PROGRESSIVE AND CONSTRUCTIVE POLICIES NEEDED NOW

The Anti-Trust laws are to be overhauled at the next session of congress. That is one thing sadly needed if we are to have permanent prosperity in our country.

Some of these laws are dead letters, some are an unprofitable jumble of half-baked legislation and require revision to bring them up to the needs of the times.

What does the nation need most. The highest possible efficiency in production and distribution in the coming peace times as well as we needed it in war.

Production and more production. In every line is what our country and what the whole world needs as the remedy for Bolshevism which aims to paralyze production. The maximum of American production could only be attained in war times by higher co-ordination of forces and setting aside laws against intelligent and logical co-operation. The present Federal Trade Commission is neither a judicial nor a judicious body and no one can show a single instance where it has done anything but hamper industry.

It has supplied the newspapers with sensational reports at the expense of industries, to increase its members and give it greater power to regulate production is folly.

It should be reconstructed on the lines of the Federal Reserve Board if it exist at all, composed of sober, balanced, experienced men, constructive and above sensationalism.

The Federal Reserve Board which is the backbone of the nation's financial and banking business, is a body of men above partisanship.

Working along sound economic lines it has averted possibility of a panic and stabilized business and industries.

Congress should place the duty of overhauling our anti-trust laws in sane hands to promote industrial expansion of our commerce.

The Federal Trade Commission has made a mess of everything it has touched and should be abolished.

Congress should help industries by enacting constructive laws to ensure beneficial industrial co-operation.

FAREWELL TO A FREE PRESS

With an illustrated cartoon weekly and two state dailies, there is to be added an official Non-Partisan league weekly in each county of North Dakota to have all official printing.

All legal and official notices in the county are to appear in the organ owned by the league, and this official paper is to be guaranteed \$6,000 patronage a year.

The fighting political machine with abundant funds and means of publicity under its control is to absolutely dominate North Dakota politics. It is recalled that Single Taxers and Socialist parties have in the past stood for state published newspapers.

DISCONTINUE THIS NUISANCE

Next to the tax on tea in Revolutionary days, the present so-called luxury taxes and special 5 per cent tax on candy, are probably the most unpopular taxes ever collected in this country.

Demand seems to be universal that these "nagging" taxes as they are called, be done away with at once.

The public is ready to pay taxes to the necessary limit but it does not want to be harassed by such

taxes as these.

Collect the tax money necessary, in legitimate ways, but discontinue this nuisance.

PROPRIETARY STAMPS MUST BE CANCELLED

Dealers are warned in a statement issued by the Bureau of Internal Revenue, that proprietary stamps by means of which the tax on toilet and medicinal articles is collected, must be cancelled when the article is sold. Recently there have been received by the Bureau numerous uncanceled stamps taken from taxable articles purchased at drug stores.

Regulation 51, relating to the collection of the tax on toilet and medicinal articles, provides that each stamp affixed to a taxable article must be cancelled in such manner as to prevent its further use. "If possible," the regulation states, "the stamp should be affixed to the outside of the package or container of the taxed commodity so that upon opening the same the stamp will be destroyed. The initial or name of the vendor, together with the date when the stamp was affixed or cancelled, must appear on the cancelled stamp."

This provision, the Bureau states, will be strictly enforced.

The penalty for making use of a stamp to denote the tax imposed without cancelling the stamp is a fine of not more than \$100.00.

LARGEST CROP OF

WHEAT IN HISTORY

A wheat production of 1,236,000,000 bushels this year combining the winter wheat and spring wheat crop was forecast today by the department of agriculture from the condition of the crops June 1.

Winter wheat production is forecast at 893,000,000 bushels, compared with 899,915,000 bushels forecast last month, making it the largest ever grown. Condition of winter wheat was 94.9 per cent of a normal, compared with 100.5 last month and 82.8 last year.

Spring wheat production is forecast at 343,000,000 bushels, compared with last year's production of 359,000,000 bushels. This is also a record crop. Acreage this year is 22,593,000. Condition of the crop June 1, was 71.2 per cent of normal, compared with 95.2 a year ago.

Condition and production in thousands of bushels by important producing states, include:

Winter wheat—Washington, 97 and 27,061.

Oregon—96 and 18,432.

Spring wheat—Washington 90 and 30,714.

ARE FINDING CROP VALUE OF OREGON SOIL TYPES

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, June 20.—Soil surveys to determine the crop relations and tillage qualities of Oregon farm lands will be conducted in two additional counties this summer—Multnomah and Josephine. The surveys will be made by the agricultural college and the U. S. bureau of soils, under direction of W. L. Powers, head of the soils department at the college.

The surveys give a complete scientific record of all leading soil types present in the counties. Two counties have already been surveyed, and it is the intention of the government and the college to continue the work of soil surveys until all agricultural counties of the state have been examined, their soils classified and their qualities recorded.

Field experimental plots are maintained to determine the most profitable crops for the different soil types and the best cultural and fertilizer systems for each type.

Soil water investigations are conducted in Josephine, Klamath, Deschutes and Harney counties by field agents.

Demand for men trained in soils and irrigation work is much greater than ever before, says Prof. Powers.

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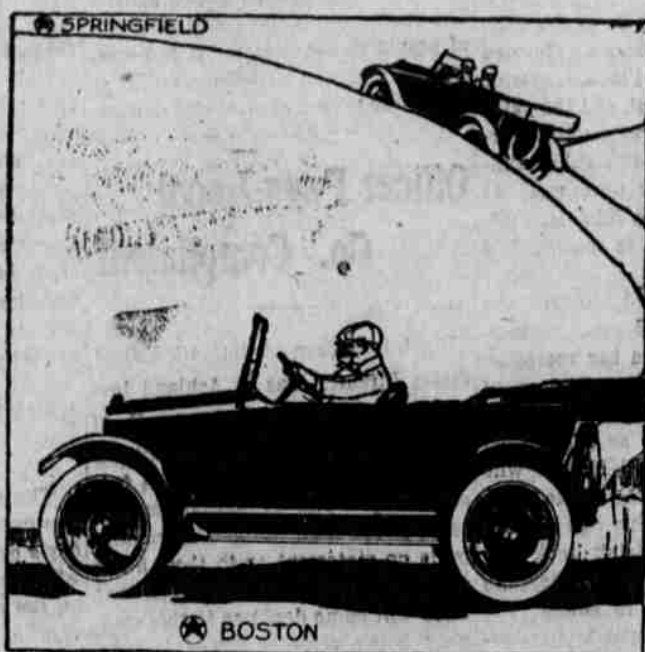
