All the canneries had scores of visitors who were shown every detail of the process of handling salmon and very interesting it proved to be to most of them.

While there were hundreds who spent the day in enjoying themselves, the delegates to the grand lodge of Rebekahs and the grand Encampment had to attend to business and only got a chance to play during recess.

Following the conferring of degrees the reports of officers for the past year were read. They showed a rapid and substantial growth in the order which is in excellent condition, both as regards membership and finances.

In this connection it may be stated that Beaver lodge, I. O. O. F., of this city may give the visiting delegates an excursion to Seaside on Thursday next, providing a sufficient number remain to make it a success.

The entertainment tonight at Foard & Stokes' hall will consist of a program of vocal and instrumental music, short addresses and an exhibition by Prof. Begg's dancing class of children. It will certainly be a very pleasant affair.

The following grand officers followed: An increase in membership of 189 during the past year was shown, making the total 1,388. In addition there was one Encampment resuscitated; two instituted; none suspended, and reports and tax were received from every Encampment in the jurisdiction.
