NEW INVENTIONS UTILIZED

Columbian Basin Wheat Will Now Be Diverted to the Sound In Greater Quantities than Ever Before.

A marked innovation in the method of handling wheat in elevators and AMERICAN NURSES large flouring mills is about to be in stituted in Seattle, which will be the first place in the West where the latest modern improvements are to be utilized. S. T. Y. This special machinery will consist of an elevator tower and the air-tight cylindrical tanks. In handling grain in

these appliances it is emptied from th sacks at the railroad track into hoppers, and conveyed theree by air currents through large pipes to the storage tanks. On the way the wheat is ing through it cleanses and dries it so that by the time it reaches the tanks it is thoroughly clean, and as these receiving vaults are air-tight it may remain there an indefinite time without sweating or being otherwise injured. When the mill desires to use the grain it is blown back to the mill hoppers or bins as desired, in a similar manner to the first movement.

This method of taking care of grain does away with the frequent handling his necessary to preserve the quality in the ordinary methods of storing it in wooden bins, and also renders insuring unnecessary, as the tanks are absolutely fireproof. 

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
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
