CHILDREN WILL HAVE NEW PLAYGROUNDS

The Civic Club at its last meeting before adjourning for the year, voted a sum of money for the equipment of this pleasure resort for the children and new attractions will be secured in a short time. ILLINOIS IS FIRST TO RATIFY SUFFRAGE

The Illinois legislature has passed a resolution ratifying the federal woman suffrage amendment. Illinois is the first state to ratify the amendment. The Wisconsin legislature Tuesday ratified the federal woman's suffrage amendment.

Many Decisions As To Governor Case

The supreme court has handed down a variety of decisions on the Oregon governor case. Chief Justice McBride held that Governor Olcott may serve the entire term of four years and appoint a secretary of state. Justice Harris held that Olcott may retain the office of governor for two years, or until the next general election. Justice Benson concurred with Justice Harris and both agreed that Benson could name the secretary of state.

Justices Bennett and Burnett refused to decide the case, holding that mandamus proceedings did not require the supreme court to decide it. Justice Johns decided that Olcott is governor in fact to serve out the late Governor Withycombs' unexpired term, but did not render an opinion as to the appointment of a secretary of state.

Governor Olcott said he would consider the opinion carefully before deciding what he will do.

No. 2—In a letter received from a gentleman in Indiana he states he has \$10,000 capital to invest in any of the following lines: General store, garage, small manufacturing plant or some attractive new business.

No. 4—A sash and door factory, which also does turning and cabinet work, located in the State of Washington, wishes to move to a desirable location in Oregon. Machinery and stock valued at \$15,000. Seeks a working capital of \$10,000 but a lesser amount under favorable circumstances might be acceptable.

No. 5—A Chicago party has \$10,000 for investment within a very short time. Desires a farm of 160 acres, modern improvements and orchard in bearing. Prefers Willamette Valley or Dufur Valley. Prefers to make initial payment of \$6,000 rather than \$10,000.

No. 6—An inquiry has been received from a party in Wyoming desiring to purchase two or three thousand acres of logged-off land between Cascade and Coast ranges, to be used in connection with the raising of sheep.

No. 7—This office has had considerable correspondence with a Colonization Society, with headquarters in the east. This inquiry comes from a very substantial organization. This company requires large tracts of land which must hold up under a most thorough investigation, the cost of such investigation to be borne by the

owners of the land, if the preliminary negotiations are mutually satisfactory.

No. 9—Party from Wisconsin wishes to rent or lease a partly improved place of about 40 acres or less, with good orchard for family use, with privilege of buying later on if same is satisfactory. Prefers southwestern Oregon. Distance from railroad or town of no great importance.

No. 10—Wanted, a first class farm of 80 to 100 acres preferably in the Valley territory, which may be utilized as a breeding place for thoroughbred pigs.

No. 12—North Dakota party has about \$5,000 to invest in dairy or walnut farm within six miles of a

good high school, preferably in Yamhill River Valley. Wants a place large enough to keep fifteen cows.

No. 13—Two brothers in California, with \$5,000 capital each, would like to rent or buy either a stock, mixed or dairy farm in Oregon, partly improved. Fruit not wanted.

No. 14—Man from Minnesota, with \$6,000 for investment, wishes to engage in poultry and bee keeping and fruit and berry raising near a city with good educational advantages. Small place preferred.

No. 15—Michigan farmer, with \$10,000 capital, writes he is interested in purchasing a ranch in Eastern Oregon. Wishes advice regarding farm values, prices of livestock, sheep and hogs, living conditions, schools, etc.

No. 17—Agent in Toronto, Canada, wishes information as to farms and farm lands for rent or for sale, particularly as he may be able to interest others. Would also like to get in touch with shippers of fruit, potatoes and lumber, who desire to extend their business.
