POLITICAL NOTES.

Something More About Mr. Lyman and His Views on the War-Republican Rally.

In trying to evade responsibility for his utterances, Candidate Lyman abruptly closed several days ago "a discussion which was evidently becoming distasteful to him, in a letter in which he denied that he had placed Aguinaldo on a par with George Washington. If it were not for the fact that Mr. Lyman is seeking to control the schools of Clatsop County, it would hardly be worth while to follow up his record on the Philippine question, since he, and the others who think as he does, are in such a hopeless minority in this country as to create no concern as to their attitude toward the United States.

But do the citizens of Clatsop County want a man to govern the education of their children who, over his own signature, publishes the following as his belief and convictions?

"Greetings to you, Aguinaldo. Aid and comfort, if you please; Greetings to you, Aguinaldo. Waited down the Western seas.

"Aguinaldo, you're a hero. Such as swells our heart with pride, To our own and all the heroes. Aguinaldo, you're allied."

and a half dozen more verses of the same tenor.

So proud was Mr. Lyman of his poem that he signed it, forgetting section 5321 of the revised statutes of the United States which says:

"Every person owing allegiance to the United States who levies war against them or adheres to their enemies giving them aid and comfort within the United States or elsewhere, is GUILTY OF TREASON.

And the section of the statutes following the above, after providing for the punishment of traitors—which shall be death or imprisonment at hard labor for not less than five years with a fine of \$10,000—says that such traitors shall be incapable of holding any office under the United States.

If Mr. Lyman never placed Aguinaldo and George Washington on a par, what does he mean by saying the tagalo is "allied" to all our heroes? Mr. Lyman has now an opportunity to write another letter—but he will have hard work in eradicating from the minds of the loyal voters, of all parties, the sentiments of hostility to our government and praise for its enemies, he has so freely expressed in the past.

Let the youth of the land be taught loyalty in their youth and not have held up to them as an example of a hero, such a guerrilla as Aguinaldo.

Billy Pohl ought to offer up a fervent prayer to be delivered from his friends. Before the nominations of the "citizens" convention, Pohl told Charlie Mathena that if he, Mathena, got the citizens nomination, he, Pohl, would not run as an independent against him. This Pohl has never denied, nor has he seen fit to explain why he broke faith with Mathena and came out as an independent.

While Pohl has been doing no explaining, some of his friends have, and the result is that Mathena's friends—especially those who say they heard Pohl's declaration—are more than angry, and now propose to bring him to book. Of course, neither Mathena nor Pohl can hope to be coroner. E. P. Parker, the republican nominee, will carry the full strength of his ticket and that will easily elect him. But it will be amusing to watch the little row in the independent camp when Mathena drives Pohl into a corner and makes him either admit that his friends have "explained him into trouble" and that he did break his word with Mathena, or else deny that he ever gave his word not to run as an independent.

This little thing is doing more to hurt Pohl in his canvass than all his political hop-scotching. Men will forgive political treachery sometimes, but they won't forgive a man who deliberately breaks his pledged word.

BRYAN POPULISTS IN CONVENTION

since political parties were first organized, has any party ever shown the same unselfish devotion to principle as has the people's party. Several weeks before the people's party national convention assembled in 1896, every member of the party, from Maine to California, and from the lakes to the Gulf, expected to see the national convention that met at St. Louis nominate a straight people's party ticket for president and vice-president; but at the democratic national convention which assembled in Chicago a few weeks before the unexpected happened.

"The democratic convention, which had for many years been following false gods, returned to the faith of Jefferson, and adopted a platform and nominated a candidate that came near standing for the great fundamental principles of good government which Jefferson, Jackson and Lincoln advocated and amplified by their career. True, the platform did not specifically declare for all of the creeds of Jefferson and Lincoln, as had the populists' party platforms from the beginning, but the convention named a candidate that commanded the respect and confidence of every follower of Jefferson and Lincoln to so great a degree that the people's party put patriotism and country above party, refused to nominate another candidate, but accepted the democratic candidate, and had the nominee for vice-president stood for what the nominee for president did, that candidate also would have been accepted.

"With the help of the people's party and patriotic silver republicans under the lead of Teller, Towne, Dubois, Cannon and Pettigrew, we polled for that ticket more votes than any ticket of any party had ever before received in the history of the nation. Today we are facing another national campaign. Since 1896 the trusts and monopolies have increased and multiplied in number and manifold power. The national banks have been given greater power to inflate and contract our circulating medium and thus make prices and speculate upon the products of a people. Since then the spectre of monarchy and imperialism has definitely raised its head to defy the goddess of liberty in the highest executive and legislative halls. Three parties are ready to join hands to call a halt, to demand a change, and to make one supreme effort to restore the republic to the fundamental principles laid down by the forefathers.

"The people's party national convention is the first of the three in the field. We stand ready now to do everything in our power to unite the three parties into a common fight for the constitution, for country and for humanity, we stand ready to put

country above party and do whatever patriotism demands and honor will permit to win a victory for the people and for the republic. I feel that every delegate in this convention indorses this sentiment. I know you do. How to accomplish this result is not for me to dictate. I can trust it to your wisdom and patriotism."

At midnight the situation with the vice-presidency was still a paramount among the delegates and the solution of the problem was apparently as far off as it was when the delegates began to arrive.

trolled by the railroads and trust interests until favorable legislation from our law making bodies is absolutely out of the question. So our great strike should be made for the system known as the initiative and referendum, under and by which the people can demand the right to vote upon these great questions. I have not the slightest doubt that when they are given that privilege, free from the shackles of party fealty, that these privileges will be settled and settled right.

"That will give us pure democracy. That will bring down party barriers; that will crush the spirit of bitter partisanship, and instead of witnessing the spectacle of 12,000,000 voters marching to the ballot box to vote for their parties we will see all these voters untrammelled and unbiased, vote according to the dictates of their consciences and their judgment, for such laws as will restore this government to the people.

"One of the greatest trusts today is the political trust. A few men have acquired all the wealth of the country and a desperate attempt is being made to form a political trust by which the election franchise will be placed in the hands of the favored few and the masses allowed no voice in the affairs of the government. Witness the appalling spectacle of the renovated, rejuvenated democracy fastening on the proud old state of Kentucky, the curse of Goebels, under which elections have become a farce and under which it is possible for the party in power to disfranchise even a majority of the citizens of the state and deprive them of their right of suffrage. Not alone in Kentucky is this the case, but in other Southern states conditions are almost as bad and the deadly virus having once found lodgment in the body politic, it threatens to spread until the whole country becomes corrupted; until the voice of the people has been effectively hushed.

"Then, indeed, will the hope for reform have been banished forever. The only way to check the rising tide of corruption which has spread over our fair Southland and which will ultimately reach our sister states in other sections of the union, is our system of direct legislation. Today a number of our misguided brethren have assembled in a western city to attempt to deliver our party to democracy. Many of them no doubt are earnest and sincere men who have been misled by designing politicians, and for these I have no word of censure.

"But for those who have deceived them, those who have bent the pregnant hinges of the knee, that thrift might follow folly, I have the supremest contempt. They will fail in their mission, I have no doubt. I have no doubt that fusion will be dealt its death blow in this year of grace 1900. "Let your action here today be a message to the populists of this country that never again will our party halt by the wayside to listen to the sirens song and alluring promise of designing men, but that we have again unfurled our banner to the breeze; that we have consecrated our party anew to the cause of liberty and freedom. Four thousand years ago, Cain asked the question: "Am I my brother's keeper?" Two thousand years later the great Nazarene laid down the principle the laborer is worthy of his hire.

when we have banished this cursed competitive system and have led men up into the light of the great truth of the brotherhood of man. To this task I commend your best endeavors for the fulfillment of its mission. The people's party was born and from the years of sacrifice or privation of abuse and social ostracism, we have held still on our course, except for the one time, in 1896, when we were tempted to turn aside by the flesh pots of Egypt. That is the only sin which our party has committed.

"But for that sin it has certainly done penance and I do not believe it is to perish off the face of the earth for this one transgression. All great reformers have had their traitors. Jesus Christ had his Judas Iscariot. When he prayed in the garden of Gethsemane he prayed alone and as he climbed Calvary's rugged brow he bore his own cross.

"So our party has been deserted by its Butlers, and Allens and Weavers and today let us take courage and hope, learn experience from the past and march on to the great and glorious victory which awaits those who know how to labor and wait."

Ignatius Donnelly then addressed the convention, speaking of the Sioux Falls convention, saying:

"There is not a fusionist in the whole gang. The Lord has separated the sheep from the goats and the exuviae are all gathered at Sioux Falls. The future success of mankind hinges on this movement of ours.

"The Omaha convention of 1896 nominated a man and gave him prominence which only enabled him to sell out his friends, and," he exclaimed, "the traitors are now assembled at Sioux Falls in obsequious servility to the democratic party. They are parting their coat tails and inviting democrats to kick them and every time they are kicked they thank God and take courage."

He denounced Bryan and lauded Thomas C. Watson. Bryan, said he, was nearer the presidency in 1896 than he ever will be again. Donnelly concluded: "I feel that this is a re-birth of the people's party with the vermin scraped off."

The two most important committees appointed during the day included the following delegates: Committee on resolutions: Oregon—J. L. Hill; Washington—E. R. Carpenter; committee on plan of party organization: Oregon—S. H. Holt; Alaska; Washington—Thomas.

ILLINOIS REPUBLICANS.

Yates Wins Out for Governor After a Prolonged Struggle—McKinley Indorsed.

PEORIA, Ill., May 9.—Governor, Richard Yates, of Jacksonville; lieutenant governor, Wm. A. Northcott, of Bond county; secretary of state, Jas. A. Rose, of Pope county; auditor of state, James S. McCulloch, of Champaign county; state treasurer, M. O. Williamson, of Ogle county; attorney general, Howard I. Hamlin, of Shelbyville. The republican state convention today nominated the above ticket.

The nomination for governor was made on the fourth ballot after a prolonged struggle.

The resolutions endorse the administration of President McKinley and reaffirm the entire St. Louis platform. Trusts are denounced and the gold standard recommended. Governor Tanner's administration is approved and the return of Shelby McCulloch to the United States senate strongly recommended.

Richard Yates, nominee for governor, is the son of "Dick" Yates, the famous war governor of Illinois, and is but 39 years of age. He announced his candidacy for congressman at large in 1892, but after a stirring campaign was defeated. Yates is a lawyer, but at the present time holds an appointment under President McKinley as city revenue collector of the Springfield district.

CORBETT AND JEFFRIES.

Disagreement Has Aroused Between the Principals Over the Selection of Friday Night's Referee.

NEW YORK, May 9.—The Herald says:

James J. Jeffries and James J. Corbett have locked horns over the selection of a referee for their battle at the Seaside Sporting Club, Coney Island, on Friday night.

Jeffries wants "Charlie" White to officiate, while Corbett insists upon the appointment of Sam Austin. Unless the principals come to an agreement in the meantime there is apt to be quite a wrangle at the ring side over the matter.

"When the match was made," Corbett said, "Wm. A. Brady, Jeffries' manager, suggested Austin for referee. I wanted Tim Hurst to officiate, but as Brady would not accept any man but Austin, I agreed. Now, for some reason best known to himself, Jeffries wants Charlie White to be referee. If Austin was good enough for Jeffries when the match was made, he certainly is good enough now."

When the attention of Wm. A. Brady was called to Corbett's statement last night, he said:

"Jeffries wants White as referee. Personally, I would as soon have Austin officiate, but the champion believes that White is better qualified for the position and he refuses to accept anybody else."

Many stories have been told in regard to the bout between Jeffries and Corbett used to have at Carson City, when the present champion was acting as Corbett's sparring partner. Corbett has always claimed that he used to knock Jeffries out whenever he wanted to do so. On the other hand, Jeffries says that Corbett never hit him to sleep. In view of this difference of opinion, a statement from Billy Delaney, who has trained both men for championship battles, is interesting. Delaney says that Jeffries' version of the bout is correct.

"Corbett," continued Delaney, "never knocked out the boiler-maker. Although Jeffries had had little experience at the time, he used to box with Corbett at Carson City, and made a very creditable exhibition with the then champion."

ST. LOUIS STRIKE.

Situation Quieter Yesterday, but One Man Killed While Assaulting a Car.

ST. LOUIS, May 9.—The second day of the great street railway strike in St. Louis was not marked by the turbulence and rioting of yesterday, though the day closed with a tragedy.

The St. Louis Transit Company made no efforts to run its cars and the St. Louis and Suburban made none until late in the afternoon, when with the police massed along the line and a detachment on each car, it succeeded in getting a number through. So far from relieving the situation, however, this demonstration had no further effect than to show that by massing their force on a single line, the police could keep that line open.

A proclamation from Mayor Zeigler, calling upon the people to preserve order and avoid gathering on the streets was issued this afternoon. A dynamite cartridge was exploded under a car on the Meramec Highlands division of the suburban line with great force this morning. The car was occupied by a dozen workmen of the company. Succeeding the explosion a number of shots were fired in quick succession, but the persons who did the firing were not seen, owing to the darkness, and nobody on the car was struck by the bullets.

The first tragedy in connection with the strike occurred tonight when a car was passing the Baptist Sanatorium. A number of men gathered in the grounds of the institution, and threw rocks at it. Some one on the car fired a shot at the crowd, the bullet finding lodgment in the breast of Frank Lebrecht, who fell dead.

THE RUSH SAILS.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 9.—Captain Cushing, of the revenue cutter Rush, which has sailed for the Arctic, will take a census of the inhabitants of the Aleutian islands, after which he will devote his attention to the Behring sea seal poachers.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—The senate has confirmed the following nominations: S. B. Dole to be governor and Henry E. Cooper to be secretary of Hawaii.

E. H. Bellows, of Washington, to be consul general at Yokohama.

VESUVIAN CABLE SUSPENDED.
