The Chicago department of the Volunteers of America, the organization which separated from the Salvation Army some time ago, has decided to discontinue the use of tambourines and other noisy instruments hereafter in its religious services.

President McKinley's acceptance of honorary membership in the Bricklayers and Masons' Union of Chicago has just been made public in a letter written by his secretary at his request to the president of the union. The acceptance is based on the assertion that it will impose no obligation or restraint inconsistent with the duty of the chief executive to all the people.

Ex-Senator John H. Reagan of Texas, the last survivor of the cabinet of Jefferson Davis, is now in his eighty-fifth year, but, in spite of the signs of age in his face, his brown eyes shine lustriously, his voice is steady and his step is firm. He says he takes the best of care of himself, going to bed early and getting up with the sun. He works hard and sleeps well.

Unless an international hog trust is possible, pork ought soon to be cheaper in this country through the operations of a syndicate of French, German and Russian capitalists, who have raised \$20,000,000 to compete with American pork exporters. The plan is to raise hogs on a large scale in Siberia, where it can be done cheaper than in the United States, and to establish at the proper points slaughter houses run on the most approved American plan.
