TRIMMING FOR BIMETALLISM.

The Washington correspondent of the Chicago Times-Herald reports that the democratic senators are tired of Mr. Bryan and his ratio. They would like to throw him over if they dared, and one of them is quoted in favor of a straddle on the money question.
