WILL NOT VISIT ITALY.

Queen Victoria Advised It Would Be Safer to Stay in Her Own Dominions.

LONDON, March 10.—Queen Victoria's decision to stay in her own dominions instead of going to Italy and the jubiliations in England in consequence are not entirely due to the causes attributed by the press. It is learned that the Italian government had been daily growing more nervous as the date of the queen's visit approached and finally notified her majesty's government that it would not care to accept the responsibility of the sovereign's safety, owing to the strong recrudescence of the anarchistic movement throughout Europe.

As for society in Ireland it is in a state of hubbub and excitement as has not been seen for many a year. Regardless of politics, the queen's visit to Dublin will doubtless be made the occasion for unprecedented festivities, though throughout Great Britain there will be some tension until the queen has recessed the channel in safety. The drawing rooms promise to be especially interesting. Among the debutantes will be a daughter of Mrs. Arthur Paget and the daughter of another woman equally well known to the American public, Mrs. Langtry. Mrs. Cornwallis West will be Miss Jeanne Langtry's godmother. Other debutantes are Lady Sybil Grey, daughter of Earl Grey and niece of Earl of Minto, governor-general of Canada. The Marquis of Cholmoldy's daughter, Lady Lattice Joan, and Lady Margaret Sackville, daughter of the Countess de la Warr, while among the brides are the Hon. Mrs. Charles Coventry, who recently changed her American name of Whitehouse, to that ancient English patronymic and the beautiful and rich Countess of Cromaroe, who recently married Major Blunt. Some confusion is being caused in society by the fact that there are no less than four Ladies Queensbury now living, the reigning Marchioness being formerly known as Lady Douglas of Hawick. It is now said that the late Marquis shortly before his death was visited by the wife who divorced him in 1874, a pathetic reconciliation taking place, not only between husband and wife, but with the sons who had also been estranged. There is a good deal of chagrin displayed over what is termed Lord Roberts' too generous treatment of General Cromie and the tendency in some sections of the press to hysterically overrate Cromie's bravery. Many references are now made to Cromie's alleged dishonesty in the former war, in accepting the surrender of the British garrison of Potoschefrom when a general armistice had been proclaimed.

"There is a vein of sentimentality in the Anglo-Saxon nature which sometimes transgresses reasonable limits. Just at present it is engaged in elevating Cromie to the level of a hero."

The government is contemplating sending the Beer leader to the Island of St. Helena, but no definite decision has been reached. On this subject the Morning Post publishes a letter, saying:

"In view of the fact that the very name of St. Helena causes a passionate ebullition in France it would be foolish for England to arouse this feeling by selecting Napoleon's place of banishment for Cromie."

According to the newly appointed surveyor of Westminster Abbey, that ancient edifice is fast crumbling to pieces owing to the action of the fumes of manufactories on the opposite side of the river on the weather worn stones. This contention is illustrated by photographs of white patches on the interior and the exterior parts of the Abbey indicating crumbling.

A curious romance comes from Chester where there was recently admitted to the workhouse a Captain Salisbury, son of the late member of parliament for Chester. Though only 44 years old, he has had a remarkable career as a soldier, war correspondent and author, finally falling upon very hard days. It seems as if this distinguished pauper was doomed to spend the rest of his life in the poor house when there suddenly appeared on the scene an apparently rich woman, described as Miss Emily Cunningham, of Ireland. The sequel occurred Thursday last when Captain Salisbury was married to his visitor. They departed for Chester in great style and amidst no end of sensation.

The often postponed marriage of the Crown Princess Stephanie of Austria to Count Lonyay, seems to be on the eve of occurring at Trieste, where Count Lonyay has taken a residence and whither Princess Stephanie departed Vienna Thursday. Neither the Vienna nor the Brussels courts are any more favorably disposed toward the groom than when the marriage was first mooted. King Leopold thinks it a scandal only a little less terrible than that of his eldest daughter, while Queen Henrietta hides her head with shame. But Princess Stephanie, regardless of it all, throws up her court life, diamonds and gold embroidered robes, has her income reduced from 800,000 to 200,000 crowns and goes to live with a poor country gentleman.

English papers fear another era of agrarian murders in Ireland. It is well to nip in the bud the tendency now said to be exhibited.

NAVY DEPARTMENT NEWS.

Movement of Vessels—Wireless Telegraphy to Be Adopted by the Light-House Service.

NEW YORK, March 10.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Orders have been telegraphed to Rear-Admiral Kautz, commander-in-chief of the Asiatic squadron, directing him to proceed with the Philadelphia to the Pacific coast of Central America for the purpose of protecting American interests there and to endeavor to prevent hostilities among the republics. Admiral Kautz will not start until next week.

The light-house board hopes to obtain an appropriation from congress which will enable it to provide light-houses with the wireless telegraph system. The amount asked for is \$25,000.

Secretary Long has decided not to adopt Rear-Admiral Bradford's recommendations looking to the use of the system by the navy until after the experiments which the light-house board will make are completed.

For the convenience of commerce, Secretary Long has approved the recommendation of Rear-Admiral Bradford that a branch hydrographic office be established in Manila.

Under orders given by the department the submarine Benington and other small vessels of Rear-Admiral Watson's command will begin to survey the islands.

Formal orders have been issued by the navy department to Rear-Admiral McCormick detaching him from the command of the Washington navy yard and ordering him to duty as second in command of the Asiatic squadron.

UP TO SNUFF.

Manufacturing Interests in Snuff Business to Be Consolidated.

NEW YORK, March 10.—The Journal of Commerce says:

The recent negotiations of the American and Continental Tobacco Companies to arrange for a consolidation of the leading snuff interests of the country are said to have been practically completed, and a new \$25,000,000 company will, it is stated, be organized to take over all the snuff business of both the Continental Tobacco and American Tobacco companies as well as the Atlantic Snuff company and Heim Snuff company. The formal transfer of the last named companies to the new company is said to have already been made. The transfer of the snuff plants of the Continental and American companies is now being consummated.

The capital of the company is to be divided equally into preferred and common stock.

The new deal, it is said, will give the American and Continental Tobacco companies control of 35 per cent of the snuff output of the country. The American company owns the Baltimore Snuff company and the Continental owns the Lorillard company.

The Atlantic Snuff company was formed in 1898 and is capitalized at \$2,000,000. It is understood, however, that the price named to the organizers of the new company was \$5,500,000 while the Helm company are said to have asked \$2,500,000.

TO KEEP LYNN CANAL.

President Has No Intention of Relinquishing Our Hold on It.

NEW YORK, March 10.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Although no effort is being made to press negotiations for the permanent delimitation of the Alaskan boundary it is said today that discussion of the subject is in progress between the United States and Great Britain.

In answer to the British for the establishment of the boundary at a point which would give the English control of practically all the Lynn canal, Secretary Hay recently sent an exhaustive memorandum which in the opinion of American officials clearly refutes the British claim and shows conclusively that the waterway belongs to the United States. The British government has not answered this communication.

There is no doubt in the minds of officials that the loyalty of Canada to Great Britain will cause the London government to be more insistent of the claims of the dominion. The United States, however, holds that the Lynn canal is its property and the president has no intention of relinquishing it. The ultimate determination of the controversy will probably be reached by arbitration, the character of which will be the stumbling block in the negotiations.

TREATY IS DOOMED.

French Reciprocity Treaty Not to Be Passed This Session of Senate.

NEW YORK, March 10.—A special to the Times from Washington says: Senator Spooner speaks positively about the prospects of the French reciprocity treaty.

"It will not be ratified at this session. Whether it has two-thirds or one-third of the senate for it, I cannot say. I don't care. I know that it will not be ratified during the present session of congress."

From the character of other remarks made by republican senators the inference is drawn that some republicans consider that it would be impolitic and therefore inexpedient at this time to menace protected interests by adopting a treaty that will accomplish by legislative action a result that could not be brought about by direct legislative action.
