ANARCHIST CHOSEN
TO KILL M'KINLEY

Fiendish Plots Hatched at Paterson, N. J.

FOUR MURDERS PLANNED

One of the Anarchists Confesses—Incident in the Life of Famous Female Anarchist Recently Arrested in Paris.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—The Italian newspaper, *Progresso Italo-Americano*, has received a letter postmarked New York City and signed "Giulio Altieri," born at Ancona, emigrated in 1897. The writer declares that he was "enlisted by deceit" in the anarchist society of Paterson, N. J., and being afraid to withdraw, learned of the plot to assassinate King Humbert. He writes:

"On May 1 of this year, lots were cast for the infamous enterprise. The first was Gaetano Bresci's chance for the assassination of the emperor of Italy; the second one Arturo Giovannelli's for the killing of President McKinley. Lots were drawn to kill the emperor of Germany, emperor of Austria, and the president of France, Lombard."

The writer adds that on May 18 he notified the Italian consul, Branchi, of the intention to kill King Humbert, and that he also notified the Federal government that President McKinley was to be assassinated. He explains that his conscience compels him to write the truth of the matter. Consul Branchi laughed when shown the letter.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Emanuel M. Friend, an attorney of this city, claims to have known "La Bella Theresa," of anarchist fame, who was arrested in Paris, and says her real name is Mrs. Theresa Ighani. He says:

"About a year ago an Italian named La Guardia affronted her. The woman apparently ignored the insult, and fooled the man into believing she was in love with him. One night in her place she gave him a glass of wine. While he was drinking she threw vitriol in his face. Then she dragged him to a bus and threw water in his face, causing the vitriol to burn more severely than ever."

"La Bella's mother lives in New Britain, Conn., where her father was a wealthy fruit dealer. He often came to this city, and about six months ago his body was picked out of North River. He had been struck on the head and his pockets rifled."

NEGROES START A BANK.

Form an Association the Members of Which Will Pay One Cent a Week.

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—Members of the American Protective League, the association of colored men formed about a year ago and which held its first national convention at Indianapolis July 31 to August 3 last, met last night at Olivet church for the purpose of establishing financial headquarters in Chicago. The intention is to get together a strong financial institution by taxing all members a cent a week each and ultimately to form a national bank for the furtherance of undertakings beneficial to the race. Headquarters of the league are in Providence, R. I., but the financial center is to be in Chicago. At present there are something like 50,000 members. During the week regular offices will be established in this city and by next January it is hoped affairs will have progressed sufficiently to admit of the national bank being started here.

ACTIVITY IN THE PHILIPPINES.

No Settlement Can Be Made Until After the Election.

MANILA, Sunday, Aug. 12.—Reports from the Visayas islands show that there has been increased activity among the insurgents there during the last six weeks. The American forces in the island of Panay last month were greater than in any month since January last. General Mojica in Leyte and General Lucban in Samar are harassing the guerrillas, shooting into the towns during the night and ambushing small parties, firing and then retreating upon the larger bodies. The rebels possess an ample supply of ammunition

and are organized to a considerable degree.

The Americans have garrisoned three towns on Samar island, two of which shelter a tenth of the original inhabitants, who suffer from the continual "sniping" of the rebels from the surrounding hills. The third is without any native inhabitants, the rebel outposts a mile away preventing their return to their homes. General Lucban punished the islanders who have any relations with the Americans. Cebu is likewise disturbed.

Barring those who have taken the oath of allegiance to the United States the rebels are imprisoned in Manila. The banks, under government pressure, have restored the exchange rate of two Mexican silver dollars to one gold American dollar. General MacArthur has ordered the acceptance of American money for all public dues at the above rate.

Newspapers containing the National Democratic platform have arrived. The reference therein to the Philippine independence and to a protectorate tend to strengthen the extreme anti-American element in its increasing attitude of delay and obstruction. It is believed that radical steps for a settlement here will be impossible before election.

The Philippine commission. It is now announced, will make all future civil service appointments.

Several minor engagements occurred last week in Luzon. The rebels used smokeless powder, which they must necessarily have obtained by filibustering.

TEN GERMAN TRANSPORTS.

Will Sail From San Francisco Where a Special German Commission Now Awaits Them.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14.—A commission appointed by the German government to superintend the German transport service at this port has arrived here. The commission consists of Major Von Kleist, Lieutenant Von Bocke, and Messrs. Bergman and Kupfield, all of Berlin.

There is now a fleet of ten big steamers on its way to San Francisco, the majority of them coming from Bremen. The steamers are the Achen, Dresden, H. H. Meyer, Halle, Rhein, Strassburg, Adria, Sardinia, Batavia, and Phoenix, the latter being bound here from the Gulf of Mexico. The steamers will begin arriving, it is expected, in about thirty days. Grace and Co. have already made application for wharf facilities for the new service, and the harbor commissioners will extend every courtesy to the German ships.

ANOTHER YACHT RACE.

Sir Thomas Lipton Prepares a Cup For a Race By Seventy-Footers Next Month.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—David Barry, the American representative of Sir Thomas Lipton, was a guest recently at Station No. 3 of the New York Yacht Club, at the Atlantic Highlands, N. J. With a group of photographers he boarded the yacht in waiting and visited the scene of the cup race between the Shamrock and the Columbia off Sandy Hook. Negatives of the course, the Hook and the Headlands were taken and forwarded to Sir Thomas Lipton in London. Sir Thomas intends to select of the best of the pictures, from which an etching is to be made on a handsome loving cup. This cup is to be presented to the New York Yacht Club and raced for by the seventy-footers off Sandy Hook between September 10 and 15.

FUNERAL OF LORD RUSSELL.

Low Mass Celebrated by a Brother of the Deceased.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—The funeral services of Baron Russell of Killowen, lord chief justice of England, took place at Brompton Oratory this morning in the presence of a large congregation. Father Matthew Russell, a brother of the deceased chief justice, celebrated low mass.

At the conclusion of the services a hearse, bearing the plain oak coffin, and six coaches, containing the principal mourners, proceeded by road to Epworth, where the interment will take place.

ANXIETY FOR SHIP BERTHA.

Now a Fortnight Overdue at San Diego.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Aug. 14.—Some anxiety is felt for the safety of the German ship *Bertha*, bound from Hamburg for this port and thence to Puget Sound. The *Bertha* is now 162 days out. She was due a fortnight ago. She has a cargo of cement.

DEATH OF MAJOR PRIME.

Was Chief Engineer in General U. S. Grant's Mississippi Campaign.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Frederick E. Prime, an engineer officer of the Union army during the Civil war and chief engineer in Grant's Mississippi campaign, is dead at Litchfield, Conn. He belonged to one of the oldest families of New England, being descended from Mark Prime, who emigrated from England about 1640 and joined the colony that founded the town of Rowley, Mass. He was a grandson of Nathaniel Prime, head of the old-time firm of Prime Ward & King, which in its day was the largest banking house in New York, and was the oldest son of Rufus Prime, a well-known merchant and scholar of this city.

He was born in Florence, Italy, September 24, 1829, and was appointed to the West Point military academy from New York, being graduated in 1850 at the head of his class of 44. At the outbreak of the civil war he was captured at Pensacola, while on his way to Fort Pickens, but obtained his freedom in time for duty as assistant engineer on the construction of the defenses of Washington. He was in the Manassas campaign in 1861, took part in the battle of Bull Run, and afterwards engaged in the erection of the temporary defenses of the threatened city of Baltimore and then became in quick succession chief engineer of the departments of Kentucky, of the Cumberland and of the Ohio. While in the latter command he was wounded and taken prisoner during a reconnaissance near Millspring, Ky., on December 5, but was back to the army again in time to join General Grant in the spring of 1862.

He was breveted major for gallantry at the battle of Corinth, and lieutenant-colonel for gallantry during the siege of Vicksburg and was promoted to the rank of major in the corps of engineers June 1, 1863. He was breveted colonel, March 31, 1865, for gallantry and meritorious services during the whole war, and at the same time declined a brevet as brigadier-general in the United States army. His later services were in connection with the improvements of the mouth of the Mississippi and the survey of Galveston harbor.

CLEVELAND DOESN'T WANT IT.

Refuses the Nomination for the Presidency on a Third Party Ticket on Account of Poor Health.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 14.—Delegates to the two conventions of anti-imperialists are arriving by every train today, but still the number is not large. Massachusetts, New York and Pennsylvania are expected to send the largest delegations.

Carl Schurz, it is now known, will not be here, and in his place a speech in German will be delivered tomorrow night by Sigmund Zeisler, of Chicago. Bourke Cockran telegraphed Secretary A. Mize last night there was little doubt but that he would be there.

The executive committee of the anti-imperialist league met this morning to arrange the program for the convention, which will have its opening session at Tomlinson hall, at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

The Nationalists, who were anti-imperialist, but who are also anti-silver, anti-Bryan and anti-McKinley, whose avowed purpose in meeting today is to swing the anti-imperialist league members to support them in nominating a third ticket, met this morning at the assembly room of the Commercial Club. The convention was called to order by Thomas M. Osborne, of Aurora, N. Y., and Louis R. Ehrlich, of Colorado, permanent chairman, delivered an address.

There has been talk of nominating Grover Cleveland for president, and some of the Nationalists say he is in sympathy with their movement. Robert A. Wildemann said this morning that he had talked with Mr. Cleveland less than a week ago, and that Mr. Cleveland would not accept, on account of his health.

It is claimed that one of the delegates had received a letter from ex-President Cleveland, announcing that he opposed a third party ticket.

DISCIPLINE AT WEST POINT.

Most Severe Punishment Ever Inflicted There.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Forty cadets at the West Point Academy have been sentenced to the most severe punishment ever inflicted in the course of discipline at the institution. The penalties include shortening furloughs, details to detested guard duty in the area and confinement to barracks limits for long terms, which will prevent participation in "hops" and make attendance at football games out of the question.

The punishments were inflicted because the guilty ones had greeted Tactical Officer Lindsay with "Silence" when he entered the mess hall. This was because he had reported the 1902 class for hazing a plebe, and it is this class that will suffer.

IRON MEN WILL STRIKE.

Six Hundred Men Expect to Quit Work Today at Muncie, Indiana.

MUNCIE, Ind., Aug. 14.—After several secret meetings, the men employed in the nut and bolt works department of the Indiana Iron Works, owned by the Republic Iron Company, have decided to strike if the new wage scale of 15 per cent reduction goes into effect on Wednesday as threatened. The strike will affect 600 men.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH.

Barkentine With One Hundred Passengers Saved From Shipwreck by a Government Tug.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—One hundred Portuguese passengers on the three-masted barkentine *Fraterni*, barely escaped shipwreck and death off Narragansett Pier, R. I., last evening. The vessel dropped anchor off Bopp Rock on Saturday night, but a heavy sea drove her perilously near the shore. Captain Oliveria signalled for help to the life saving crew at Narragansett. A government tug towed her out of danger to Newport. The *Fraterni* was bound for New Bedford from the Cape Verde Islands and had been 31 days out.

EXHIBITION NOT A FAILURE.

Entrances on Sunday Reached Half a Million.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—A dispatch to the Times from Paris says: The report that the exhibition is a failure is not borne out by facts. The entrances on Sunday reached half a million, or nearly twice the number admitted on the best day of the last exhibition. The great show is a financial failure from the point of view of the administration, because the public gets too much for its money, but certainly the visitors are not disappointed.

TRANSPORT WARREN TO SAIL.

Officers of Ninth Cavalry Not Permitted to Take Their Families.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14.—The Ninth cavalry will sail on the transport *Warren* next Thursday, with a full

complement of officers and men. Owing to the large number of officers who will occupy the quarters on this transport, no women will be permitted to sail, and many of the officers who had planned to take their families to China will be disappointed.

A sergeant and 40 privates of the signal corps have arrived here from Fort Meyer, Va. They will be sent to China.

BANKER SKIPPED WITH FUNDS.

New York Italians Want to Find Their Countryman.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—The detective bureau is looking for Antonio Pesce, a banker with offices in this city. He has mysteriously disappeared. Scores of excited Italian depositors have thronged Pesce's offices and it is reported to the police that the banker has gone to Italy, taking with him \$15,000.

NEW CUSTOM HOUSE.

Three Years Will Be Employed in the Erection of the New York Custom House.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Work has been commenced on the new custom house, which is to be erected on the Bowling Green site. A large force of men has been put to work excavating for the caisson work. It is expected that the building will be ready for occupancy within three years at the outside.

CLOTHING FACTORY BURNED.

Loss of Ninety-Five Thousand Dollars at Chicago.

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—The clothing factory of K. B. Olsen & Co. was destroyed by fire early today. Loss on buildings and goods, \$95,000.
