PEKIN OR PEKING. That the question as to the correct spelling of the name of the Chinese capital might be finally settled, a New York paper has taken the trouble to dig up old Asiatic geographical authorities, incidentally addressing a letter of inquiry to the Chinese minister at Washington, says the Tacoma Ledger.

The conclusion has been reached that the name should be spelled with a final "g." Minister Wu also holds this view, for in his reply to the letter of inquiry he says: "My opinion is that Peking is correct; for in the Chinese pronunciation its final sound is that of 'ng' and not 'n'."

Notwithstanding the United States government, through its official board on geographical names, has determined that the final "g" is superfluous and in all the official documents originating at Washington the name is spelled

Pekin. Just why the board arrived at this conclusion is not stated in the records of that body, but if there be no other reason, the tendency toward simplification is commendable.

A HOPELESS CONTEST.

Chicago Times-Herald. Lieutenant Horace M. Reeve, aide-de-camp to General Bates, gives an instructive glimpse of campaigning in the Philippines in the current number of The Independent. He writes after service in southern Luzon and northern Mindanao, both of which regions are less known to the world than the district around Manila, and may be taken as fairly indicative of the work that lies before us.

It is soon apparent from the lieutenant's narrative that we do not now and never shall need a great army to hold the lawless element of the islands in check, because the insurgents are destitute of most everything except numbers. An expedition on the way to Nueva Carceres must take possession of a town called Libmanan, which is held by the enemy. The demand for a surrender was refused, and "the insurgent leader, having no idea of the American rifle, or of the 'advance by rushes,' formed his line in the open. In about thirty minutes our men were in the town and about 120 of their opponents will forever remain in the neighboring ricefields."

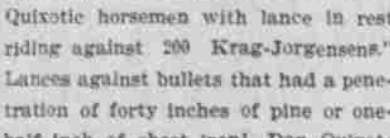
Again "the rearguard of a marching battalion were amazed to see three Quixotic horsemen with lance in rest riding against 200 Krag-Jorgensen." Lance against bullets that had a penetration of forty inches of pine or one-half inch of sheet iron! Don Quixote himself never enjoyed such an opportunity, but it seems that he has many martial imitators in Southern Luzon. It is a common thing to see the poor, ignorant creatures who are fighting for Aguinaldo masquerading in armor, helmets, coats and greaves made from untanned carabao hides.

A story of the skirmishes in Mindanao illustrates their dense ignorance of tactics. A flanking force from some war vessels disconcerted them so that they immediately took to the hills. In commenting upon the incident, which is of ordinary occurrence, the lieutenant says: "I once asked an insurgent officer why he had surrendered without fighting. 'Why, your soldiers got behind us,' was the reply, as if to say that when troops did things like that the laws of war were broken and a chivalric combat was unmerited."

On another occasion a delegation was sent to the United States steamship to request the captain "would he not kindly inform the Filipinos as to the number of sailors he intended to land, in order that an equal number of the garrison might be detailed, and the two parties could have a square fight on the beach?"

It is evident that in all mass encounters the natives are destined for slaughter, and all that they themselves accomplish is by methods closely allied to assassination. Such a conflict cannot be dignified by the name of war, nor is it likely to be of long duration.
