Information For Oregon Fisherman

Marion Lake—Good catches of cut-throat trout are being made at Marion Lake. Reached by trail by way of Detroit.

Pamella Lake—Good catches of cut-throat trout are reported from various points on the lake. Reached by trail by way of Detroit.

North Fork Santiam—Good catches of cut-throat trout are being made at various points near Detroit. Reached by railroad.

Breitenbush Creek—Good catches of cut-throat trout are reported near Detroit. Reached by railroad.

Humburg and Blowout Creeks—Fishing is reported good on both of these streams. Reached by train from Albany.

Rogue River and tributaries—Too hot for fishing. Fish do not take any kind of bait in such weather.

Elk Lake—Good catches of cut-throat trout are reported at points on Elk Lake. Reached by trail from Detroit.

Wahtum Lake—Fair catches of eastern brook trout are being made from rafts on the lake. Reached by trail by way of Cascade Locks.

Eagle Creek—Good catches of trout reported from points above Punch Bowl and near four-mile post. Reached by trail by way of Bonneville.

Row River—Good catches of trout are being made at various points along the stream. Reached by auto and rail by way of Cottage Grove. Fish take spinner and royal coachman fly.

MEN ARRESTED FOR LEAVING CAMP FIRE

William Bunch, Roy Dyser, Joe Dyser, all of Kerby, Oregon, failed to completely extinguish their camp fire at Dead Horse Camp at the head of Sucker Creek, Thursday, July 24, and, as a result, were arrested, tried and fined \$5.00 and costs, July 28, at Justice Holman's court. These men had been camped at Dead Horse Camp ground, and on Thursday, at about 7 o'clock broke camp and moved to another camp a mile or two away. Before leaving they, as they thought, extinguished their camp fire. However, a passerby, about 9 o'clock, discovered the fire still burning, and reported it to Herman Luethy, lookout man on Bolan Mountain, at 9:30. Mr. Luethy, under instructions of District Ranger M. M. Lewis, went to the fire, put it out, and overtook Mr. Bunch, and Messrs. Roy and Joe Dyser, who admitted having camped there. On Monday, July 28, they were brought before Justice of the Peace Holman at Grants Pass, on charge of violating Section 9 of the Oregon State Fire Law. They plead guilty, and were fined \$5.00 and costs, the minimum fine being imposed by Justice Holman because they had made considerable effort to extinguish their fire with water, and had presumed that it was out.

The District Forester has issued positive instructions that every offender against either the State or Federal fire laws must be prosecuted, no matter how extenuating the circumstances or the offence may have been. Carelessness with fire in the woods is responsible for a vast amount of damage to the principle resource of Oregon—standing timber; and carelessness with fire in the woods is no more excusable than carelessness with fire in one's own house.

BEGINNING TO REALIZE

VALUE OF TOURISTS

The fact that Ashland is waking up to the advantages to be derived from entertaining the tourists who daily pass thru here and camp in the local auto-park is being realized not only by business men and citizens of this city, but by our neighbors in adjacent towns, who are also making an effort to entertain the stranger in their midst. The Roseburg Review makes the following comment on what tourists are doing for the country:

According to recent reports, Glendale, Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland are spending small sums of money in taking care of the tourists and working at the tourist camp grounds. This is also being done in Eugene, Albany and Salem. Nearly all of these camp grounds are said to be provided with wood for the tourist or there are a number of gas heaters or electric stoves, with meters, in which the tourist may deposit 25 cents and thus secure heat for several hours for cooking. In a recent interview with merchants of the southern cities, the lowest estimate made as to the value of tourists to a town was \$5 per car per day. The average estimate as made by merchants was \$10 to \$12 per day.

"We have only two electric stoves in our local camp grounds and this is considered not near enough. We have no wood. The merchants of Roseburg have rented two pieces of land for the grounds, and had electric lights put in. Water has also been supplied. More accommodations are now needed. Tables should be built on the Cardwell side and some benches are also needed there. One or two more tables are necessary on the Wimberly side," says Mr. Heinlma. He asks:

"Is it not possible to secure from our city council the sum of \$300 to be used in improving these grounds? In one city I found three families of tourists who had remained there a week looking the country over. They were so impressed with the nice camp ground and the environment, that two of them remained long enough to become residents. They purchased property.

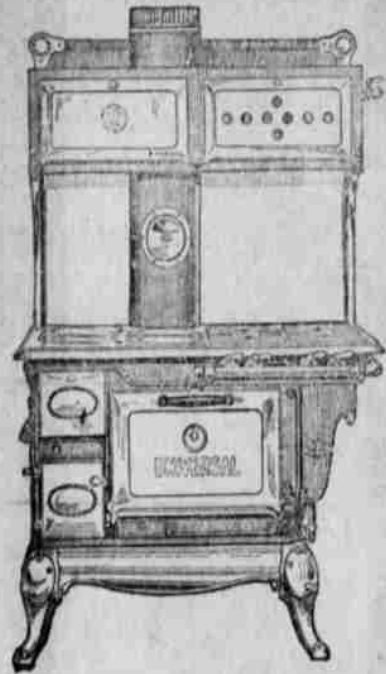
