### ASTORIA'S NEW HOUSES.

Several Fine Residences Now Being Erected.

The amount of capital now being put into elegant residences here is evidence that our well-to-do citizens have ample confidence in Astoria's future.

In a few days, work is to begin on a \$10,000 residence for C. W. Fulton, on the corner of Seventeenth street and Irving avenue. On the opposite corner, George H. George, secretary of the Columbia River Packers Association, is erecting an elegant mansion, 10 cost in the neighborhood of \$4,500. The shingling of the roof is now nearing completion. The house will contain eight large rooms, and will be 2 1/2 stories high, besides the basement having a cemented floor. A large hot-air heater will be put in, and all other modern improvements will be used. The foundation on the lower side is fifteen feet deep, to insure stability. Another fine house, being built by Contractor Miller for Captain P. C. Cordiner, is near Mr. George's new place on the same street. No more comfortable or better built house can be found in Astoria. From cellar to roof it is a model of convenience and fine workmanship. The finishing touches are now being put on, and the contractor expects to hand it over to Captain Cordiner about the first of next month. It contains every modern appliance for comfort, nine rooms and basement, and will be completed at a cost of about \$2,100. The substantial foundation was secured from the old ledge which lies just west of the house.

Another very comfortable home is that being built by Captain Johnson and to be occupied by Apothecary Rogers. It is located on Tenth street, between Franklin and Grand avenues. It is also nearing completion, and will cost in the neighborhood of \$1,800, containing eight rooms and bath room. The plasterers have just begun work on the residence which Mr. Basei is building for rental on Eleventh Street, between Harrison and Irving avenues. It is a very neat house, two and a half stories high, containing nine rooms and bath, and will cost about \$1,500.
