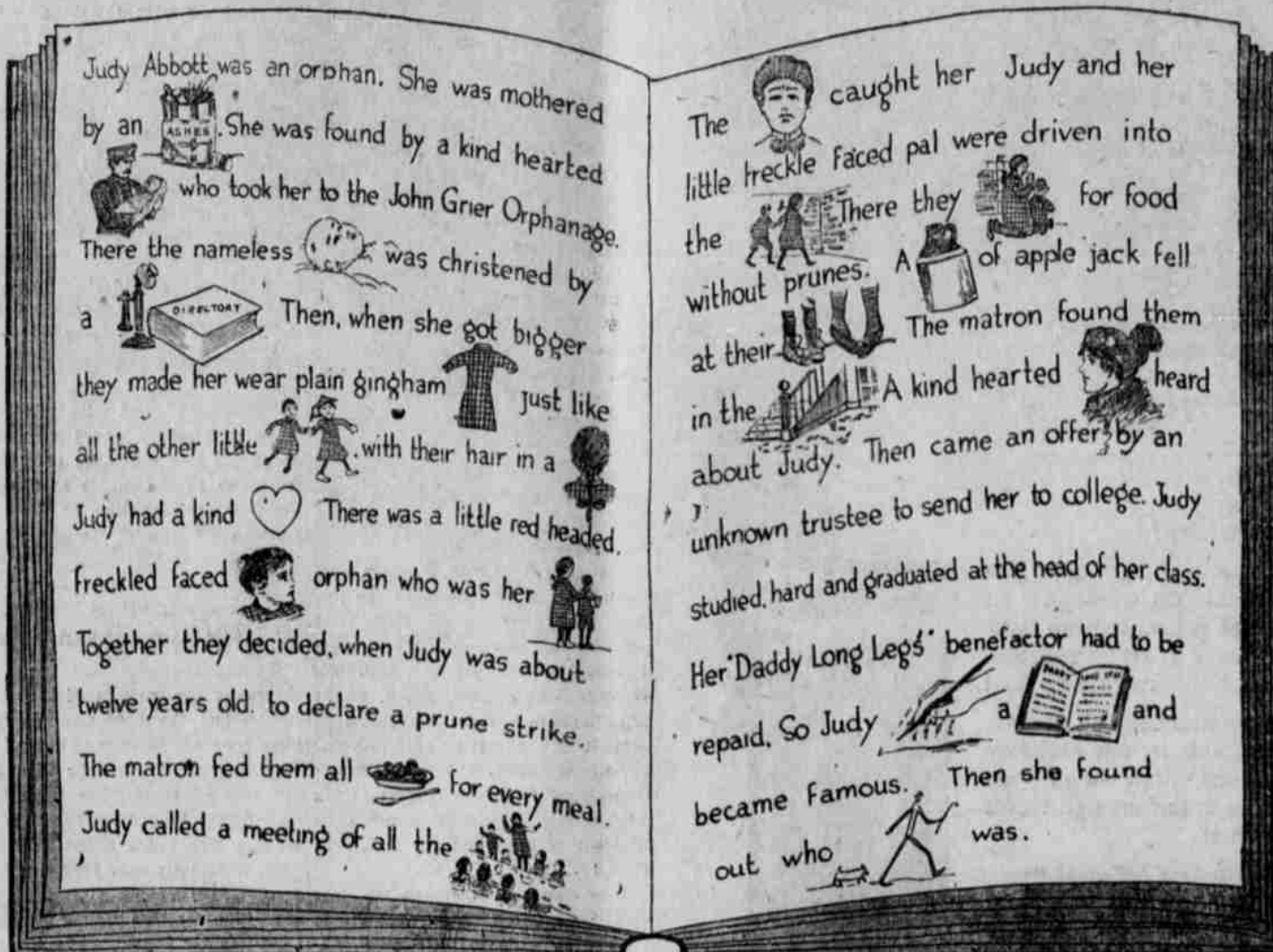

"Daddy Longlegs" New Pickford Film

The daily life of scores of orphans unfortunate enough to be living in an institution, the founder of which obtained his ideas of discipline at a penitentiary where he made his money thru convict labor, is shown in detail in "Daddy Longlegs," screen version of the famous story by Jean Webster, in which Mary Pickford will be seen at the Vining Friday and Saturday.

This super-feature is the first to be made by Mary Pickford's own company, after Miss Pickford obtained the screen rights from Klaw and Erlanger to whom she gave her personal check for \$40,000. Miss Pickford has the part of Judy Ab-

bott, the little asylum girl who got her chance to go to college thru the generosity of a man who later fell in love with her.

The picture was directed by Marshall Neilan, "The Mark Twain of the Screen," who became one of the foremost directors of the day thru his ability to put appealing humor into screen action. Miss Pickford is supported in "Daddy Long Legs" by Mr. Neilan, who has the part of a young college man in love with Judy; by Mahlon Hamilton, who has the part of Jarvis Pendleton, Judy's benefactor; by Milla Davenport, as the tyrannical head matron of the asylum; by Fay Lempert, as Angelica Wyckoff, an ill-mannered little girl reared in luxury; and by one of the most charming groups of child actors ever seen on the screen, as well as half a dozen other, adult

actors.

The first half of the picture is laid in the John Grier Orphan Asylum. Mr. Neilan has filled it with a surprising succession of humorous and pathetic incidents. The millions of admirers of Miss Pickford will agree when they have seen this picture that the favorite star never had a better or more appealing role than that of the orphan, Judy Abbott, who, as an infant, is picked out of an ash can by a policeman. Given a name from a telephone book by a hard-hearted, matron; whipped, starved, and cruelly treated until she reaches the age of twelve, when she begins to spread among the stripe-dressed little motherless babes a sunshine which later is the means of helping them all to better things.

As a madcap child whose resistless personality overcomes even the most sordid surroundings, as a girl tantalizingly the good things for which she so longed in her childhood captivity; and at last as a lover, coquettish and capricious, Miss Pickford's characterization is a masterpiece.

1919 PEACH SHIPMENTS

PROMISE TO BE LIBERAL

The prospective commercial peach crop of 30,082,000 bushels, forecast July 9 by the Bureau of Crop Estimates, United States Department of Agriculture, appears liberal beside the very light crop of 20,000,000 to 21,000,000 last year, but the present crop is moderate when compared with those of recent years. Probable shipments appear more limited when it is considered that fully half the crop, or over 16,000,000 bushels is credited to California, says a report from the Bureau of Markets. Nearly 90 per cent of the California crop is commonly used for drying and canning, which would leave only about 3,600 cars to be shipped as fresh fruit. Actual shipments may equal 4,000 cars. In previous years the California crop has not been over one-third the total. Georgia, the leading south-eastern producing section, according to early indications, will ship 7,700 cars, including 3,000 cars of Elbertas, compared with 8,400, last year's totals. Arkansas, leading in the south central section, may ship 3,200 cars, or nearly half as many cars as Georgia. Oklahoma is likely to become a fairly heavy shipping section for the first time, with possibly 800 cars. New York, usually the heaviest shipping state of the Northeast, may have twice the very short crop of last year. The forecast of carlot shipments is 34,000, compared with 15,903 cars shipped last year.

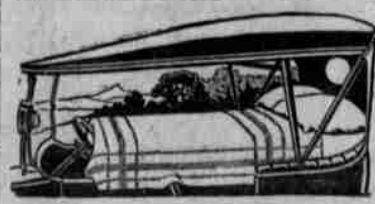
