Republican papers in the interior are filled with criticisms and denunciations of Mr. Bryan's recent speeches in the Northwest. These papers are wasting space and misdirecting efforts which should be applied otherwise. It does not lie in the power of Mr. Bryan, nor in the organization and activity of his followers in the coming campaign to endanger republican success in Oregon this year. Mr. Bryan could not carry Oregon in a year of unparalleled business depression and public discontent; his arguments on their own merits and the enunciations of his Kansas City platform are sure to repel many even of the votes he received last time. Nevertheless there is a foe to republicanism abroad in Oregon this year which must have the instant and unremitting attention of the state and county republican committees from the very beginning of the campaign. Oregon occupies a unique position among the states of the Union in a presidential year. It is here that the republicans first assemble and give voice to what are assumed to be republican sentiments with reference to understood party purposes in the approaching general campaign. It is here that the votes of the people are first taken and recorded on the approval or disapproval of anticipated issues and the policies outlined or adopted by the leaders in congress and elsewhere. The responsibilities of Oregon republicans, therefore, are greater than those of republicans in any other section, even the most populous and influential states in the Union. Today there is pending in congress two important matters of public policy upon which the administration and the almost unanimous majority in congress have taken a decided stand. Before many days both these matters will have been enacted into laws by the republican majority and will have received the approval of the republican executive. Both laws will be subjects of prominent endorsement in the national republican platform; both will be strongly condemned by the Bryan platform. Upon these laws, then, the republicans must go to the country and upon their success in defending them republican victory in the coming campaign will largely depend. The principles involved in these issues affect the very foundation of the great question of commercial expansion, and without the adoption of these principles, from the republican standpoint, at least—and there is no other affirma-

tive standpoint from which the question of expansion can be viewed—all attempts to secure for our people—particularly Pacific coast people—the best fruits of commercial expansion will be impracticable and vain. These important matters of public policy—republican policy—the Puerto Rican tariff and the proposed national aid in rehabilitating this country's merchant marine. Yet, for reasons which need not be explained to intelligent people in Oregon, these two vital principles in the republican stand this year have been selected for special attack by a certain influence in the party councils and every effort is being put forth—deliberately put forth—to mislead and prejudice public opinion—republican opinion—in Oregon concerning them. Here is the enemy that confronts Oregon republicanism at the threshold of the coming campaign. Here is the real foe against whom the republicans of Oregon want to be forewarned. Here is the insidious influence; the treacherous traitor with whom the state and county republican committees of Oregon will have to contend in the coming campaign. It is not Bryan and Bryanism, but members of their own household that republicans have got to be taught to fear. Let every individual republican be aroused! Let every republican newspaper print the facts needed to educate the people as to the merits of these great public questions and the high and patriotic motive which inspires the position of the administration and the majority in congress upon them. The people of Oregon, except in a few rare instances, have had no opportunity for hearing the other side of these questions. Of course the people of the whole country will thoroughly understand the republican party in this connection before the campaign ends in November, but it will then be too late for Oregon republicans to correct a large part of the evil resulting from a wrong declaration in convention and a wrong exhortation at the polls in June. The work of presenting the republican side of these questions should begin without delay. Plenty of facts and figures can be obtained to refute the distortions and misrepresentations with which it is to be feared too many republican minds have already been filled. Every delegate to the Portland convention should be sent there with the right understanding of his party's purposes and aims. It is the duty of the party press to instruct them and this duty should be performed at once. It is going out to the Nation every day that Oregon republicans are opposing the administration and condemning their own members of congress on the questions here alluded to. The way to correct that impression is through strong, ringing declarations at Portland next Thursday. Oregon republicans must not repeat the error once made concerning free silver. The republican national convention is going to stand by the ship subsidy and Puerto Rican tariff laws. No state in the Union has more, if as much, commercial interest in upholding the hands of the administration and the majority in congress on these questions as has Oregon. She must lead the Nation in the strength and clearness of her position and the loyalty of her support for both of them.

NINTH STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Notice is hereby given that the common council of said city has determined and intends to improve all that portion of Ninth street in the city of Astoria as laid out and recorded by John McClure, Clatsop county, state of Oregon, fronting north line of Bond street to the south side of Astor street, to the full width thereof and on the established grade. Said improvement is to be made by filling in from curb to curb with dirt so as to bring said portion of said street to the established grade, and laying stringers thereon and planking the same with covering plank 4 inches in thickness by 12 inches wide, and by the construction of sidewalks and gutters on each side of said portion of said street. Said improvement in matters of detail, except as herein otherwise provided, shall be constructed in conformity to the provisions of general ordinance No. 191, entitled "An ordinance in relation to the improvement of streets," approved January 3, 1895, except that either red or yellow fir may be used so long as the same is good and sound lumber.

That the lots and expenses of said improvement shall be defrayed by special assessment upon the lots, lands and premises fronting upon, adjacent to and abutting on the street to be improved, which said lots and premises included in a special assessment district to be assessed to defray the costs and expenses of said improvement and which said district includes the lots, lands and premises benefited by said improvement and is as follows, to-wit: Commencing at the southwest corner of lot 6 in block 9 and running thence north to the northwest corner of lot 3 in block 9, thence east to the northeast corner of lot 2 in block 55, thence south to the southeast corner of lot 7 in block 55, thence west along the south lines of said blocks 9 and 55 to the lot line of block 21, thence east to the lot line of block 21, thence north to the southeast corner of lot 1, 2, 3, 10, 11, and 12, in blocks 115, 17 and 20 respectively, and lots 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 in blocks 114, 18 and 22 respectively, all in that part of the city of Astoria, Clatsop county, state of Oregon, as laid out and recorded by John McClure and extended by Cyrus Olney.
