Wants England to Equip Canadian Pacific Road for Service Around the World.

WILL THEN DIE IN PÆACE

Sir William Van Horn Sees a Wonderful Future for His Road Backed by the English Excheques.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12 -- A special to

the Times from Montreal says: Sir William Van Horn, chairman of the board of directors of the Canadian Pacific Company, has admitted what has long been an open secret, that the Canadian Pacific is anxious to estably awaits the promise of an adequate aubsidy from the dominion government before putting its plans into execution. Bir William also said his company would like to buy out the intercolonial rallway from the Canadian government and after establishing its fast steamship line, would run a special Canadian Pacific train in England between London and Liverpool.

Whether the traveler was bound for points in Canada or the United States, or for Yokohama, Hong Kong or Australia, we would guarantee that there would be no delays.

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
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
