OTHER SIDE OF CURTIS' RECORD

County Judge Gray Delves Into Past History.

WHAT WAS DONE AT SALEM

Some Caustic Remarks Concerning the Nickle-in-the-Slot Scandal—What Has Not Been Done for Roads.

The interview with C. J. Curtis, published in yesterday morning's Astorian, caused considerable comment throughout the city yesterday. Many exceptions were taken to the contention made by Mr. Curtis in behalf of his legislative record. Prominent republicans throughout the city declare that Mr. Curtis has made assertions in his own defense which cannot be borne up by the facts in the case.

J. H. D. Gray, county judge, made a statement to an Astorian representative yesterday afternoon concerning the matter which will make very interesting reading to the people of this city who know Mr. Curtis and are acquainted with the political situation. "I believe," said Mr. Gray, "that the interview with Mr. Curtis, published this morning, should be answered in behalf of the people at large of this county. I dislike very much to enter into this controversy, but I feel that, as a citizen and a member of the republican party, the statements should not go unchallenged."

"Mr. Curtis has stopped over again and is ranting around the streets, making threats as to what he is going to do to the republican party if the convention does not nominate him for the legislature. In the first place, what does he want with the office? An honest man can only receive \$3 a day for forty days, and mileage, a total of about \$100 for the entire session. He has had much to say concerning his support of better roads legislation. What has he done? He has not succeeded in securing the slightest legislation for the benefit of the roads of Clatsop county. Other members did succeed in accomplishing something, but it was done in spite of Curtis. They could have done much more had he not been there. Curtis failed to accomplish anything, during his two terms of service, of benefit to the county. Mr. Curtis is reported to have said: 'I have always been a republican and am today.' He should have said, except when he could bulldoze weak politicians to put him on the republican ticket, and in every instance he has disgraced the city, county and party by his incompetent and irresponsible acts. This expert flopper or 'flipper,' has cost the city of Astoria and Clatsop county many thousands of dollars—sometimes, by his petulant disregard of duty but, generally, by his utter carelessness and ignorance of the law, whereby he has misled those who have depended upon him."

"In his interview of yesterday he said: 'I admit that I am to blame for a certain report that has gained considerable credence, that I ran away with the 'Nickle-in-the-slot' bill. People have been in the habit, as a 'josh,' of accusing me of divers and sundry acts and I have always allowed them to believe that they were correct in their deductions, but, as a matter of fact, I never ran away with any bill. The bill referred to was given by me to E. H. Flagg, of Marion county, a member of the committee to which the bill was referred, and while I was engaged exporting the books of the deaf mute school, he reported favorably on the bill and it was passed and is now a law, as appears by the session laws and the house journal."

"Curtis and many others know that he ran away from the legislature in 1899 with the nickle-in-the-slot-machine bill in his pocket. He left Salem after dark and walked twelve miles to Deery, in Polk county, and took the train the following morning from that place to Portland, where Mr. Curtis, the self-disgraced member from Clatsop county, remained in hiding until the last day of the session. After hearing that the other members of the committee to whom the bill had been referred, had reported on the measure, and that the legislature had passed a substitute bill, he returned to the capitol at Salem. Curtis afterward, in the justice's court in this city, not only acknowledged, but boasted of this act. This and many more of his notorious and unscrupulous acts, caused Curtis and Clatsop county to be a by-word and a stench to all honest men. The \$15,000 hatchery appropriation bill lost at least six votes on account of Curtis' action with the slot machine bill, and was very nearly defeated."

"The district attorney bill was a general measure, gotten up by the attorneys in the nine judicial districts of the state. The truth of the matter, as far as Mr. Curtis' connection is concerned, is that they greatly feared that by letting Curtis introduce the measure it would without doubt be defeated."

Continuing, Judge Gray said: "Until Curtis became known as the great introducer of bills of questionable merit he was in demand, and he has continually boasted, with unbecoming pride, of the great number of bills presented to the legislature by himself. Any school boy with a substantial type-writer could have done as well."

In his interview in the Astorian this morning Curtis says 'I introduced and passed the district attorney bill, which has saved Clatsop county over \$4,000. I introduced and passed the bill requiring the sheriff not to levy upon property for delinquent taxes, which has saved the county \$2,700 a year, that being the sum paid Harry Bell for levying upon property for delinquent taxes.'

"Mr. Curtis' claims relative to the passage of the sheriff tax bill is false. Mr. Curtis not only did not present the bill, which he claims to have fathered, but, it is said, was even not present to vote upon the final passage of the measure. The bill was introduced and pushed through by Senator Dufur of Wasco county."

"It is evident that Mr. Curtis is anxious to get in his 'graft' again, but I think it is safe to say that the republicans of Clatsop county will take great precautions to see that he does not succeed in the fulfillment of his selfish designs."

AN OUNCE OF PREVENTION.

Dr. Kinney Defends the Action of Victoria Quarantine Officials.

To the Editor:—I notice in today's Astorian an article condemning the Victoria authorities for quarantining the vessels coming from San Francisco on account of the plague.

Allow me to differ with you in this matter. The Victoria authorities did just what was right. The present quarantine regulations are not sufficiently strict. In a time like the present when this country is threatened with an epidemic of the plague—the most deadly disease on the face of the globe—but yet heretofore unknown in our Western Hemisphere, it is far better to be over-cautions than not cautious enough.

The tendency of the times is grasping—money-getting. It is to satisfy lives and the well being and even the moral welfare of the people for trade. This is wrong, dangerous and poor policy. The time to act is right now if we are to prevent further introduction of the plague in this country. We should put strict quarantine regulations on every steamer and vessel coming across the ocean into a Pacific coast port. We should kill the rats on all such vessels, no matter whether such vessels have a clean board of health or not. We should make a general crusade against the rats in every Pacific coast town and city. Of course there are many other things to do too, but in my judgment this is the most important, and I am proud to see that my own city of Astoria has taken the lead in this matter ahead of any other Pacific coast city.

BOYS CLUB SOCIAL

Young Members of the Congregational Church Entertain Their Friends.

The members of the Boys Club of the Congregational church gave a very interesting and enjoyable social last evening in the church parlors. About seventy-five in all were present and enjoyed the short program, the games, and sports in the gymnasium and the excellent refreshments which were served about 2:30. Many pronounced it one of the best socials that they ever attended and gave the boys great credit for their part as hosts of the evening. A notable feature of the evening was a short drill by the boys under the command of Mr. J. Gheen.

There has not been an alarm of fire in Astoria for more than two months. The longest period without an alarm recorded in the history of the Astoria department was in 1899, when for four months no alarm was sent in. The firemen believe that the spring of 1900 will break this record. They do not look for active service for another three months to come. It must not be imagined, however, that the fire ladders are rusting because of want of active practice. Drills and exercises are kept up every day just as if the firemen belonged in Portland, where a day without a fire alarm is an exception to the rule.

J. W. Hobbs, of McMinnville, deputy revenue collector of the Fourth district, is in the city. Mr. Hobbs is a well-known resident of Yamhill county, and in speaking of the general condition prevailing in that section, stated that the farmers were much more hopeful this year than for some time past. The low prices for hops and wheat which has prevailed in the past couple of years, he said, had taken the snap and ambition out of the agricultural element, but the recent improvement had inspired renewed hope and all were feeling much better in consequence.

AMUSEMENT FOR THE MULTITUDE

Astoria to Be Made a Pacific Coney Island.

TO BUILD A RECREATION PARK

Will Be Run in Connection With Sunday Excursions From Portland Eastern Parties Behind the Venture.

A number of gentlemen from St. Paul were in Astoria yesterday looking for grounds near this city for a recreation park.

"Our object," said one of the gentlemen, who seemed to be the leader in the enterprise, "is to find a good location where we can open a summer garden, with a captive balloon, toboggan slide, merry-go-round, hurdles and all the latest Eastern fads in vogue at Coney Island and other Eastern Sunday summer resorts."

"We will run at least one and probably two steamboats from Portland to Astoria every Sunday. The boats will leave Portland say at 7 in the morning sharp and, making no stop, will arrive in Astoria about 1 o'clock in the afternoon."

"On the return trip the boat will leave Astoria at 6 in the evening and reach Portland at midnight. This will give the Portland people at the recreation park here a delightful night ride home. There will be music and dancing on the boat and at the park. Refreshments will be sold at the park but we are undecided as to whether we will try to sell beer and other liquors or not. It is probably we will not attempt to sell liquors in the park here. This will, however, depend upon whether or not we decide to put on a continuous performance vaudeville show at the park. If we can get the right kind of talent without too much cost we will undoubtedly run a continuous performance show and in that event will want to sell beer and other liquors to the patrons at the tables."

"We are satisfied that a park and river excursion project will pay in Portland or Astoria on Sundays and if the Portland people do not want to take the river trip they can come to Astoria park by rail for a quarter, enjoy a balloon ascension, a toboggan ride, an hour's vaudeville entertainment, a ride over the hurdles and all the rest of it and return home by rail for another quarter, reaching Portland by 10 at night. In fact it is more than likely the Astoria railroad will be only too glad to run special trains for us on Sundays but we certainly will not ask it as we expect to derive a good share of our profits from the boats."

"We are prepared for the almost universal cry that will be raised, viz, Oh, it will never pay! Similar schemes have paid elsewhere where the advantages offered were by no means as great as the advantages offered here. We own the appliances to fit up a recreation park with the exception of a building for music, dancing and vaudeville theater, which can all be combined under one roof. We want a location facing on the river but will only use the water for the toboggan slide dish. Sailing and row boats are too much trouble and involve too much risk to pay."

"We will bring the band on the boat down the river with us and it will furnish concert, dance and theater music during the afternoon. The company is by no means a rich one but we have \$15,000 which we made in similar ventures elsewhere that we are willing to risk here, providing the people do not want to rob us. If we decide to start the park will be ready for visitors by the middle of April. We have picked our steamboat, know its speed and what it will cost us. We haven't talked to the railroad people, as yet, in fact we probably will have no dealings with them, as they certainly could not offer to make a lower rate of fare than that now regularly charged and we expect no portions of that amount."

"All we are going to ask of Astoria is a chance to do business and we believe, when we are ready to make our final proposition, your people will meet us half way in all we ask. We will give all reference necessary when the time comes. Neither cities like Rome nor recreation parks are built in a day. We ask no financial aid but patronage of the people. You will hear from us again very shortly, I hope, and then you can give names, location of the park and all the rest of it. Either that or you will hear from us no more."

The gentlemen who represent the company in question are looking for a site for the park today and will return to Portland tonight. They seem to mean business and with Astoria's well deserved and well established reputation as a summer resort, the selection of this place for a trial of what is a well established business in the Eastern states, i. e., all east of the Mississippi river, seems good business sense. It will be a success here if anywhere on the coast.
