WATER SERVICE ORDINANCE.

Ordinance No. 2497, entitled: An ordinance prohibiting the interference with, or injury to all water-pipes, mains, service-pipes, service-boxes, stop-boxes, and all other parts and appliances, including supply-pipes, reservoirs, and head-works of the water-works and water-supply system of the City of Astoria, Oregon, regulating the taking of water therefrom, and preventing the pollution of and throwing of any and all substance and matter in any water-main, reservoir, supply or other pipes of said system and further providing for the punishment of all violations of this ordinance. The City of Astoria does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That from and after the passage and approval of this ordinance no person, or persons, firm, company, or corporation, shall in any manner take any water from, or attach to, or detach from any water-main, water-pipe, service, or other pipe, hydrant, reservoir or connection, by means of which water is or may be hereafter supplied to the City of Astoria to the inhabitants thereof, or other consumer of water, without first having obtained permission of the Astoria Water Commission, or its duly authorized superintendent or agent, which permission shall be so obtained in accordance with the rules and regulations of the said commission now, or hereafter in force. Section 2. No person, firm, company, persons, or corporation shall injure, or destroy, or interfere with any water-main, water-pipe-service, or other pipe, service-box, stop-box, hydrant, reservoir, or connection, by means of which water is or may be hereafter supplied by said city to any consumer of water.

Section 3. No street contractor, or other person, or persons, firm, company or corporation, having in charge the construction, or repair of any street, alley, highway, road, or crossing within the limits of the City of Astoria, or along the line of the said Astoria Water System outside of said city, shall without first having obtained permission of the said water commission, remove, tear up, misplace, or change the location of any water-pipe, service-pipe, stop-box, service-box, hydrant, or other part, or appliance belonging to the said water-works, or system, or by means of which water is supplied to any consumer thereof, and each and every one of said water-pipes, service-pipes, service-boxes, stop-boxes, hydrant, or other part or appliance, which after the aforesaid permission having been obtained, shall be so removed, torn up, misplaced, or changed in location, shall be at the expense of said contractor person, persons, firm, company or corporation obtaining said permission and each and every water-pipe, service-box, stop-box, hydrant, or other part of appliance which shall be so removed, torn up, misplaced or changed in location, shall be replaced in as good condition as it was prior to said removal, tearing up, misplacement or change of location, and without damage to the same, or to the said city, or consumer.

Section 4. No person, or persons, shall cast, throw, or place in any water reservoir, supply-pipe, water-main, head-works, or other part of the aforesaid water-works, or supply system of said city, any dirt, rubbish, filth, wood, sticks, stones, or other substance, or matter, or shall in any manner pollute the water, in any reservoir, supply-pipe, main, head-works, or other part of said water-works, or system.

Section 5. No person, or persons, shall pile any lumber or other substance, or material of any kind, within a distance of three feet from any fire hydrant, in the said city of Astoria, or shall hitch any team, or horse, or horses, or other animal, or guy wire, or rope, or other appliance used as a guy, to any hydrant, or water-pipe, or main, or man-hole belonging to said water-works, or system.

Section 6. No steamer, steamboat, or other water craft or person having charge, or control thereof, or any employee thereof, shall in any manner attach to, or take water from any water-main, public, or private hydrant, water-pipe service, or other pipe, reservoir, or connection by means of which water is furnished to any water consumer, or to said city itself, without having obtained permission so to do, as in section 1 of this ordinance provided.

Section 7. No person, or persons shall in any manner open, or interfere with any man-hole, gate, or right of way belonging, or appertaining to said water works, or system, either within, or without, the limits of said city.

Section 8. The provisions of this ordinance shall also apply to all plumbers.

Section 9. No person, firm, company or corporation shall in any manner so make any electrical ground connection, either by attaching any wire or wires to any water pipe, main, supply-pipe, or other appliance or part of the water system of the City of Astoria, nor in any manner place, attach, erect or con-

struct any telephone, telegraph or other line or wire or ground line or wire used or intended to be used for the conduct of electrical currents or electricity so as to come in direct contact with or charge with electricity any of the aforesaid pipes, mains, supply-pipes or other appliances of said water-system.

Section 10. Each and every person, firm, company or corporation who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof before the auditor and police judge be punished in a fine of not less than ten nor more than two hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail not to exceed eighty days.
