EVERYBODY SEES SAVE PORTLAND

Object of the Railroads to discriminate Against Oregon.

PASSING PORTLAND BY

Following the O. R. & N. Extension to Puget Sound the C. B. & Q. May Rush on to Seattle.

Seattle Post-Intelligencer. M. S. Burns, a retired capitalist of Salt Lake City, is spending a few days in Seattle. Mr. Burns is authority for the statement that the C. B. & Q. road is heading for the coast as fast as it can...

"Yes, there is a report in Salt Lake City," he said yesterday, "which followed close upon the heels of the O. R. & N. meeting, to the effect that the Union Pacific would begin next spring to construct the Oregon line from Portland to Seattle, and also begin the extension of the line from Utah south to California. These reports have received no confirmation, and while there may be something in them, they may also amount to nothing."

"There is one thing that in Salt Lake we do know, and that is that the Burlington road will be operating trains into Seattle within three years. More than that, we are to have a direct line of the Burlington into Salt Lake next year. This report is verified by the officials of the Burlington road, and has caused a regular boom in Salt Lake real estate."

"A few days ago the Burlington let the contract for an extension of its line from Talooka, Mont., to Cody, Wyo. The contract provides that this new line be completed within eight months, and on good authority I learn that the work will be begun as soon after the new year as is possible. This will not conclude the Burlington's construction work. For the past thirty days the road has had a corps of engineers in the field making a survey for a line from Cody, Wyo., to Salt Lake City, passing southward along the western border of Yellowstone National Park and down the west shore of the lake. This will open up a vast stretch of country, fertile and thickly settled."

"This will be really a branch line, but will be operated on a through line system, with a junction at Talooka. The westward branch, which, it is said, will be surveyed early next year, will go west from Cody, Wyo., to some point near Baker City, Or., and then northwest to Seattle. There is every assurance, from the engineers now in the field, that this will be done just as soon as their Utah extension work is completed. The survey of this line west to the coast will occupy several months, but by the beginning of 1902 will probably be in such shape that construction work can be begun."

"Salt Lake is delighted with the prospect of another competitive line, which will give us four through lines and a center through which east and west travel will pass. We are enjoying a boom at the present time, which is only added to by the verification of the Burlington report."

RENTING RAILROAD PASSES.

Our railroad presidents and general managers travel around with gripfuls of annual passes over all the lines in the United States, says a writer in the New York Press. One whose road is in the East and whose business never takes further west than Pittsburg, was approached the other day on the way to Philadelphia by a well-dressed stranger, who said: "I see, sir, that you are well supplied with passes. I should like to rent such as you do not use. I travel a great deal in the Far West, where you probably never go, and your passes would be of great service to me. I am willing to pay a good rental." The president had never been thus "put to it" before, and he is not the sort that rents or sells commodities.

"You are talking to the wrong man," he said sternly. "All the money you've got in the world would not induce me to comply with your proposition." "I beg your pardon," returned the man. "The renting of passes is not unusual, and my proposition was made as a matter of business. Good morning."

I asked the president if it really is true that passes are rented in that way, and he replied, "I regret to say that the practice is not unusual. When a man has annuals over many roads that he never uses he can easily rent them, and some thoughtless individuals are in the habit of doing it. In fact, it is often done, and in quarters you would never suspect."

BONITO IN WASHINGTON WATERS.

University Receives Fish Hitherto Unknown so Far North.

The University of Washington has received a large specimen of a fish, presented by the Pacific Fish Company, which has not before been recorded north of San Francisco. This adds another fish to Washington's fauna. The fish is about three feet long and is re-

lated to the mackerel, being known as the bonito, or skipjack, Sarda chilensis. On the Southern California coast it is not uncommon and it ranges south from there to Patagonia. The specimen will be mounted and placed on exhibition in the university museum.

The university hopes that the local fish companies and fishermen will save any rare fishes that may come to their hands, for the university museum, where they may be classified and properly preserved for study.

ANTICIPATED PLEASURE.

It is the custom in all parts of Scotland to send invitations when a death occurs in the family to all the neighbors to attend the funeral. A rather grim story once arose out of this. A neighbor had been omitted by the bereaved family in the usual invitations, a feud having arisen between them. On the day of the funeral, while the people were assembling, the slighted old woman stood at her door watching the gathering. BANISH THE GOATS.

Something quite new in modern municipal government and what seems to be a most excellent idea comes from the little village of Lanford, in South Carolina. The town has only about 50 white men, and even at that some of them are of doubtful value as citizens. Accordingly all of them were gathered together in the store, the only meeting place properly registered, and invited to vote as to which of them should leave town. There was no electioneering, no rioting, no ballot-box stuffing, and when the votes were counted it was found that a man who had been engaged in illegal whisky selling was elected to depart by a handsome majority. How this man himself voted is not known, but he went, and several other men who received smaller but nevertheless substantial majorities are

winding up their business to follow him.

A STRONG THINKER.

Christian scientists will watch with interest the course of the trial of a suit for damages brought against the Edison Electric Illuminating Company, of Paterson, N. J., by Berthold Frankel, who alleges that he was struck by a falling arc light wire of the company and seriously injured. As a result he was in the hospital for three months. The defense of the company is that the wire never touched Frankel and that he only thought he was hurt, constituting himself at once the subject and the operation in a feat of hypnotism. The hospital physicians, who have been called by the defense, say that while Frankel showed all the symptoms of an electric shock, his body was unmarked, and other doctors testify that in their opinion as experts the illness was the result of hypnotic suggestion.
