Re-Elected at the Meeting of the O. R. & N. Directors.

POLICY WILL BE THE SAME

Traffic Arrangements for the Next Year Will Not Be Changed

PORTLAND, Sept. 7.—A. L. Mohler was re-elected president of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company at a meeting of the board of directors held at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

Previous to the meeting of the board of directors, a meeting of the stockholders was held, at which a new board of directors was chosen.

Officers of the company re-elected were: A. L. Mohler, president; W. W. Cotton, secretary; E. S. Benson, general auditor; C. E. Whittington, assistant treasurer; Charles C. Beaman, counsel; and W. W. Cotton, general attorney.

A new executive board was chosen, composed of Messrs. Harriman, Cornish, Pierce, Schiff, Hull and Cannon.

As stated, the only change in the new board is the dropping of Mellen and Lamont, who represented the Northern Pacific interests, and Samuel Carr.

Mr. Harriman is now chairman of the board of directors of the three roads, the Union Pacific, Oregon Short Line and O. R. & N.

A resolution was introduced declaring the intention of the council to improve two blocks on Commercial street, from the west side of Tenth street to the west side of Eighth street to a width of 55 feet.
