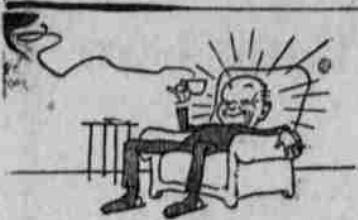


World To Start On Good Roads Program

WASHINGTON.—Soon after the armistice was signed, the U. S. department of labor distributed 200,000 posters bearing such messages as, "Good Roads! Build them now and see how quickly good times will roll down the roads," and "Build now the National, State and County Roads that are needed."

ing will be but a start toward nationwide work now so much needed. Reports received by the department show that highway construction as an immediate means of absorbing labor has been undertaken in foreign countries on a scale much greater than that represented in the program of the U. S. government. If comparative area and population are taken into consideration.

A comparison of the appropriations of England and France with those of this country is of interest. While congress has made available \$80,000,000 for expenditure in 1919 and a total of \$275,000,000 up to and including the fiscal year of 1913 this money will be available on all or any part of the 2,500,000 miles of rural highways in the United States. Against this figure, France is concentrating its fund of \$152,000,000 on 65,000 miles of national highways of which a large percentage has already been improved, leaving the departments and sub-departments to carry on the work in the less important systems. The total road mileage in England is 150,000 miles and aside from the \$50,000,000 appropriated by the national government, at least as much more will be set aside by shires and municipalities.

In the matter of hard surfaced highways, both France and England are far ahead of this country in road building as a result of continued government expenditures on national systems while Prussia alone had 75,000 miles of hard surfaced roads previous to its entry into the war. In proportion to size, the United States would need 1,611,914 miles of hard surfaced ways to rest on a parity with Prussia, altho close estimates show that only one-quarter of one per cent or 6,250 miles of our highways are hard surfaced at the present time.

Estimates prepared by engineering authorities show that the United States could well afford to spend \$1,250,000,000 on a hard surfaced system of 50,000 miles which could be so located as to serve directly 46 per cent of all of the counties of the United States while 41 per cent of all the others would be directly adjacent to it. In other words, 87 per cent of the total population would be touched with reasonable directness. At an annual expenditure of \$100,000,000 the fundamental system would be completed in 12 1/2 years.

Labor Conditions Thruout the State

Demand for Farm Labor Exceeds Supply.

The demand for farm help still exceeds the supply that is available at this time. There are several calls this week for milters at wages ranging from \$75 to \$100 per month with room and board for experienced men. While no calls have yet been received for workers in the harvest fields, the cutting of alfalfa is just beginning in the eastern part of the state and haying in the Willamette valley will be in full swing in about ten days from today with wages running from \$3 to \$5 per day. While the U. S. employment service is prepared to go the limit in an effort to supply farm help, it earnestly hopes that those who are looking for hay and harvest hands will send in their orders in plenty of time so that emergency calls at the last minute may be eliminated. Make up your orders NOW for the labor you need in the hay and harvest fields and send them in.

Shipyards Want Help.

There is still a demand for help in the shipyards, especially unskilled men. The U. S. Employment Service today has places for about 300 men as boiler-ups at \$4.64 per day, and can also place a few general helpers and laborers. Two of these yards are at Portland and one at Vancouver. There is no general demand for skilled mechanics in the yards at this time.

Light Demand for Office Help.

It is found by going over the records that there is at least one line of employment where the supply exceeds the demand. While the U. S.

Employment Service operates a professional and technical division and makes a special effort to place office help, there are many more applicants than positions in professional, technical, clerical and kindred lines just now. There is some demand for male stenographers, however, at from \$100 to \$125 per month.

Help Wanted in Lumber Mills and Woods.

Little change has taken place in this line of employment during the past week. Orders are on file with the U. S. Employment Service for 200 men to work in the mills and woods, the wage rate for common laborers being \$4, and that for hook-tenders, high climbers and a few others going as high as \$8 per day.

Positions Found for Boys.

Work for boys is plentiful today and the Junior Section of the U. S. Employment Service is taking special pains to place boys in profitable employment wherever possible. Last week this department alone placed 44 boys in positions paying on an average \$50 per month. These were distributed in factories, stores, offices and hotels, a few accepting positions as messengers and elevator boys. Boys seeking employment thru this section must be more than 16 years old, or, if under that age, must secure a permit to work before registering.

Women and Girls Wanted to Pick Berries.

The Women's Division of the U. S. Employment Service has openings this week for 2,000 women and girls in the strawberry fields. The price established for picking is 11 to 13 cents per carrier of six boxes. In most cases the growers supply shelter for pickers. An order has also been placed for 1400 loganberry pickers, altho the harvesting of this fruit will not begin for three or four weeks. However the Superintendent of the Women's Division is making extra efforts to encourage women and girls who contemplate going to the berry fields to register at the office in the Lewis Bldg., Corner Fourth and Oak, with the least possible delay.
