W. C. C. S. HOST TO

TWO MILLION SAILORS

Two million sailors a month have been enjoying the hospitality and friendship offered in the clubs of the War Camp Community Service on the Atlantic, Pacific, Gulf and Great Lakes coasts.

The insignia of the W. C. C. S.—the red circle of hospitality surrounding the conventional symbol of the fortified camp—is familiar now to everyone who has visited any of the camp cities, but few outside the organization realize the marvelous extent to which community hospitality has been developed, not only in the continental United States but in Hawaii and Porto Rico as well.

Take the provision made for the Navy men alone. A summary recently compiled at national headquarters shows some astonishing figures.

There are 154 clubs in the United States for the men in blue. There are 196 canteens, and 96 dormitories with 8,823 beds for the "gobs" whose enjoyment of shore leave is greatly heightened by a chance to enjoy different surroundings for a night.

The cost of construction, and equipping these centres of hospitality amounted to \$378,549.98, every cent of it the gift of the American people, who wished to provide a touch of home welcome for their sons called away to the colors and for their neighbors' sons.

The annual payroll cost for club employees was kept down to the low figure of \$505,554.86, which was possible only because of the wholehearted co-operation of volunteer workers, who cooked, swept, cleaned, entertained—did everything that could help comfort or entertain the uniformed guests. The annual maintenance cost, less the income from meals served at nominal figure, beds supplied at cost, and the like, was \$250,637.12.

But even these figures do not give the full measure of the work. They refer only to clubs and canteens which are the property exclusively of War Camp Community Service. In most of the cities and towns near naval stations, local organizations, such as clubs, lodges, fraternal and religious bodies, chambers of commerce and churches have affiliated their facilities with those of the W. C. C. S., so that the total number of clubs and canteens operated by the War Camp Community Service rises to the impressive figure of 528, of which 57 are for colored sailors. There are 276 which operate canteens and 224 which have dormitories, totaling 18,655 beds.

Radiating from these club centres, W. C. C. S. operates a recreational program in each community in which all other existing organizations co-operate. Trained community organizers have provided home dinners, dances, socials, smokers, picnics, dramatics, automobile rides, week-end parties, receptions, lawn parties, beach parties and concerts. It has arranged outdoor sports, pageants, festivals, parades, athletic meets, baseball and football games, carnivals, block parties, union church services, tennis tournaments and mountain climbing expeditions. Entertainers have been provided for base hospitals.

Consistent and successful effort has been made to provide eating and sleeping accommodations for relatives of sailors and marines and to provide employment for wives of men in service. Teachers of French and other subjects have been obtained.

Considerable success also has attended the W. C. C. S. thru its "square deal for men in uniform" movement, in stopping overcharges and extortion.

AMERICAN LEGION ASKED TO HELP PLACE SOLDIERS

In order to provide employment for discharged service men who are searching for work especially in congested centers of population, Colonel Arthur Woods, assistant to the Secretary of War, asks the American Legion, the national organization of American veterans of the war, to cooperate with his group of officers from the Public Works Section to urge the immediate undertaking of \$3,000,000,000 worth of public works pending in this country.

Thru Dr. Richard Derby, head of the national re-employment bureau of the Legion, instructions will be issued to state branches and Local Posts throughout the country to communicate at once with Colonel Woods' traveling officers, to make arrangements to canvass public works projects in their sections and to impress upon state and municipal authorities the necessity for undertaking immediately as large a part of these projects as possible.

WOODLAND AND WOOD

VS. THE WOODLOT

The increased interest in private forestry, particularly with reference to farm forestry, has brought about the general acceptance of the term "woodland" or "woods" instead of the original one of "woodlot," according to the Forest Service of the United States Department of Agriculture.

A large proportion of the woodland in the eastern United States is in irregularly shaped tracts, spreading out over ridges, ravines, slopes, swamps and poor land, whereas "woodlot" carries the idea of a small sized, regularly shaped, and, in a large section of the country, fenced tract. When applied to the large or irregularly shaped tracts, it is obvious that the word inadequately describes the conditions. "Woodlot" probably originated in New England and seems fairly well established there. So long as only conditions like those in New England were considered, "wood" was accepted as adequate, but in the last few years farm forestry has been developing rapidly thruout the country.

"Woodland" and "woods" are more satisfactory, more expressive, and avoid the possibility of creating confusion in the minds of the people over most sections of the country where the word "woodlots" has never been in local use.

MOST FOREST FIRES

ARE CAUSED BY MEN

During the past five years, as shown by the records of the forest service and the state forester, there have been an average of over 2,000 fires each year. Between 65 and 75 per cent of these have been man-caused. The incendiary has averaged for the five years about 500 each year, or slightly over four every day for the four months of the fire season. The careless camper has averaged slightly lower; while the man burning brush and slashing without a permit, ranks third in the list of offenders. Over 200,000 acres within the national forests of the state were burned over during 1919, while the loss to private timber interests outside of the forests, in timber destroyed was 1,107,743,000 feet.

NOVEMBER 11 TO BE

AMERICAN LEGION DAY

November 11th, the first anniversary of the signing of the armistice, will be a day of national observance by the American Legion, the national organization of the American veterans of the great war. According to plans announced at national headquarters of the Legion, state organizations and local posts thruout the country will observe this day as American Legion Day in their own communities by meetings, parades and patriotic demonstrations.

At the same time that these local celebrations are held, delegates from state organizations and local posts will meet in the first National Convention of the American Legion at Minneapolis, to effect the permanent organization. The convention meets on November 10-11-12. By that time, it is expected that all the men now in the American Expeditionary Forces will have returned to this country so that all ex-service men and women of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps will have an opportunity to participate in the activities planned for American Legion Day, either in their own communities or at the national convention.

This will be the first opportunity for a general celebration nationally and locally by the American Legion. Efforts will be made to have at least one million men and women who have worn the uniform of the United States during the war, enrolled as members of the American Legion prior to the November demonstration. A plan will be proposed to the National Convention to set aside November 11th in the future as American Legion Day to commemorate the service of the American Army and Navy in the Great War.

LIGHTNING CAUSES

FIRES IN THE NORTH

More than 40 fires, some of which may prove serious, were started by the electrical storm which was general over the state July 23, according to a statement issued Friday by District Forester Cecil. Practically every office employee of the United States forest service is now in the field directing the army of fire fighters in national forests, and if the present warm weather continues serious consequences can be expected.

Twenty small fires were started in the Crater national forest during Wednesday's electrical storm, but the Portland office has not yet been advised as to the seriousness of these fires.

Lightning was responsible for 17

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fires within the Santiam national forest, 11 in the Detroit district and six in the Cascade district. Of the 21 fires reported Friday from the Umpqua forest, 18 were caused by the lightning.

The Herman creek and Oregon Lumber company fires in the Oregon national forest are both under control.

The fire in the western division of the Umatilla national forest which has burned over approximately 640 acres, is now under control. The forest fire situation in Washington is equally as serious as in this state, declares Director Cecil, and Forest Examiner Adam Wright left Friday night for Republic, Wash. to assist in the control of six fires which have already covered nearly 9,000 acres.

Several fires are burning in the Columbia national forest, the most serious being on the Lewis river on the western edge of the old Lewis river burn.

Twenty men are fighting an uncontrolled fire at Eight Mile creek in the Wenatchee national forest. This is a high country where the timber is valuable only for watershed protection. Another force of 70 men is working under Ranger J. E. Bruckhart on the Snoqualmie forest near Hazel, Wash.

Seattle's lake irrigation district, Jefferson county, would water 35,000 acres.
