The question of a place for the next year's conference was not agreed upon and will be settled later.

With the evening star on Sunday evening commenced the Jewish New Year. The day is called Rosh Hashana and is usually observed for two days by Jews for orthodox faith and according to their calendar is the beginning of the year 5661. It is observed by Jews throughout the world and worldly cares are dropped for the time being. The day marks the period of the fasting and prayer in the Christian year. Ten days later occurs Yom Kippur, or day of atonement. This is the holiest day in the Jewish calendar. All Jews, especially those of the orthodox belief, abstain from food and drink from sundown the previous day to sunset the following day. The fast is always regulated by the setting and rising of the sun. A number of the local business places were closed yesterday in observance of the holiday.

John A. Willis, in speaking of salmon on the Fraser river, is credited with the following in the Tacoma Ledger: The fish catch of the Fraser river for this season is exceedingly small. The sockeye run this season was much shorter than usual and while it was on the fishermen struck for 25 cents a fish and wasted valuable time until a compromise was effected at 19 cents a fish. There are over fifty canneries and several cold storage warehouses on the Fraser river and they will feel the effects of the short catch as well as the fishermen. The importation of Japanese herring is a little to do with the fishermen's strike. Scores of Japs were brought over under the misrepresentation that there was lots of money for them to be made fishing. They laid around working for nothing and waiting for the run and injured regular labor in this way. Then when they attempted fishing at cheap prices it precipitated trouble.

The assessment roll for Clatsop county was filed yesterday by Assessor Carnahan and was passed upon by the board of equalization, then in session. There is an increase of \$117,708 in the property valuation. Following is a summary of the roll: Acres of tillable land, 4,863.9, value, \$38,146; acres of non-tilable land, 364,252.57, \$728,229; improvements on deeded lands, \$108,339; town and city lots, \$1,108,924; improvements on town and city lots, \$37,174; improvements on land not deeded on patent, \$13,570; miles of railroad bed, \$86,750; railroad rolling stock, \$6000; miles of telegraph and telephone lines, \$14, \$8,500; merchandise and stock in trade, \$123,583; farming implements,

carriages, wagons, etc., \$6,244; steamboats, sailboats, stationary engines, etc., \$30,420; money, \$11,435; notes and accounts, \$5,816; shares of stock, \$60, 129, 080; household furniture, watches, jewelry, etc., \$111,000; horses and mules, \$17, 9,107; cattle, \$321, 24,068; sheep and goats, \$61, \$745; swine, \$29, \$662; gross value of property, \$2,322,761; exemptions, \$136,003; total taxable property, \$2,696,748; number of polls, 673.

The Tacoma Elks are making elaborate preparations for the immense carnival and street fair to be held there in 1900. In speaking of the grandeur of the affair the Ledger says: Some of the magnitude of the occasion may be gained from the fact that the management of the fair expects to bring here and entertain 100,000 visitors. This means, at the least calculation, that from \$750,000 to \$1,000,000 will be expended and put in circulation in this city, and every citizen will be benefited by it. It is proposed to hold a ten-day fair and devote one day each to special features. There will be an Elks' day and a parade of the members of the order from four states. There will be a lumbermen's day, a miners' day and a British Columbia day. One day will be devoted to a rose carnival. Excursion trains will be run from every point in the Northwest and boats from every point on the Sound will pour their human freight into the city to swell the vast concourse. There will be bands by the dozens and concerts and contests between them will be frequent.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Opening Session of the Second Week of Court—Wong Loong's Trial Set for Monday.

Judge McBride arrived down on the noon train yesterday and court was convened at 1:30 p. m.

Ole Grove recently brought suit in the justice court to recover possession of a net of Fred Wickman. The case was decided against him and he then appealed to the circuit court. The case came before the court yesterday and defendant's attorney made a motion to dismiss the appeal which was overruled.

Wong Loong, the Chinaman with a weakness for aliases, was brought before the court to answer to the charge of murder and through his attorney entered a plea of not guilty. His trial was set for Monday, October 1st, at 1 o'clock.

In the case of John Nicol vs. G. A. Amrola, et al., the court made an order for judgment by default.

Court was then adjourned till tomorrow morning, when the trial of Herbert Davis for larceny in the Bee Hive will take place.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

Report of the Business Coming Before the Chamber in Their Regular Meeting Last Night.

A regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was held last evening. Present: B. Van Dusen, president; E. C. Holden, secretary, and a quorum.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and the following communications brought to the attention of the chamber. A letter from the Austro-Hungarian consulate at San Francisco, requesting names of importers in Astoria, was read and the secretary directed to reply.

The secretary then read a communication from Captain W. C. Langfitt, U. S. engineer. The letter was in reply to an inquiry made by the chamber in regard to the delay in the work of the removal of the Sylvia de Grasse reef and stated that the bids for the removal of the reef had been forwarded to Washington, D. C., and rejected as being too high. The communication was placed in file.

The next was a communication from Senator McBride on the same subject, which was also read and filed.

The special committee to which was referred the proposition of Mr. Carter for the removal to Astoria of the Dallas woolen mill, submitted the correspondence had by them on the subject and also made report as follows: To President and Members, Chamber of Commerce: Gentlemen—We, the undersigned committee, appointed by the president, beg leave to report as follows:

Our committee offered the Pioneer Woolen Mills of Dallas, Oregon, the following: "That we would endeavor to prepay freight charges upon such machinery as they brought here and to furnish them with a site. We understand that they would not consider this and have gone to seek elsewhere for more advantageous terms. Respectfully submitted,

J. Q. A. BOWLBY, SAMUEL ELMORE, F. R. STOKES."

On motion the report was approved and the committee discharged. The meeting was then adjourned.
