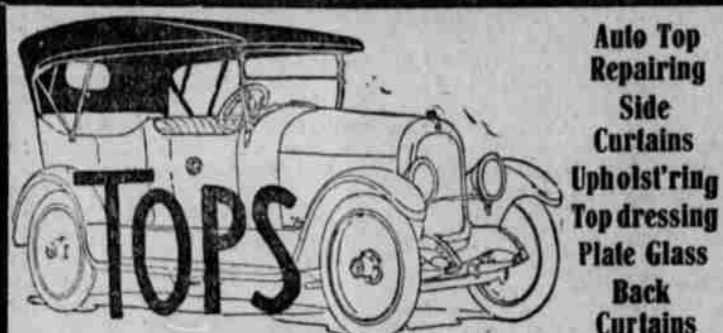
Horace Stanley had a phone message from his mother, Mrs. F. A. Stanley of Portland, who is rejoicing over the news of her son's return from over seas.
