All automobile groups are asked to bring along well filled lunch baskets, and lunch will be eaten picnic style. Coffee will be served free to all having cups and spoons with them. The ladies of Phoenix will be hostesses the first day and serve the coffee in Barnum's grove, while the second day the Greater Medford Club will serve coffee under the fine oaks near Carpenter's home. An exhibition of different types of canning outfits and canned products will be shown both days during the noon hour.

TUNGSTEN DEPOSIT IS NEAR GOLD HILL

"The only deposit of tungsten in Oregon, so far as known, is two miles north of Gold Hill on the Rogue river. Three veins were found five inches wide. It is the shellite variety. During the war it was worth \$89 a unit, but now the price has dropped to \$18. When it was worth \$3 a pound during the war it was worth going after," says M. S. Johnson, hardware dealer of Gold Hill. "There is a quicksilver mine near us which produces two flasks a day, each flask weighing 76 pounds net. A flask was worth \$250 during the war, but is now down to \$75."—Oregonian.

MANY YOUNG PEOPLE AT E. L. RALLIES

More than 5,000 young people representing every community in the northwest attended the 15 rallies of chapter delegates of the Epworth league for the purpose of mobilizing Epworth league sentiment behind the \$105,000,000 Methodist centenary for rebuilding the world.

"Two hundred and sixty chapters out of 326 were represented," said Dr. J. Edgar Purdy, Epworth league secretary for the northwest, upon his return to Portland.

"There was a surprisingly high percentage of young people present, and we must await the actual campaign week, May 18 to 25, to see what definite results they achieve," he said.

11 COUNTIES MAKE NO TAX PAYMENTS

Up to the present time the office of State Treasurer Hoff has received from the several counties of the state a total of \$1,184,991.50 in state taxes. Eleven counties—Crook, Curry, Klamath, Malheur, Marion, Morrow, Polk, Tillamook, Umatilla, Wasco and Wheeler have not yet turned in any tax money. The Southern counties from which taxes have been received are: Jackson, \$45,531; Josephine, \$12,732.20; Douglas, \$40,168.
