WESTERN MAN TO BE PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE

PORTLAND, Aug. 14.—A Western man or a man with broad Western ideas for the next president of the United States is to be the slogan of Pacific Coast Republicans. This is the message of Colonel E. Hofer, of Salem, who has just returned from a conference of prominent republican leaders of half a dozen Western states held a few days ago in San Francisco.

While sentiment at the conference seemed to favor United States Senator Hiram Johnson of California and, in fact a big campaign will be waged for the Pacific Coast candidate, the leading workers expressed a ready willingness to get behind any other aspirant who is in sympathy with the West and who knows the needs of the West in the event that the Johnson boom fails to make any kind of a showing.

"I was much impressed with the strength of the Johnson movement in California," said Colonel Hofer. "The progressive element of the Republican party and a big part of the laboring people are strong for the senator. These same elements are opposed to the league of nations as now constituted. If they find that Senator Johnson will fail to develop sufficient strength in Eastern and Middle Western states, they will get behind some other candidate who has progressive, Western ideas and who will run on a platform that is unalterably opposed to the league of nations as it now stands."

SCHOOLS MUST QUALIFY TO TRAIN SERVICE MEN

The secretary of state's office has mailed statement forms to private institutions of the state that heretofore advised of their purpose to accept applications of soldiers, sailors and marines to pursue a course of study under the provisions of the educational-financial aid bill approved by the people at the special election June 3. The forms are for the convenience of institutions in submitting the necessary evidence to establish their status as educational institutions and will indicate whether such institutions satisfactorily show that they have the facilities and equipment for furnishing a prescribed course of study that will be beneficial to the applicants under the law.

The attorney-general has defined an institution of learning as any school or educational institution of higher grade than the public schools provided for by statute and includes in addition to the established public and private institutions of learning in the state high schools, business colleges and such other institutions of learning as have a prescribed course of study available to the public and which can satisfactorily show that they have the proper facilities and equipment for furnishing a prescribed course of study that will be beneficial to the student.

In the framing of the statements the secretary of state's office has been guided somewhat by the requirements of the division of rehabilitation of the federal board for vocational education, under which branch of the federal government activities in educational and reconstruction work in connection with disabled soldiers, sailors and marines is conducted.

The institutions are asked, in addition to their location, date of organization and ownership, to state whether their school buildings are owned, rented or leased, also to state the space used for school purposes, as well as the general building and school conveniences. They must also give in detail fully and completely their equipment and an outline of their school program. The number of instructors and qualifications of the members of the faculty. They are also asked to state in full the courses of study which they are equipped to furnish, and accompany such statement with a copy of their latest catalogs and any other advertising literature which they issue. Further, they are asked to state their entrance requirements, graduation requirements and the number of students their equipment and faculty can accommodate conveniently. They must also specify their tuition rates for full course, by the month and for special terms, and are asked in addition to give any other information of assistance.

While no prospective successors to Mr. Thompson and Mr. Booth have appeared at the capital several men prominently connected with Oregon's road campaign have been mentioned as possible aspirants.

Among the men mentioned in this connection are James Stewart of Fossil, member of the last legislature, William Pollman, Baker banker, and Bruce Dennis, published of newspapers at LeGrande and Baker.

For Mr. Booth's berth are mentioned W. E. St. John, county commissioner of Douglas county, and Louis Simpson of Marshfield.

1-1000 SOLUTION IS DETERMINED BY WEIGHT

In making the corrosive sublimate solution of 1-1000 for seed treatment, the real ratio is determined by weight, says M. B. McKay assistant plant pathologist at the O. A. C. experiment station. That is, one part by weight mercuric chloride is dissolved in 1000 parts of water. For practical purposes this is 4 ounces of the poison to 30 gallons, 4002 ounces, water. The same solution may be used several times by adding 1 ounce mercuric chloride after the treatment of six bushels of potatoes.

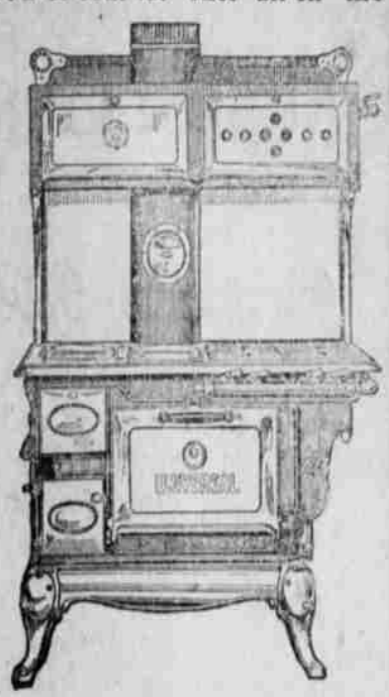
