LONDON, March 3.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Men set with sunstroke, writhing and gasping for water, were lying every fifty yards or so.

HAWAIIAN NAVAL STATION.

Board to Be Convened to Determine Its Location.

NEW YORK, March 12.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Orders will be issued by Secretary Long tomorrow organizing a board which will make arrangements for the establishment of a naval station at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

Rear-Admiral Bradford, chief of the bureau of equipment, has brought to the attention of the department the necessity of establishing a station at Pearl harbor as promptly as possible, and it is in accordance with his recommendation that the board will be appointed.

It will consist of Rear-Admiral Barker, commander of the Norfolk navy-yard, president; Captain Taylor, the new commander of the Vermont; Commander Todd, chief hydrographer and Civil Engineer Rousseau, and Lieutenant E. L. Chapin, recorder.

THE DU BOIS "SENSATION."

Mr. Vosburg Declares That Much More Has Been Said Than Is Warranted.

G. R. Vosburg, who has been in the city paying taxes on timber lands, owned by J. E. Du Bois, of Du Bois, Penn., left on last night's train for Portland.

"Mr. Du Bois, has no present intention of locating a saw-mill in this section of the country. It is true that Mr. Du Bois did not buy the timber as a speculation, and will at some time in the future build and operate a mill."

THE STRATHGYLE IN.

One of the Largest Vessels Ever to Enter This Port.

The British steamer Strathgyle arrived in yesterday morning. The steamer is one of the regular Santa Fe liners, and is a steel steamer of 3,284 tons net, and is 335.3 feet long and 43.7 feet beam, 23 feet depth of hold.

The Strathgyle is a fine ship and is one of the largest carriers that has ever been in this port.

She will take 4,000 tons of flour from Portland, and finish loading with cotton at San Diego.

The captain of the steamer should have no cause of complaint about this port; as Consul Cherry said that he was probably put through the customs house on record time.
