OFFICIALLY PROCLAIMED.

Gov. Geer Formally Announces Thanksgiving Day.

SALEM, OR., Nov. 1.—The year just drawing to a close has been one of general happiness and contentment. The earth has given forth an abundance of its products, for which in all cases a better compensation has been received than in some former years, and in many lines of business in which our people are engaged the results of labor are better rewarded than ever before. They have hoped for a changed condition, which would guarantee them higher remuneration for their products, and with but few exceptions, their wish has been granted. There is not only no famine anywhere in the land, but we are supplying the most distant parts of the earth with the products of the farm, the factory and the shop. We are entirely free from all kinds of pestilence, and good health prevails in all parts of our beloved country. Our laboring classes, whose welfare should always be uppermost in our minds and hearts, are more generally employed at wages more nearly satisfactory than at any previous time for a generation. Our public schools are generously supported and their flattering attendance is a sure guaranty of our continued growth as a nation along the lines of intelligence and civilization. There has been no time since the establishment of our government, when our people were more firmly attached to its beneficent purposes or more loyally consecrated to the defence of its flag.

The mandates of a spreading civilization, which from the beginning of time has sought out and eradicated the dark and uncivilized spots of earth, are calling upon us as a great nation to carry forward the banner of progress and enlightenment, and the task is being performed with a willingness and enthusiasm that do credit to our recognition of a duty that we could not shirk if we would, and should not if we could. Our own state is blessed with a patriotic, industrious and happy people

whose observance of law and order is so universal that an arbitrary enforcement of authority is seldom required, and there is no cloud of apprehension to mar the horizon in any direction.

In view of these and other blessings, I recommend, in accordance with a well-established custom, that Thursday the 30th inst., be recognized by all our people as a day of general thanksgiving to the Supreme Ruler of the universe for the numerous mercies that have been vouchsafed to us, and that they, as far as practicable, abstain on that day from their usual vocations, and that they devote themselves to deeds of charity, to expressions of comfort to those who are troubled, to words of sympathy for those whose dear ones have given their lives in their country's service, and that they meet in their usual places of worship and beseech a continuance in the year to come of the favors already granted.

During the proceedings the defense made a motion to strike out of the case all of the testimony by witnesses who had testified before the coroner's jury on the death of Smith and Cheyne who were killed April 29 the day of the alleged obstruction of the mails.
