## METHODIST DRIVE FOR WORLD WORK BEGINS MAY 18

Thousands Take Part in \$105,000,000 Campaign.

\$2,664,000 FROM NORTHWEST

Greatest Religious Effort Ever Concealed is Planned to Put Christianity Before Every Living Being in World in Five Years.

On May 18 Methodism of the world will open its campaign for \$105,000,000 in seven days. Thousands upon thousands of Methodist ministers and laymen have been mobilized and will jump into the fight at the "zero" hour.

Ten thousand recruits will go "over the top" in the Northwest and an intensive financial campaign, such as has never been known in the history of the church, will be waged with the rebuilding of the world the sole aim in view.

The Portland area, which includes a large part of Oregon, Washington and northern Idaho, has been given a quota of \$2,664,000 for the ensuing five years. This money is to be used in the greatest program of a religion of service the world has ever known. It will be used in meeting the challenge which church leaders say has been laid at the door of Methodism.

**How Money Will Be Spent.**  
The \$105,000,000 to be raised under the Methodist Centenary has already been partly spent in advance. The great Methodist mission ship, leaving for Europe with \$3,000,000,000 worth of portable houses, tractors, plows and seeds, is an instance of how Europe's share of the gigantic religious fund is to be expended.

Forty million dollars is to be spent on the home programme on nearly 10,000 different projects. For instance, the rural church in America is to receive \$11,000,000 to be spent on a gigantic programme of helping and erecting community country churches, mainly seven days a week churches. Some of these churches will have swimming pools and be equipped somewhat on the lines of Y. M. C. A.'s. Pastors will be engaged who are experts. The church will be made the center of rural activities in that center. Three thousand projects of that kind are enumerated in the centenary budget. Great city community churches, work among the highlanders of the South, work among the Mormons, the Indians, the Orientals of the Pacific Coast, industrial groups, etc., make up the total of \$40,000,000.

A similar sum is to be expended in the foreign field, divided among the countries of the world. Educational work, medical work with hospitals and dispensaries, with evangelistic work in the manner in which this money will go. There are 1,200,000,000 illiterate people in the world and 700,000,000 who go hungry every night. These are the centenary hopes to aid.

The remaining \$25,000,000 is to be spent equally in this country and in Europe on direct war reconstruction work. In this class comes the famous mission ship. Boys will be aided to college if they have a religious career in view. Camp work will be carried on and other active assistance rendered.

Frank C. Jackson is the campaign director in the Northwest. The headquarters are at Portland. The Northwest quota is \$2,664,000. Dr. Charles A. Bowen and Dr. A. L. Howarth are secretary and associate secretary respectively of the centenary movement in the northwest.

**VAST SUM TO BE SPENT ON HOSPITALS**  
Forty-five Hospitals and 24 Dispensaries to Rise From Centenary.

To alleviate human suffering and cure disease through the extension of its great system of hospital centers now 26 in number, in countries where groups of millions of people are without adequate medical attention, the board of foreign missions of the Methodist Episcopal church will spend \$2,288,624 in building 45 more hospitals and twenty-four dispensaries in foreign countries as a result of the Methodist Centenary movement to raise \$105,000,000 for world reconstruction.

This is an entirely separate venture from that of the 48 hospitals maintained by the Methodist Episcopal church in America through which pass annually over 90,000 patients. The property value of these institutions, coupled with their endowments, is \$15,626,343. In capacity they range from the Wesley Memorial Hospital in Chicago, caring yearly for about 7,000 cases, down to the Sunnyside Methodist Sanitarium for Tuberculosis at Silver City, N. M., accommodating seventy-five patients yearly.

The church has also just established a medical department to guard the health of its missionary workers.

Besides 45 hospitals and 24 dispensaries, the Board will erect other buildings and doctors' residences, the whole costing \$1,513,030. It will draw into the service 59 more missionary physicians and surgeons, 32 missionary nurses, and 166 native doctors, nurses and other medical attendants, the budget for staff and maintenance being \$774,694. The total for both buildings and staff is \$2,288,624.

## Roads Opening Up In Coos County
