AN AMERICAN LEGION

POST IN EACH COUNTY

A post of The American Legion, the national organization of ex-service men, in every county in the state of Oregon by August 20, is the goal which has been set by State Secretary Dow V. Walker of Portland in an announcement to the press today.

This means that Oregon with more than 20,000 prospective members of The American Legion, will be well organized by the State convention which is planned for September. Already applications for charters have been forwarded to national headquarters at New York from 16 local posts and as many more will be sent from state headquarters again shortly.

In every county where there is no post as yet, one ex-service man is being chosen by Mr. Walker as county organizer, whose duty will be to see that former soldiers, sailors or marines in his locality get together as soon as possible. In counties where there already are posts, the members of the executive committee of the post first organized in the county are automatically designated a county committee to attend to the organization of other branches throughout the county and the president of that post becomes county organizer.

In other words, the state organization is responsible for the organization of at least one post in every county and members of that post are responsible for the development of the American Legion in other parts of their county. Any town in which there are fifteen ex-service men to band together may form a local post and make application to the headquarters of the state committee, Liberty Temple, Portland, for a charter. These applications are approved, numbered and sent to New York for final approval and issuance by the national committee of the American Legion.

By August 20, a post in every county, and by August 30, a post in every town or locality having furnished more than 100 men in the world war, is the aim of Mr. Walker. A membership drive throughout the nation for 1,000,000 members, or about 25 per cent of the service men of the country, will be staged by the American Legion in September, during which month the Oregon state convention will be held in Portland.

The national convention of the American Legion will be held in Minneapolis on November 11, the anniversary of the signing of the armistice.

GOVERNMENT RANCH

MAKES STUDY OF SHEEP

Several results of importance to western sheep men have been ascertained by experiments at the Government sheep ranch near Dubois, Idaho, which has been in operation two years. Formerly it was customary for range sheep men to discard ewes which did not bear lambs when 2 years old. Extensive investigations by the Department of Agriculture have developed that such ewes are just as valuable for future breeding as those which bear lambs as 2-year-olds.

Individual records are kept on the Government sheep ranch relative to the weight of fleece, length of fleece, character of fleece, fineness of fiber, and mutton quality of each animal, while detailed account is maintained of the offspring of each ewe. The particular utility of the results obtained arises from the fact that the flock is handled just as are all similar bands of sheep in the hands of Wyoming stockmen.

Experiments are being conducted to develop a type of sheep more suitable to the western range conditions than the types now prevalent. It is hoped to extend this work in both mutton conformation and length and weight of fleece.

There are at present about 1,500 head of pure-bred Rambouillets, Lincoln Rambouillets and Romney Rambouillets on the Government ranch. Crossbreeding experiments are being conducted with all these breeds and crosses, as well as the use of pure-bred Corriedales, which have been mated with cross-bred ewes.

OPPOSED TO RELEASE

PROPERTY OF INDIANS

WASHINGTON.—Several appeals have come to members of the Oregon delegation to release the property of the Klamath Indians, now held in common, to the individuals, which, it is argued, would lead to more rapid development and give the Indians a larger income.

Senator McNary, who is a member of the Indian affairs committee of the senate, as he was in the last senate, says he cannot consistently support this proposed legislation, looking at it from the standpoint of the Indians as wards of the government.

"We have abundant example in the past of what becomes of the property of the Indian when he is given fee simple title to property in advance of the time when he is competent to safeguard his interests," said McNary. "The Indian becomes the victim of some designing white man, loses his property, and in the

course of a few years is back asking alms of the government.

"I want the Indian to have the fullest enjoyment of his property and to have control of it when he is determined to be competent, but it is necessary for the government to proceed carefully in protecting these wards, and not to permit any property to be dissipated ahead of the time when it can be entrusted to them as individuals.

"This has been the policy of the government and after full consideration of the matter, I am satisfied it is the right policy. In the last congress we made available \$400,000 for the Klamaths, reimbursable from the sale of timber, and the Indians should be aided in productive work, but I do not believe the time has come to turn this property over in fee simple to the Indians, whose interests must come first when legislation is considered."

Edward B. Ashurst, brother of Senator Ashurst, of Arizona, who was for some time connected with the Klamath reservation, has been active in urging distribution of the property to the Indians, who, he says, have an estate of \$33,000,000 sufficient to give each an equity of \$30,000.

Ashurst has the support of prominent Oregon persons in urging legislation which would abolish the collective holding of the Klamath lands. It is asserted that this would hasten the development of that part of Oregon and be to the benefit of the Indians themselves because of the existing restrictions upon their control.

ASKED APPROPRIATION

TO FIGHT INFLUENZA

WASHINGTON.—Representative Fess, Ohio, Friday urged the house to pass his bill appropriating \$1,500,000 to fight the influenza.

A statement written by Fess after an investigation of the possibility of reoccurrence of the disease was inserted in the congressional record.

"The last epidemic caused 500,000 deaths and a total economic loss of nearly \$4,000,000, according to figures compiled by the American Medical association," Fess said.

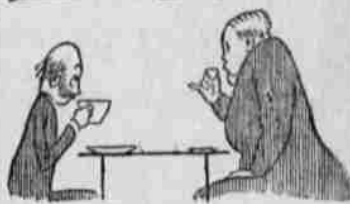
"The all-important thing now is to find a cure. This will require expensive research and I propose that the money shall be expended under

the direction of the public health service.

"There is a general belief in the medical world that the second and third years will show frightful after effects unless specific remedies can be found. But the appalling loss of 500,000 lives—five times our loss in the war—with assurance that the plague will appear again, is enough to arouse us to immediate action.

"It is generally believed that success will follow the effects of the medical world in its fight against the epidemic, just as in the case of yellow fever, typhus, diphtheria and other maladies."
