TIME TO USE LAST CODLING MOTH SPRAY

The second brood of codling moth is practically at its height at this time. Moths will continue to lay eggs for some time. Late fruit will be subject to infection from now on until picking time. Generally speaking, most orchards are very free from infection at the present time but it is not advisable to take any chances with the codling moth at this season, therefore spraying should follow your last application within three to four weeks. This week will be an ideal time for most of the growers and if the fruit is thoroughly covered, should carry it thru to maturity. With good prices for fruit and most of it clean at this time no chance should be taken with the moths at this late hour. It is thought best to use six pounds of dry arsenate to 200 gallons of water or 12 pounds of paste to the same amount. See that the fruit is covered on all sides for many eggs are laid on individual fruits. Where five to ten eggs are laid on one fruit it is absolutely necessary to have the fruit thoroughly covered.

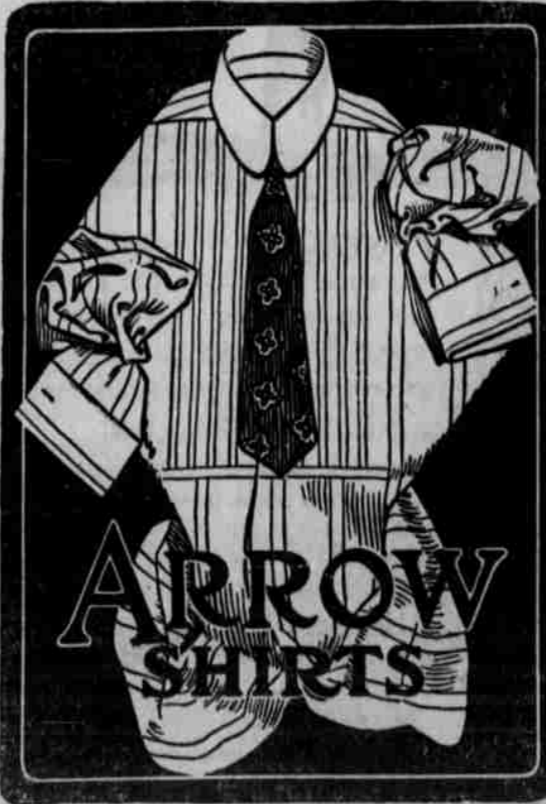
