AMERICAN BOXERS.

America, like all other civilized nations, is burdened with a considerable number of irresponsible hoodlums who take delight in creating disturbances and making trouble for municipal and national officials.

It is exceedingly unfortunate that the same element of Illinois and other central states should be repeating, even though only on a small scale, the Boxer outrages in China, and thereby creating a possible basis for disagreeable complications when the time arrives for settlement with the Celestial Empire.

The Chinese who are in America are all from Hong Kong and Canton, where there has been as yet no sympathy manifested for the Boxers, and are in no manner responsible for the outrages which may be perpetrated by the Manchu barbarians of the north.

It is true that outrages have been perpetrated against the Chinese in Berlin also, but the arbitrary military rule which dominates the German capital will not permit the continuation of riotous conduct on the part of the rabble, which our own popular government is more timid about quelling.

Astoria is fortunate in possessing an orderly and peace-loving class of citizens so little likely to disturb our Chinese residents that they are probably safer from molestation here than they would be in their native land.

MISSIONARY SCAPEGOATS.

Tacoma Ledger. The opinion prevails to some extent that the prime cause of the present deplorable troubles in China is the attempts of missionaries to introduce the Christian religion into the country, and to convert the Chinese to that faith.

There can be no doubt that missionary work in China has increased antagonism among fanatics; it is equally clear that mischief makers and rioters have incited outbreaks among the fanatical class by denouncing the men that were teaching the people to put their faith in strange gods, instead of Confucius and Joss, and worshipping idols.

ness history and customs know that riot, insurrection and rebellion have formed an important part of that history for centuries. There were troubles of this nature centuries before Jesus taught the brotherhood of man.

China has always had political troubles like those she is having now, and the attempt to introduce the Christian religion, while it may have added fuel to the flame, did not start the fires which have been either burning or smoldering for centuries.

It was not until modern times, since the days of the reformation of the West and Whitfield, that any active work was begun in China, yet there were insurrections, battles, murder and sudden death in the various provinces for centuries before that.

As much or more opposition has been made to the introduction of the methods and materials of modern civilization as to the introduction of the Christian religion. They have mobbed engineers and workmen who attempted to build railways in the empire, and have torn up railway tracks already built.

China is poorly governed, needing a strong central authority. There is corruption and incapacity in official circles, and almost independent government in the different provinces make uprisings and riots easy to incite and hard to control or quell.

Another cause for the Chinese hatred of "foreign devils" during the past few years has been the territorial aggrandizement of European powers, taking territory and ports upon the slightest excuse. The literati, the ruling classes, are opposed to the reform element that desires to develop the resources of the country and to open it to civilization and commerce.

The culmination of these centuries of murder, riot and rebellion in the murder of thousands of Europeans and Americans marks the beginning of the end of the old China. The Chinese puzzle will be solved before the present troubles are permanently settled.

Since the 4th of March, 1897, congress has authorized the construction of forty-nine ships, with a total displacement of 245,484 tons. This includes eight battleships of the first class; six armored cruisers of the first class; four monitors and nine protected cruisers.
