HAWAIIAN FRUITS.

The Honolulu Republican of June 29 contains an interview with a prominent fruit shipper regarding the possibilities and advantages of extensive fruit-raising there and the exportation of tropical and semi-tropical varieties to the States.

It is remarkable that our enterprising shippers and importers here have paid so little attention to importations of this kind, and now that a new line from Portland to Manila is being talked of, the immense possibilities of this trade should be considered.

Instead of the one poor quality of banana now found in the Oregon market, and for which the consumer has to pay from twenty-five to forty cents per dozen, many greatly superior varieties could be procured from the Hawaiian territory and elsewhere at a cost of from five to fifteen cents per dozen to the importer.

The same is true of the pineapple, which can be bought in the East Indies in unlimited quantities for three cents each, and landed in Portland inside of four weeks' time.

The possibilities of our new territory as a great supply station of the choicest tropical fruits are stupendous and mean fortunes to the producers there, as well as to the enterprising shippers who will undertake importations to this coast on a large scale.

JAPANESE JOURNALISM.

The Astorian has just received the first issue of a new paper called "The Japan Tribune," published in San Francisco. It is the only paper pub-

lished in the English language in America under Japanese management, and is devoted to the dissemination of general information suited to Japanese readers educated in English, or to Americans interested in Japanese affairs.

There is a charm about the style of Japanese writers who have a fair knowledge of English, though their foreign language is often as amusing to American readers as it is far-fetched. The following quotation from the editor's salutatory is a case in point: "Our editorial department shall contain a brace which will radiate tid bits of the cerebral spine and pyrotechnics peculiar to our individuality."

The Tribune is well printed on heavy paper and well edited, but more care in proof reading would improve its appearance.

The publishers propose to extend its circulation throughout the English-speaking Japanese settlements of the world, and as a means of increasing the now-existing familiarity and good feeling between Japan and America it will doubtless play an important part.

Nebraska hogs sold in Omaha, May 21, at \$4.50 per head more than on the same date four years ago, yet the World-Herald, Mr. Bryan's personal organ, which is published in Omaha, asserted very vigorously during the 1896 campaign that the prices of no farm products could advance without the free and unlimited coinage of silver.

Two billions two hundred millions of dollars was the value of our foreign commerce during the fiscal year just ended, of which American vessels carried 7 per cent—foreign ships carrying 30 per cent and earning \$200,000,000 at the expense of the American people.

The sentiment in favor of the passage of the ship subsidy bill grows stronger and stronger all over the country as the statistics of our foreign trade for the fiscal year just ended are studied.

Under this administration, our farmers, merchants and manufacturers have been assured that the markets of China would always be open to them in equal competition with other nations.

Every corn-fed steer in Nebraska is now worth \$12 to \$15 more than in 1896. Farmers in that state will hardly vote for democratic times again.

The total gross earnings of railroads were \$228,000,000 larger last year than in 1895.

A CHRISTIAN HERO.

Tacoma Ledger. So many events of world-wide interest have been taking place that the death of a hero, who, like Bayard and Sidney, was above fear and reproach, has attracted but little attention. Such a man was Admiral John W. Philip, who died a few days ago of heart disease. He is the second eminent commander of the Spanish-American War to pass over to the great majority. Admiral Philip had a long and honorable career as an officer of the American navy, seeing active service in two wars.

Admiral Philip will be best remembered as the victorious commander of the formerly hoodooed Texas, who said to his men at Santiago: "Don't cheer, boys, the poor devils are dying," and who after the battle bared his head and said to his ship's company: "I want to make public acknowledgement here that I believe in God the Father Almighty. I want all you officers and men to lift your hats and from your hearts offer thanks to the Almighty."

Captain Philip's words will be remembered with those of Philip Sidney and of the gallant Craven, who in the sinking monitor Tecumseh at Mobile said: "After you, pilot," and stepped back to death to allow his comrade to escape.
