The German steamer Eva, which sailed from this port several days ago with a full cargo of flour for Hong Kong and Vladivostok, will return for another outward cargo. She is the pioneer steamer of a new line between Portland and Asiatic ports, to be operated by the Oregon & Oriental Steamship Company. It is stated that the Eva will alternate on the route with another steamer of about the same size. If business demands a third steamer will be engaged.

During the month of September Canadian goods to the value of \$1,300,000, shipped from Victoria and Vancouver, passed through Skagway en route to Dawson and points about the Canadian coast. These figures are from the report of the Canadian customs officer at Skagway. It was learned at Skagway before the tea sailed from there, that September was the best month for the exportation of merchandise since the rush to the Yukon began. The inbound steamers all carried large cargoes.

A petition signed by Mrs. Elizabeth A. Dillman was filed in the auditor's office yesterday complaining that the smoke and sparks from the stack of the planing mill of Chas. Bain were very obnoxious to the surrounding neighborhood and that the sparks especially were a menace to the buildings nearby. She asks that a spark arrester be put on or an extension of the stack so as to carry the sparks, soot and smoke above the ridge, of which she is landlady. The matter will come up before the next meeting of the city council.

For the first time in the history of Oregon there is a prospect of the state supplying its own winter butter. This is the result of the unprecedented activity in dairying since the first of the year. The chances are favorable for the state becoming a shipper this winter. In addition to supplying the local demand, heretofore it has always been necessary to ship butter from other states to supply the winter market in Oregon. Large quantities came from California, and still larger quantities from Eastern states. Only during the frame season was Oregon able to come anywhere near supplying the demand. Even then creamery butter had to be supplied by outside firms. But the conditions have been entirely reversed. In less than a year the state has jumped from a fourth-rater butter producer to the banner butter state of the Pacific coast.

Mr. L. Dudley, our consul at Vancouver, is in receipt of a dispatch from the government stating its willingness to establish salmon hatcheries on the tributaries of the Fraser river lying in the United States. Mr. Dudley expresses the opinion that the United States government will be willing to establish a hatchery to augment the salmon industry along the Fraser valley, if it has the opportunity so to do.

The consul says: "Of course, it is not impossible for us to decide whether salmon hatched along the Skagit river and sent out from there into Puget sound are likely to return along the northwestern shore of Washington and from there into the Fraser river." The consul further expresses the opinion that the government of the United States will be willing to establish hatcheries at any point along the boundary, where they can be successfully operated in stocking the waters of the Fraser river and of the eastern coast of Washington, where the American fishing companies now have their traps located.

The British ship Marathon arrived down the river at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon in tow of the Oklahama. She cleared at the custom house for the United Kingdom with 117,456 bushels of wheat valued at \$66,000. Captain Pearce is master.

W. P. Kuermeyer has sworn to a long affidavit stating a number of alleged facts that were not brought before the grand jury by which he was indicted for the murder of William Lunrath. This is in support of the motion of his attorney to quash the indictment.

Three wandering troubadours that were giving exhibitions of feats of strength by bending iron with the hands while the bar was held in their teeth and other sundry things, were gathered in by the police yesterday but were given a permit and continued their performance before an open-eyed and mouthed crowd last evening.

United States Marshal Z. House and Deputy Marshal George Humphrey arrived down on the noon train yesterday with two men in charge. The men were deserters from the British ship Orealla, which has been lying in this port several weeks. They were immediately taken on board and turned over to Captain Tyers.

County surveyor Astbury was busily engaged yesterday in making preparations for the start on the expedition for the lake out of the proposed Nehalem valley road. The party will consist of ten or twelve members and start this morning on the work. Among the party will be the viewers recently appointed by the court, N. Bosler, Fred Gustafson and R. M. Lowe.

The street committee of the Common Council yesterday afternoon opened bids for repaving Franklin avenue between Twenty-sixth and Thirty-first streets. There were seven bids as follows: C. J. Palmberg, \$4,079; L. Lebeck, \$4,235; J. A. Fastabend, \$4,179; S. Norville, \$3,359; Erick Gustafson, \$4,204; J. K. Wirt, \$4,034; J. K. Wirt, \$4,284. S. Norville was the lowest bidder and the committee awarded him the contract.

A dispatch from Tacoma says Puget sound canneries are rapidly closing down on account of the extremely scant run of sockeye salmon and the additional fact that the sockeye is the only variety of salmon that will run this season. The humpback salmon will visit the sound next season, and the cannermen intend to use this fish for canning purposes for the first time. Many canneries have lost much money this year on account of the diminished run of fish.

It is said that there is a congregation of grain at Tacoma, the like of which has never been known on the Pacific coast. W. G. Pearce, assistant to the president of the Northern Pacific railway company, has warned the warehousemen repeatedly to provide ships for the exportation of the grain. They have not done so, and now there is a complete stagnation in the movement of wheat now in the various warehouses and docks places it at \$2,000,000 bushels.

## SECOND DAY'S SESSION K. OF P.

Annual Session Closed Last Evening.

## NEW OFFICERS INSTALLED

The Most Harmonious Meeting of K. of P. Ever Held—Rathbone Sisters Eighth Session.

The second day's session of the grand lodge Knights of Pythias closed last evening with a grand social session with which the annual session was adjourned. The rainy, misty weather of the day before had given place to a most beautiful October day that added greatly to the pleasure of one of the most harmonious sessions of the grand lodge ever held in this state.

The forenoon session opened at 9 o'clock and the introduction of several proposed amendments to the constitution of minor importance took place and other routine business was transacted.

Charters were ordered granted to Hoover lodge at Fossil and to Integrity lodge at Spray. A charter and supplies were ordered issued to Rainier lodge, the property of that lodge having been destroyed by fire during the year.

The report of the G. K. R. S. was also laid before the lodge.

At the afternoon session a committee was appointed to pay a fraternal visit to the grand lodge of Rathbone Sisters then also in session.

At 2 o'clock a committee of the Rathbone Sisters waited on the grand lodge and congratulated them upon the election of W. L. Bradshaw to the honored position of grand chancellor. They also presented him with a beautiful bouquet of white carnations in token of their esteem.

The secret work was exemplified by Supreme Representative Turner Oliver, and the installation of officers followed. J. H. Pearce was appointed grand tribune for two years and H. H. Sargeant for three years.

A vote of thanks was tendered Astor lodge, No. 6, for the hospitable manner in which they had entertained the visiting knights and a vote of thanks was also extended to the citizens of the city.

A fraternal greeting was sent to the grand lodges now in session in the following states and territory: Vermont, West Virginia, Nebraska and Oklahoma.

The finance committee handed in a report of the receipts and expenditures for the past year of which the following is a summary:

Expenditures ..... 5,502.63

Bal. on hand for coming year, \$4,361.87

The cost of holding the present session of the grand lodge, mileage and per diem was \$2,172.63.

The per capita tax for the coming year was fixed at 80 cents.

Portland was designated as the next place of meeting and the time of the meeting has been changed from the second Tuesday to the third Tuesday in October.

The total membership of the order in the state is 4,216, which is an increase of 376 members for the past year. All of the lodges in the state were represented at the present session.

Today the visitors will be treated to an excursion to Seaside by Astor lodge No. 6. The party will go down on the noon train and return later in the afternoon. Special arrangements have been made for the occasion.

## RATHBONE SISTERS.

The Rathbone Sisters completed their grand temple work yesterday. At the morning session the reports of subordinate temples were received and showed the order in a prosperous and promising condition throughout the state.

The election of officers was made the next order of business, all being done in perfect harmony, with the following result:

Ungerman, Diancia, No. 10, McMinnville; grand mistress of finance, Alma L. Dorrien, Phoenicia, No. 15, Hillsboro; grand protector, Lillian Oimstead, Centralia, No. 11, Salem; grand guard of outer temple, Sadie J. Caylor, Rowena, No. 9, La Grande; grand trustee, Ida Bergman, Astor, No. 25, Astoria.

After the election of officers the reports of various committees were listened to, including the report of committee on fraternal correspondence. This report showed that the order is steadily growing throughout the states of the Union; with possibly one or two exceptions.

Just before the noon recess, Grand Junior Miriam B. Brook called forth much enthusiasm by some eloquent remarks on the subject of the recognition from the Knights of Pythias as a body. When she announced that the newly elected grand chancellor is a Rathbone Sister as well as a K. of P. the enthusiasm of the sisters was exhibited by hand clapping and the chautauqua salute. By unanimous vote of all present, a committee consisting of

Grand Junior Brook, Supreme Representative Hochstetler and Past Grand Chief Parmenter, was instructed to purchase the handiwork bouquet of flowers obtainable in the city. Accordingly they procured a bouquet of white carnations, which was tied with the order's colors and taken to the lodge room and presented to Mr. Bradshaw by the chairman of the committee.

At the afternoon session, a committee from the Knights of Pythias lodge was admitted and extended its greeting and good wishes from that body.

The afternoon was occupied in acting on resolutions, grand chief's decisions and other routine business, including the installation of officers.

The temple adjourned nine die after meeting for two days in a most harmonious session, accomplishing much beneficial and needed legislation, which will prove of great help to subordinate temples.
