It is probable that a special meeting of the city council will be called next week to see if some plan cannot be arranged by which our streets can be lighted for the Fourth, if no longer.

Last night was a gala time for the Masons of Astoria, being the occasion of the annual official visit of Grand Master Thielsen, of Salem. Many distinguished visitors from abroad were present. Among others, Judge M. C. George, of Portland; Secretary of State F. I. Dunbar, of Salem; Major G. H. Hegerdt, of Fort Stevens; J. S. Rathbun, grand lecturer and custodian of the work for the Willamette district, and Henry Griffin, of Washington, D. C., brother of Master J. N. Griffin. The lodge was presented with a gavel of great historic value by Master J. N. Griffin. The head was made from a portion of a magnolia tree planted by George Washington in 1799, the year of his death, and the handle was from a tree planted by General Lafayette in 1824. After the more sober and mysterious exercises of the evening were concluded, an adjournment was taken to the Boston restaurant, where the feast of viands which had been prepared was followed by a toast of reason and flow of soul which lasted till late into the night—or early in the morning.
