WORLD DEMAND FOR WOOL INCREASES

According to the weekly letter of the National Wool Warehouse and Storage Co., the wool markets indicate a general strength of the staple the world over. Good wools are in strong demand everywhere. London prices are making new records and the cancellation of the contract with the British government for large quantities of Australian wool is expected to benefit the American flockmaster.

There is a great future for wool growing and every western farm should have its flock of sheep.

CAPITAL AND A LIVING WAGE

(Montrose, Mo., Tidings.)

A bright gentleman remarked the other day that capital was entitled to a living wage.

Some types of men may not think so; but the common sense of the nation is overwhelmingly back of the proposition that employers must prosper if employees are to do so.

Some combinations of capital make more than a living wage; but the super-prosperity that they can enforce for themselves is no criterion by which to judge the average business man and average manufacturer.

We've known of business that for many years did not prosper as well as their employees; indeed, the doggedness of capital sometimes keeps a business going for years when the returns are slight.

The square deal of capital toward labor is no more necessary than the square deal of labor toward capital. If one side is merely going to operate on the basis of squeezing as much as possible out of the other, then there is going to be perpetual trouble.

Here is a good chance for the application of the golden rule.

AN I. W. W. REPUBLIC NEXT DOOR, WATCH OUT AT HOME

It is not generally known but there has been erected on territory adjoining our country a full-fledged experiment in I. W. W. syndicalism.

It is President Alvarados overthrow of constitutional guarantees and forcible seizure of government of the State of Yucatan.

Backed by an I. W. W. army, the revolutionary confederation has overthrown church and state middle class and capitalist, industries and property.

The I. W. W. leaders have secured adoption of our entire legislative program and its enactment by offering free military service in exchange.

Purely socialistic theories are now the fundamental laws of Yucatan; and the I. W. W. are ruling class, opposition meaning death or expulsion.

The Alvaradi revolution was followed by destruction of churches and public property, including archives and records and registers of marriage.

The property classes were at once properly reduced and duly subjugated, with railroads, docks and warehouses, telephones and banks "democratized."

Legislation is all by decrees of Alvarado and his I. W. W. council of state, some 2000 laws promulgated as by Lenin and Trotsky in Russia.

They range all the way from abolishing all need of securing divorce to education of children and all teachers must become socialist propagandists.

It is made the duty of school teachers to watch and inform on planters who are reactionaries, and socialist books are placed in all libraries.

Every means is taken to expound only the most advanced revolutionary political thought, making warfare on property, state, church and family.

Here are some of the slogans of the I. W. W. regime, whose political wariness is, "Throw away your spade and get a gun:—

"Whether God will it or not, the Revolution shall go forward."

"The Country before one's life; the Revolution before God."

"Without God and without Masters, here is the supreme aspiration of free men."

"The sacramental character of marriage is contrary to the spirit of constitutionalism."

Free press and free speech are abolished, the local newspapers being seized and converted into organs of the government for the revolution.

Private banks are abolished and their stockholders and depositors are ruined and reduced to penury.

Resources of banks are confiscated, worthless paper money substituted for their coin and securities. Alvarado says: "We need the money."

To get industrial justice workers are advised: "The man who wears shoes and collar and has property got them by your labor. Take back your own."

strikers are protected by law and employers are forbidden to employ others or resume work until the strike is over.

In December last a pure agrarian law was enacted, reciting: Hereafter no one is exclusive owner of land any more than he can be of light or air."

Owners of property who are opposed to Alvarado are reduced to submission and poverty by confiscation of same thru taxation.

The government seizes all crops and markets them for the planters, making returns less cost of the "Reguladoras," or public marketing.

Like the railroads under government operation, the planters must sell off live stock to make up deficits for high wages and cost of operation.

In 1918 at the dictation of the shophands railroad tariffs were doubled to provide extra wages, and to get cars shippers must bribe the train crews.

Crops for export like hemp and sisal are held to be public property and planters must run their farms under direction of workmen's soviet rule.

There is complete and arbitrary government for a particular class and nationalization of railroads, wire communication, shipping and banking.

The uneducated natives are taught to look upon every employer and the wage-payer of any class as their natural enemies and robbers of labor.

The lists of crimes, assassinations and arson are as wide as the state and increasing daily, and all who can get away are leaving Yucatan.

The I. W. W. revolution in Yucatan was established thru agitation by propagandists and radicals from this country and Mexico in German pay.
